## MICHIGAN MIRROR

Michigan will take another look at its blessings next May 21. It will be Michigan week and Michigan cities and villages will swap mayors for a day. Dr. Grover Dillman, president of Michigan College of Mines will be chairman.

Last year Michigans' woods and lakes held the focal point of interest. This year the Centennial celebration of the Soo canal and Michigan State College will be tied in with it. More than 300 Michigan mayors traded offices last year. The biggest celebration was the ground breaking ceremonies of the Mackinac bridge at St. Ignace and Mackinac City.

Stanley Dinkel, Pinckney mayor who exchanged with Cheboygan and Mrs. Dinkel, attended this.

Michigan law enforcement officers want to catch gamblers in a federal-state squeeze. Gambling, except at legalized horse races is outlawed in Michigan. Federal authorities realizing gambling is legal in some of the states, got a law passed requiring gamblers to get a license. State officers want a law making possession of a federal license a violation of the state gambling law.

Republicans in the state senate who have to vote on all the governor's appointments, have gone back on their promise to approve all of them. They refused to approve 89 last year, on the chance a Republican governor would be elected. When Williams won they said they would approve his appointments but they are not so sure now. Their excuse is that there will be 12 new senators take office Jan. 1 who know nothing of the men appointed and they must be considered on their qualifications.

## CONSERVATION NOTES

The third bobcat was caught in Muskegon county last week, tagged and released. Anyone shooting it is asked to send the tag No. 2700 to the dept.

In 1951, 1952 and 1953 27 wolves were taken in Michigan. This year so far 23 have been taken.

The ice fishing season is in full swing and many good catches, mostly blue gills are reported.

Latest reports show hunters bagged 65,500 deer during the 1954 season. 9400 were taken in the special season and 2000 in southern Michigan. Archers took 2000.

Ice fishing started on Houghton Lake last week and bluegills are biting good.

Blach head killed two more of Michigans wild turkeys in Allegan forest last week. 200 were released there.

The ice fishing season is about due and ice shanties and tipups will soon be in evidence. It started Dec. 31 last year but cold weather is earlier this year.

Fishing licenses sales were down slightly in Michigan last year. There were about as many out of state fishermen but not so many local ones.

So far in Mich. 1010 fires have burned over 3894 acres which is 607 below last year.

The City of Bay City has offered a 5.6 acre plat adjacent to the Bay City state park to the state. It has 300 ft. frontage on the bay.

About the same number of deer hunters hunted in the upper peninsula this year as last and got about as many deer. In the lower peninsula there were 21 percent less hunters and the deer kill was 23 percent less.

Bad weather cut down the deer kill in the special season and some doubt that over 5,000 deer were killed.

Coon hunting is said to be good with these animals abundant. The season ends Dec. 15.

One hunter in 10 bagged a goose at the Swan Creek, Fennville area this week. The total kill was 2243.

For the last 3 years 9,000 high school students have taken part in the school safety firearms instruction classes.

10,000,000 board feet of fallen timber in the Porcupine Mts is being salvaged.

The 300 iron ore boats carried 60,500,000 tons of ore this year, less than two-thirds of the amount they carried last year.

10,000 firearms deer hunters will receive post cards asking the result of their deer hunt.

Afterwards she maintained that she still heard the pounding on the floor at various times but had got used to it and ignored.

## WILL SEEK LAW

At a district meeting at Marshall last week of supervisors of six counties the supervisors agreed to fight the supreme court decision which would force them to adopt the state valuation which is higher than the county one now in use. They will seek to get a law introduced to return the taxing power to the counties and aid them in protecting local units. Wash. tenaw, Calhoun, Hillsdale, Branch Lenawee and Jackson counties were represented. One supervisor was chosen from each county to help draw up the law. Carl Mast of Webster was chosen from Washtenaw.

In Ypsilanti the supt. of the schools turned down the request of Chaorman Hicks of the board of supervisors to accept the county plan of valuation. His reason was the state plan would give the schools \$60,000 more.

## CURRENT COMMENT

Another year has rolled around and there is little change in the foreign or economic situation. The president claims the war menace is past and is cutting the draft 50 percent and the army 25 percent. However the secretaries of defense and state are issuing conflicting statements. To the onlooker there seems little improvement in the foreign situation. It would take but little to participate a conflict in Europe and the same is true of Asia. A Korean peace treaty has not yet been signed and the negotiations are broken off. This country has warned Red China that any attack or invasion of Formosa will mean war. This would seem is certain to come. The Reds have attacked most of the islands around Formosa but not yet bombed that island. They probably will. In this country there is much unemployment and may be more. At Howell about 200 are in the unemployment line weekly. Many factories are reducing their employees as their war orders are cancelled. The factories apparently have the ability to produce domestic goods much faster than they can be absorbed. Looking things over it is apparent it would take little to change the whole picture.

All of you who hid under the bed last Tuesday waiting for the world to end can come out now as Mrs. Martin of Chicago, the propheser of doom, got an 11th hour message that the Lord had reprieved the world but she claims the end will come some time in 1955. She will get the new date from the space men later. In the meantime Dr. Laugheed, the Michigan State professor who lost his job for teaching Mrs. Martin's prophesy has been ordered to take a mental test on petition of his sister. She charges he and his wife are neglecting their 3 children and going crazy on the Martin creed. In the meantime Mrs. Martin got another communication from space that she, the Laugheeds and other disciples would be picked up by flying saucers from space at 6:30 p. m. Christmas eve and transported to the great beyond. The Martins and Laugheeds were on the Martin lawn at that time singing hymns but no flying saucers showed up. Mrs. Martin expects another message from space explaining the slipup.

177 inmates and paroles of Michigan prisons were given pardons for Christmas presents by Gov. Williams. The parolees have been free for some time and this was a final gesture to wipe their slate clean. This custom of pardoning prisoners at Christmas time extends way back to the time of Christ. It signifies forgiveness and exemplifies the Christian spirit. Not as much publicity has been given to this act in recent years as in the past. The most famous pardon ever given in Michigan at Christmas time was the one given Frank L. Andrews some 50 years ago. He was prominent politically in Detroit and at one time was police commissioner. A bank he started paid a higher rate of interest and got many deposits, mostly those of working people. It went broke and the depositors lost their savings. Andrews was convicted of embezzlement and sent to Jackson but only served a year when he was pardoned by Gov. Aaron Bliss a Saginaw man who became wealthy in the manufacture of roofing material. The type of man usually elected governor in those days. The Andrews pardon ruined him politically and he died a few years afterwards.

While the J. L. Hudson Company of Detroit is expanding and building stores in the Detroit suburbs other big firms seem to be retrenching. We read that Montgomery Ward expects to close 11 stores. They are not listed but the Lansing and Battle Creek stores are said to be on the list. Their store at Cadillac burned last week. There has been considerable friction among their stockholders in recent years and they are evidently closing all stores that do not show a big profit.

Santa Claus was barred from at least 2 churches this year. Rt. Rev. Msgr. Louis Mendelis, pastor of St. Alphonsus Catholic Church, Baltimore, Maryland barred him from his church this year. His reason was that he classed Santa Claus as a pagan myth who had no place in the observance of Christmas and caused the people to lose sight of the fact that Christmas was set aside to celebrate the birthday of Jesus Christ. This year he issued a book of 10 pages urging people to put Christmas back in Christmas. Rev. Ellsworth Bunce, pastor of Arnoia Methodist Church, Baltimore, backed Rev. Mendelis 100 percent and also observed Christmas this year this year without the aid of Santa Claus.
