NEWS

With tourists tossed bouquets at resort owners this year. The U.S. Dept. of Interior report said that drought conditions prevailed over two-thirds of the nation this year but Michigan was immune to it due Great Lakes and her many inland lakes and streams. The state has 2,242 miles of Great Lakes shore line and no spot in Michigan is more than 95 miles from the Great Lakes.

Democrats who hold 6 of the 8 places on the state administrative board are preparing to blast the 2 Republican members of the board High Com. Ziegler and Supt. of Instruction Taylor. Ziegler claims he has done as much good work as possible with the funds available, and that the state needs \$6,000,000,000 to bring the roads up to par.

Senator Carlton Morris of Kalamazoo has introduced a bill at Lansing to reduce the marriage waiting period from 5 to 3 days. This would make it conform to the laws of the other states. The law was passed to allow time for blood tests for the contracting parties.

COMMUNICATION

There have been articles in the papers in reference to the board of supervisors voting to pay me uncollected salary for my term as circuit judge. The Detroit Free Press carried one. It read that I stated in my campaign that I would not ask for the money, that I would not ask for it. These statements are absolutely untrue. After I succeeded Judge Collins in 1948, I did not take the extra compensation voted for the office. It was thought to belong to Judge Collins and not to the office. The matter was never mentioned until seven months after the spring election. In October 1953 to clear up the matter Judge Carland asked the prosecuting attorney for an opinion as to whether or not the extra compensation applied to Judge Collins successors, as it had not been recinded. The prosecutor's opinion was that the county would be liable for the extra compensation due Judge Carland during his term and to me for the time I held office. So the board of supervisors voted Judge Carland the extra compensation due him last year and that I be paid the amount for the time I held the office. CURRENT COMMENT

The ever increasing baby crop in this nation is causing concern in some places. Last year 2,500,000 babies were born in the nation. One woman, Mrs. Nicholas Burdett of Rhway, N.J. gave birth to 5 babies in twelve months, a set of triplets and a pair of twins. If this keeps up economists see an exhausting of food, clothing, mineral and fuel resources. The schools are swamped and most of them have had to expand twice since the last war. At first the war was blamed but today many are becoming fathers who were not in the conflict. The reason is that there are just more people here than ever before. The families are not bigger. The average family is about 3 or 4. Back 100 years 12 and 14 child families were not uncommon but there were not so many people then and the death rate was very much higher. According to census takers this increase is expected to continue at least for 5 years.

The suit of Prof Hyma of the University of Michigan against Mrs. Lillian Lee, a spiritualist preacher is attracting attention because it is unusual. The professor became a spiritualist believer and sought the aid of Mrs. Lee to get financial advice from the spirit world. Accordingly she got in communication with the spirit world and got the professor's advice he wanted but it was all wrong. Every investment he made by it failed. So he is suing. Mrs. Lee disclaims all responsibility and says she only acted as the mouthpiece of the spirits while in a trance and does not even know what advice they gave. The suit was thrown out of court once but ordered tried by the supreme court.

Congress at Washington D. C. wears the most youthful look it ever has. The average age there is now between 42 and 48 years. The average last year was 10 years higher. The house has 15 women members whose average age is 43 years. This is the result of the election. In the fall in which many new members were elected. As usual lawyers constitute the bulk of the membership of congress, three fifths of the members being lawyers.

The General Federation of Women's Clubs seems to have made a dent in the circulation of crime and comic books but much work remains to be done. The crime magazine industry has become a huge one. It started in 1835 with one book, "Action Comics." By 1940 there were 100 different publications doing over \$15,000,000 worth of business. The far eastern situation still constitutes a puzzle. The president recently negotiated a treaty with Red China which the senate has not yet approved. The press states that the president will shortly ask congress for men, ships and planes to defend Formosa and evacuate Chinese. Kai Chek's men from mainland China which are under attack by the Red China Forces. There is some risk in this as the Reds sank 3 of Chiang's ships last week that were taking supplies to Tachon. Sec. of State Dulles has changed his mind about the islands and says there are no longer important for the defense of Formosa. The president wants the United Nations to arrange a cease fire between Red and Nationalist China which Chiang bitterly opposes. Chiang knows his time is running out and that if he is overthrown a successful attack on Red China he must do so now.

Years ago Nevada which is a rocky unproductive state with the nations smallest population made gambling and divorce her leading industries and seems to be doing all right financially. At Las Vegas, the big gambling city 8 new hotels are being built at a cost of \$20,000,000. They will have 4000 rooms to rent. There are already 7 multi million hotels to rent which vie with each other in having the most costly night club shows. Gambling pays the shot for all of this. There are 11,000 free spenders in Las Vegas and more are expected.

School Building Bonds

Scaled bids for the purchase of general obligation bonds to be issued by Pinckney Community Schools School District, Livingston and Washtenaw Counties, Michigan, of the par value of Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000) will be received by the undersigned at the Pinckney High School, in the Village of Pinckney, Michigan, in said School District, until 8:00 o'clock, p. m., Eastern Standard Time, on the 3rd day of February, 1955, at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened and read.

Said bonds will be dated February 1, 1955, will be coupon bonds in the denomination of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) each, will be numbered consecutively in the direct order of their maturities from one (1) to two hundred fifty (250), both inclusive, will bear interest from their date at a rate or rates not exceeding three and one-half per cent (3 1/2%) per annum, expressed in multiples of 1/4 of 1%. Said interest will be payable on the first day of July, 1955, and semi-annually thereafter on the first day of January and July in each year. Said interest rate for bonds maturing in any one year shall be at one rate only. Accrued interest to date of delivery of such bonds shall be paid by the purchaser at time of delivery.

Said bonds will mature serially Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) on the first day of July in the year 1956; Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) on the first day of July in each of the years 1957 to 1961, both inclusive; Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000) on the first day of July in each of the years 1962 to 1970, both inclusive; and Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000) on the first day of July in each of the years 1971, 1972 and 1973.

Both principal and interest will be payable at a bank or trust company to be designated by the purchaser of the bonds.

Bonds numbered one (1) to forty-five (45), inclusive, maturing in the years 1956 to 1960, both inclusive, shall not be subject to redemption prior to maturity.

Bonds numbered forty-six (46) to two hundred fifty (250), inclusive, may be redeemed prior to maturity at the option of the School District in inverse numerical order on any interest payment date on or after July 1, 1960, at par and accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption, plus a premium for each bond so redeemed as follows:

\$25.00 on each bond called for redemption prior to July 1, 1962;
\$20.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after July 1, 1962, but prior to July 1, 1964;

\$15.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after July 1, 1964, but prior to July 1, 1966;

\$10.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after July 1, 1966, but prior to July 1, 1968;

\$5.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after July 1, 1968.

Notice of redemption shall be given to the holders of the bonds to be redeemed by publication of such notice not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date fixed for redemption, at least once in a newspaper or publication circulated in the State of Michigan which carries, as part of its regular service, notices of sale of municipal bonds.

For the purpose of awarding the bonds the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining, at the rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of all interest on the bonds from March 1, 1955, to the date of maturity for all bonds maturing prior to the year 1972; to July 1, 1963 for all bonds maturing in the year 1973; to July 1, 1967 for all bonds maturing in the year 1972; and deducting therefrom any premium. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above computation produces the lowest interest cost to the School District. Each bidder shall state in his bid the interest cost to the School District, computed in the manner above specified. No proposal for the purchase of less than all the bonds or at a price less than 100% of their par value will be considered.

CONSERVATION NOTES

The state waterfowl survey started January 11.

857 farms in Michigan planted trees and shrubs for game habitat last year.

A conservation law violator paid a \$14 fine recently for dumping rubbish on public land.

The City of Bay City has given the state 7 1/2 acres of water front property for inclusion in the state park there. The state is buying 1260 more acres for state parks. It now owns 4,202,700 acres of land.

The state will process 4,125,000 trout eggs this year. They will be legal size by 1956.

865 people were arrested last week for conservation law violation, mostly for carry loaded guns in a car, hunting after hours and shining deer.

The old saying "Poor as a Church Mouse" does not seem to hold true anymore, judging by the attempts being made to rob churches and rectories. At Ann Arbor last week burglars tried to break open the safe of St. Andrews Episcopal church with a sledge and chisel but did not make it, although they ruined the safe.

The truth is that considerable money passes through the hands of the church officials in the present day and not all of it is banked.

Wall eyed pike will be transferred over the dam at Newaygo to spawn again this year. Last year 7340 were transferred.

The state will spend \$863,000 this year planting trees on state land.

Land in the Algonac state park and at Proud Lake may be leased to the federal government for defense purposes.

The fight for blue gills is still 15 a day.

At the Natural Resources meeting at the Masonic Temple. Lansing last week, attended by 450 it was predicted Michigan's population in 1975 will be 8,570,000. This will constitute a serious drain on water, minerals and other natural resources.

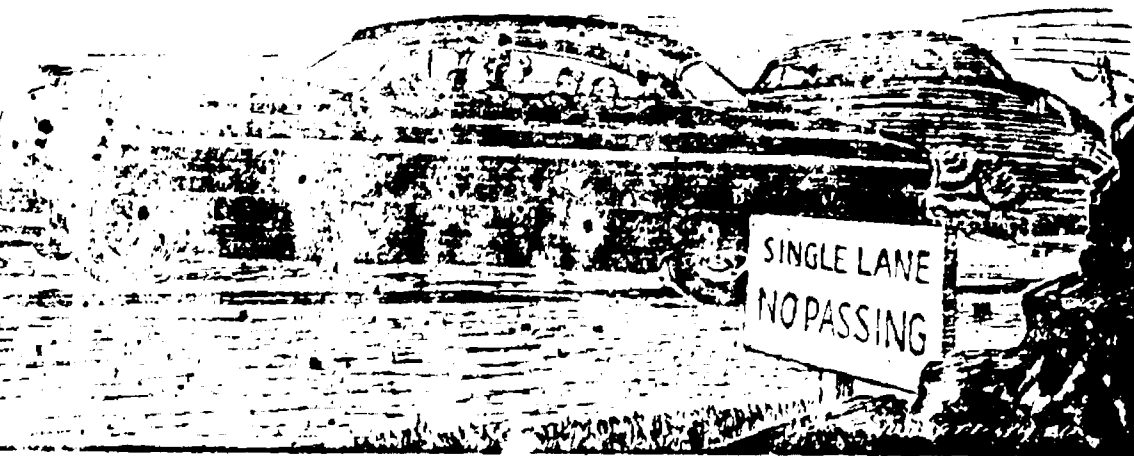
