MICHIGAN MIRROR

Well Michigan had another close e ection last week and we still don't know who the official winners were for 3 important officers. The returns so far give the Democrats five victories and the Republicans hree but the Republican leads are small except Judge Carr's for the supreme court. Clare Taylor for supt. of public instruction is less tthan 2000 ahead and Steve Nisbett for board education about 800. It will be several weeks before the canvass is completed and then recounts may be in order.

Two years ago owing to numerous errors by the election boards, the governor's study commission headed by Judge Lila Neunfeld made 24 recommendations for better conduct of elections. Up to date but one has been put into effect, creation of a bi patiena board of canvassers.

The governor and Rep. Peltz of the highway committee are disputing who is responsible for the much discussed and long delayed highway bill. The governor once agred to suppor Rep. Peltz's bill which provided for a cnt and a half increase in the for cent and a half increease in the the truck wt. tax to be voted on by the people April 4 but the senate killed it. The senate now has come up with a new bill giving the state 75 percent of the increased tax and the counties and cities 25 percent. The governor favors a 4 lane arterial system to relieve congested highways to be paid for by bonds. There should also be assurance that the money will be spent on arterial roads roads and not on bits and snatches here and there.

The bill to permit counties to ig nore the equalized state valuation in computing school 'taxes where district boundaries bisect county lines was killed in the senate but comes up again in the house


