Physicians have revis ed their estimates and now say instead of being effective in 90 perpercent of the cases it is in 60 to 80. The vacine used came from the Cutt er Laboratories in California, one of the oldest in the nation. It was also used in Nevada, Arizona and New Mexico. The vacine program is now suspended in these states until the vacine can be tested. The reason it did not work is problematical..Some of the vacine might have been faulty.
