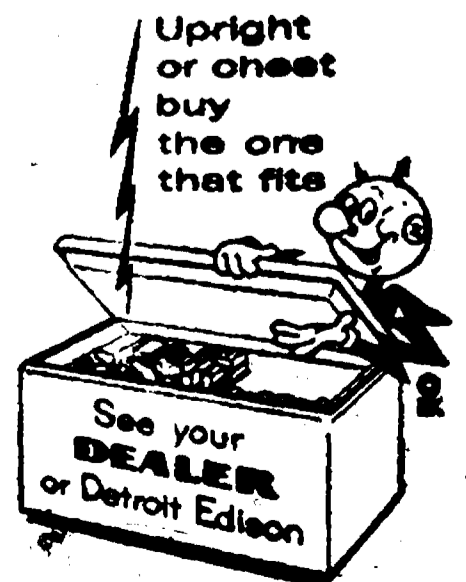

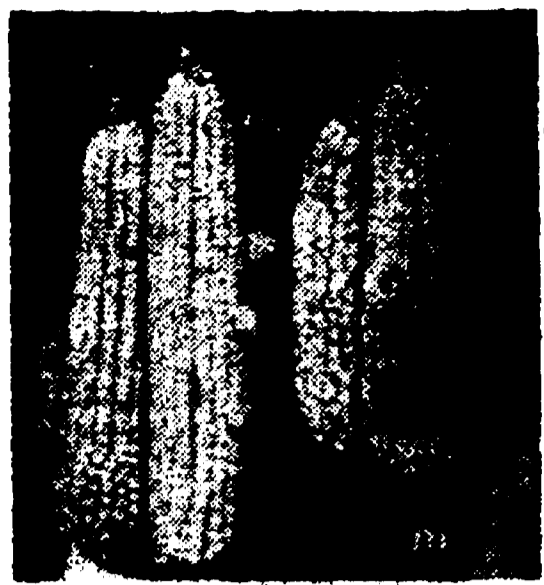

Order Plant Food Early to Assure Needed Supplies

IF YOU are aiming at high yields and high profits in 1954, it's time now to order your fertilizer, advises the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee. Delay may mean you won't get the plant food you need for next spring's planting operations.

High profit yields depend on supplying the soil with all the nutrients it requires to feed the crops.

Agronomists point out that a sound system of soil management based on increased fertilizer use pays rich dividends on most Corn Belt farms. The trend has been toward high applications of plant food, with many farmers using up to 1,000 pounds per acre.

Corn yields per acre in the Middle West could be boosted at least a third by the teamwork of good management and heavy amounts of fertilizer, these agronomists point out. Wheat production could be doubled, hay and pasture and soybean yields increased one-fourth.

The higher yields per acre mean lower costs per bushel and greater chances for profit, even with prices declining.

"Some farmers lost out on the higher profits last year because they waited until the last minute to order their fertilizer," says the committee. "In the avalanche of demand during the spring rush period, some farmers missed getting the grades and amounts of fertilizer they needed or got none at all."

"Time is required to make, cure and deliver all the fertilizer farmer can profitably use on their spring-seeded crops. Manufacturers can't squeeze a year's fertilizer production into a four-week's rush."

High Organic Matter Supply Helps Soils Soak Up More Water

CROPS will have more water to help build higher yields, if your soil has a regular turnover of active organic matter.

Dr. W. P. Martin, Ohio State University agronomist, points out that rotting organic matter improves the soil structure and makes it more porous. Water percolates in more easily. Rains are soaked up and held by the soil, instead of running off, or ponding on top.

In this soil building process, millions of tiny, invisible microbes play an important part. As they feed on organic matter and break it down, they produce a gummy, jelly-like substance. This sticky material glues tiny soil particles together into clusters or aggregates. These aggregates, in turn, increase the size of the soil pores and allow more water to enter. As organic matter rots, it releases crop-feeding nutrients. More soil phosphate is made available to growing plants. It helps increase the efficiency of the fertilizer you add to the soil.

Soil building measures should be given "green light" priority in farm improvement programs aimed at increasing profits, says the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee. "That is particularly true with the drop in prices and farm income in recent months," says a statement issued by the committee. "Today the high cost of farm-

Wheat Yield is Boosted 28 Bushels by Good Soil Care

Wheat yields as much as 28 bushels more per acre from the use of fertilizer were obtained on some Kansas farms this season, reports the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee. Citing results of tests conducted by Dr. Floyd W. Smith, Kansas State College agronomist.



High soil fertility level gives top wheat yields per acre.

"Wheat made 60.4 bushels per acre on the top fertilized plot on the Ted Breuer farm near Waverly," Smith said.

"Yields averaged more than 50 bushels on plots at the Ottawa experimental field and on the Vernon Meador farm in Wenaxa. Seven other locations had top yields ranging from 40 to 49 bushels per acre."

Overall results on 18 farms in Eastern and Central Kansas showed that fertilized wheat averaged 13 more bushels per acre than unfertilized wheat.

Smith estimates that fertilizer returned more than \$4 for every \$1 invested in plant food.

Even in severe drought areas, there was usually enough yield increase to pay the cost of the fertilizer treatment, he said.

Summing up the results of Kansas tests over the years, Smith said:

"If a farmer will have his soil

tested and if he follows recommendations for the use of phosphate, potash and nitrogen, he should realize \$2 to \$3 for every dollar spent on fertilizer.

"In some years results may not be this good. But under particularly favorable conditions such as we had in 1954 in extreme Eastern Kansas, returns may be as high as \$4 to \$5 for every dollar invested."

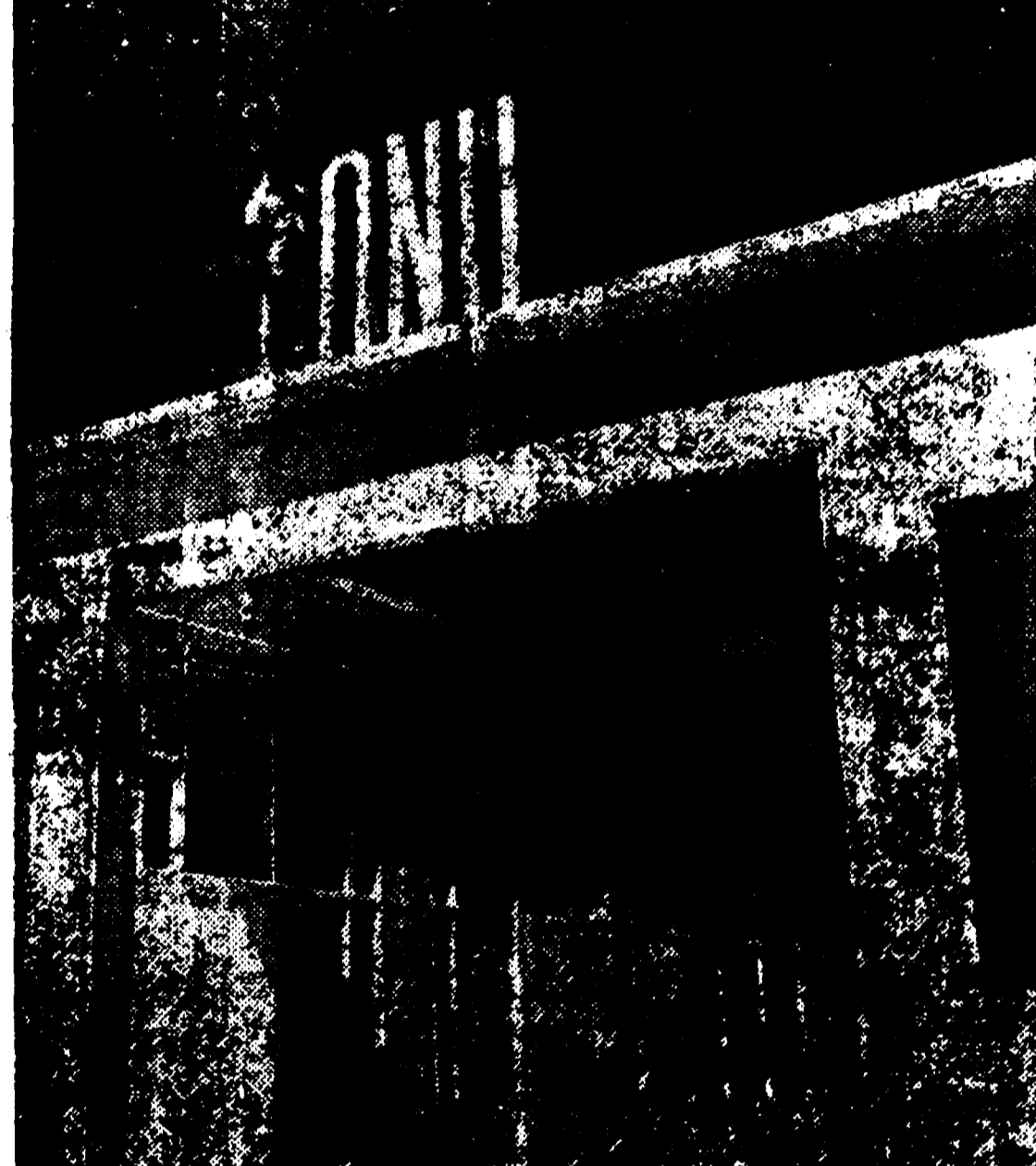
"Battle of the Species" Can be Won by Alfalfa

Alfalfa can win the "battle of the species" among other legumes and grasses when young pasture mixture gets a full feed of lime, phosphate and potash, says the Middle West Soil Im-

provement Committee, in quoting P. E. Johnson, University of Illinois agronomist.

On well fertilized clay pan soils in Southern Illinois, alfalfa was boss in a pasture mixture that included red clover, timothy and timothy, Johnson says. Red Clover ranked second.

Well Fed Pasture Yields 309 Pounds of Beef Per Acre

MINNESOTA soils specialists report that fertilized pastures can produce 309 pounds of beef per acre, as compared to 121 pounds per acre on unfertilized pastures, according to tests conducted by the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee.

In tests conducted by Minnesota soil specialists, fertilized pastures produced 309 pounds of beef per acre, as compared to 121 pounds per acre on unfertilized pastures. The fertilized pastures gave 177 more pounds of beef per acre than the unfertilized pastures.

The fertilizer treatments produced \$37.40 more beef per acre than the unfertilized pastures. Beef production on fields built up with improvement, as compared to unfertilized pastures, was \$29.06 per acre.

The soil building program increased the pasture carrying capacity. During September, there were 15 steers per acre on the fertilized pastures, as compared to only 10 on the unfertilized pastures.

The University of Minnesota research men report that 500 pounds of 5-20-20 fertilizer per acre was used to establish thicker growth on the fertilized pastures.

"Early Bird" Buyer Has Best Choice of '55 Fertilizer

BUYING your fertilizer now and storing it on your farm over the winter has these advantages, reports the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee.

1—You get the best fertilizer available. During the early winter months, manufacturers have more time to make, cure and condition the plant food. So you get the best handling product it is possible to make.

2—You have your choice of the exact grade you want. You avoid the risks of the spring rush season when everybody is trying to buy fertilizer. At that time, demand is often greater than the supply and particular grades of fertilizer may be hard to get. This has happened in the past several years. Some of the late comers got only a small choice.

3—Fertilizer bought now save you time in the spring, when you are at your busiest. The plant food is on hand, ready to use just as soon as weather conditions permit you to get into the fields. Then you don't lose precious hours waiting for delivery when spring work is piling up.

The committee says it is wise to make arrangements now for the plant food needed for the corn crop. This applies to water fertilizer and to the plant food that may be broadcast and plowed under before corn planting time.

Plant Food Plus Enough Stalks Key To Top Corn Yields



Good management gives extra bushels of corn per acre.
IF YOUR sights are set for top yields per acre on the acres you have in corn this year, here are some suggestions from the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee, based on reports from Corn Belt agronomists:
1—Keep your soil's fertility level high by adding plenty of fertilizer. A soil test can be a good guide in suggesting the amount and kind of fertilizer needed to supply the corn plants with all the nitrogen, phosphate and potash they need for high yielding growth. Many farmers find it pays to plow down a complete fertilizer before planting time, then add a starter in the row and side dress later with extra nitrogen.
2—Plant enough stalks to match the soil's nutrient and water supply. Many farmers lose profits by not having a large enough stalk population to make full use of the plant food and water available.
3—Add regularly to the soil's active organic matter supply. This can be done by returning manure, plowing under crop residues and "green manure" crops and growing sod crops regularly in the rotation.

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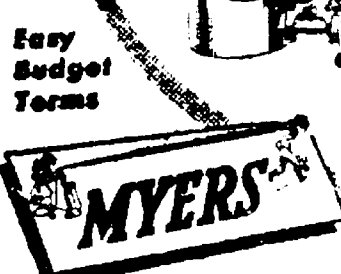
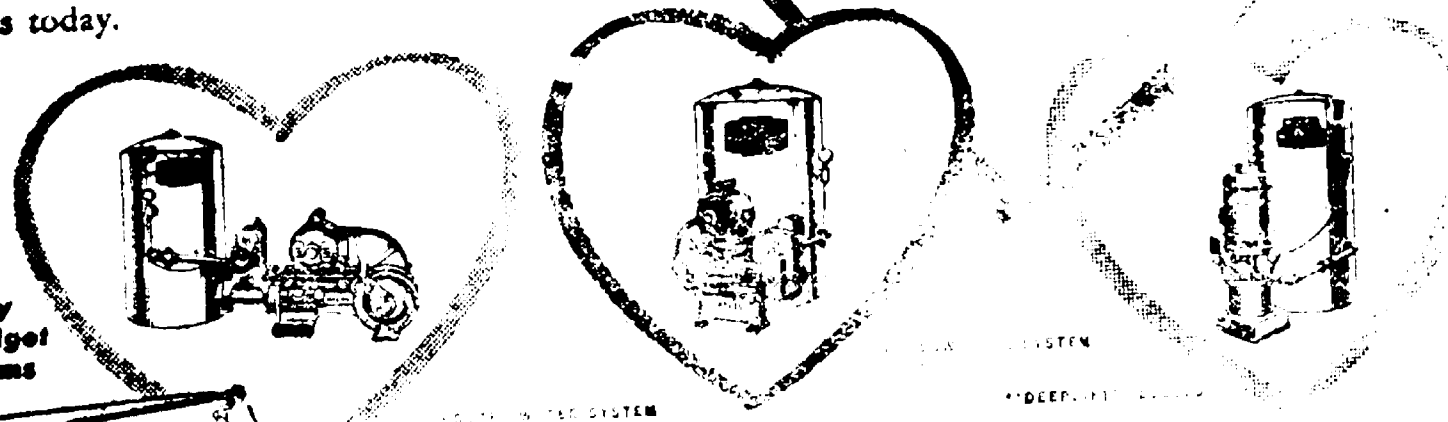
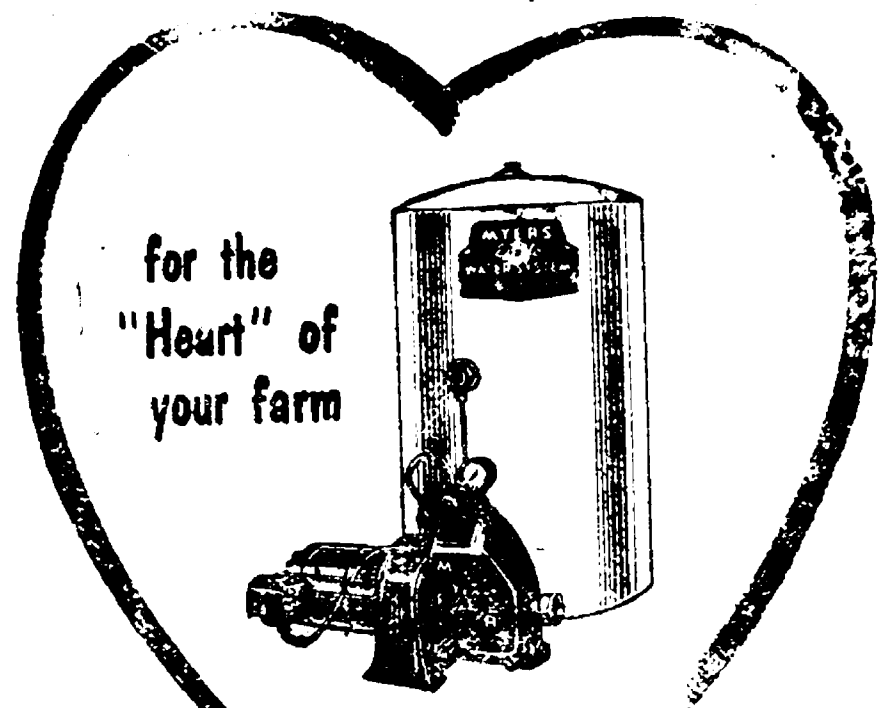
