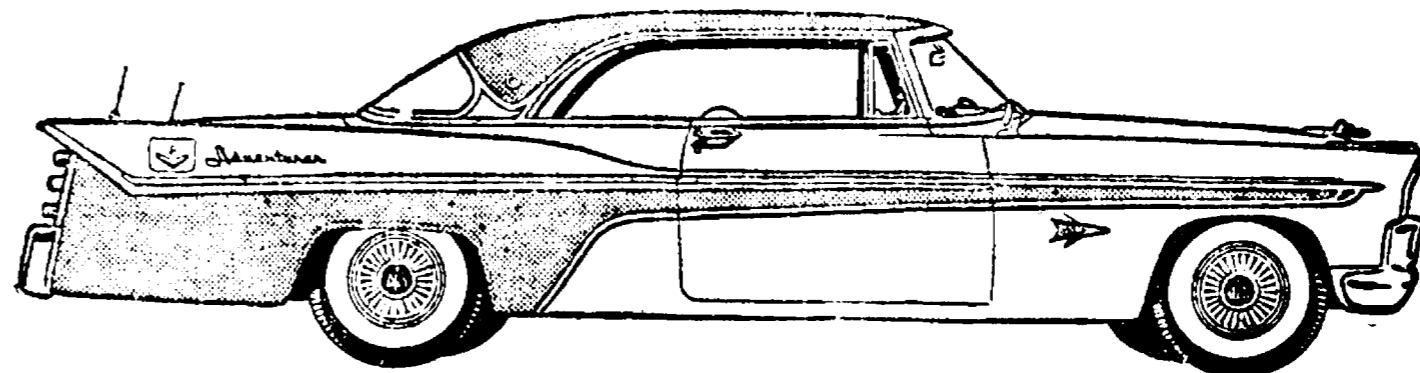

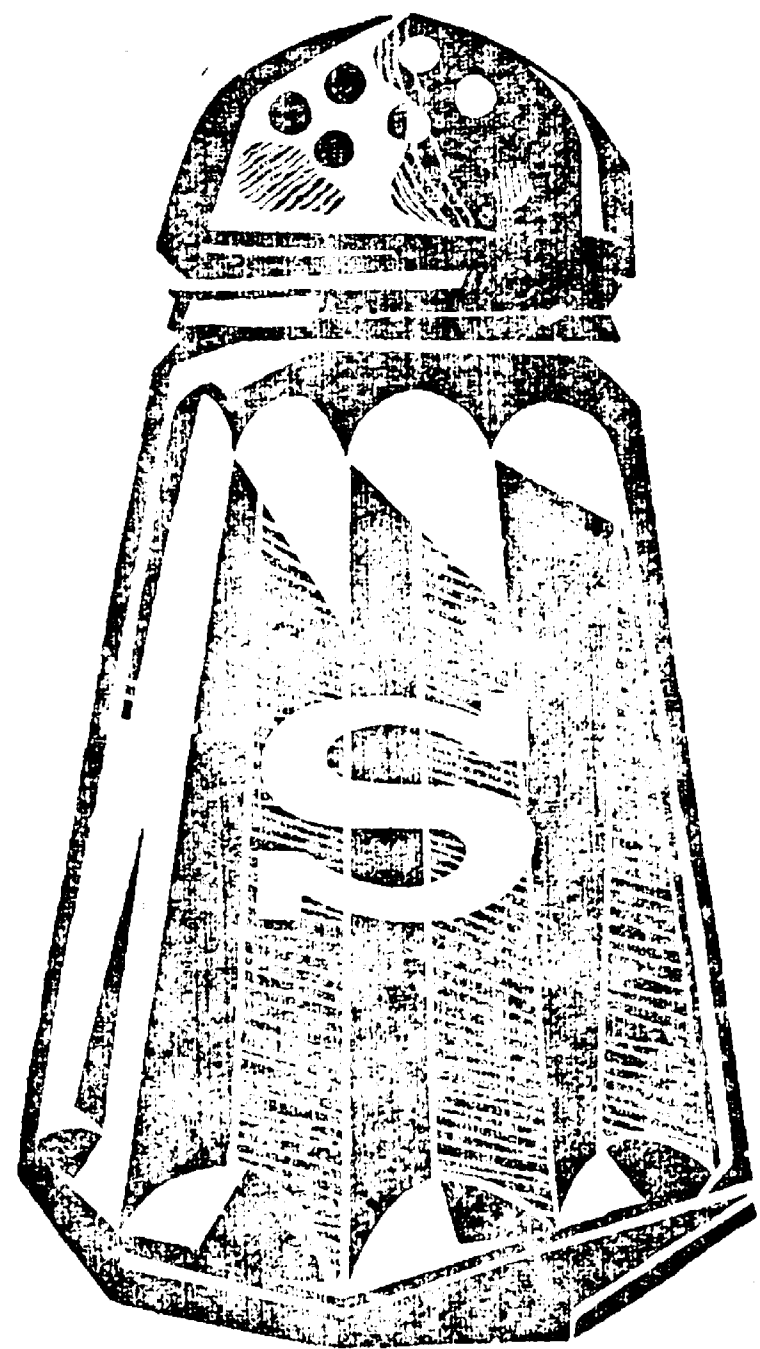

Upon motion of Supvr. Seim, which was duly supported by Supvr. Spicer the Board adjourned until 1:30 P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Upon motion of Supvr. Conine, which was duly supported by Supvr. Cole that the following resolution be adopted.

WHEREAS, the Legislature by Act 113 of the Public Acts of 1955, has provided a method by which child care in the several counties of the state shall be administered and financed, and

WHEREAS, it is mandatory for the several Board of Supervisors to provide a "Child Care Fund" if the counties are to participate in and to become entitled to reimbursement by the State for certain percentages or such expenditures by the counties and charges against the counties by the State for the care of children in the Boys Vocational School, Girls Training School and in the Michigan Childrens Institute, and it being considered advisable by this Board that the County of Livingston come under this plan:

BE IT RESOLVED, that the County of Livingston, by and through its Board of Supervisors, does hereby elect to come within the provisions of said Act; that there be and is hereby established a Child Care Fund of \$1500.00, that this fund be apportioned entirely to the "Probate Court Juvenile Division Account"; and that the County Treasurer credit the amount so apportioned to the child care fund under "Probate Court Juvenile Division Account."

Moved by Supvr. Conine that the foregoing resolution be adopted. Motion supported by Supvr. Cole.

Supvr. Miller of the Criminal Claims Committee presented bills to the Board, which were allowed as presented and appear by numbers G2577 through G2583. Carried.

Moved by Supvr. Catrell and supported by Supvr. Cole that this Board appropriate the sum of \$1400.00 to the 4-H Club Counsel for the current year. Carried.

Supvr. Staible of the Civil Claims Committee presented bills to the Board, which were allowed as presented as appear by numbers G2577 through G2590. Carried.

Moved by Supvr. Cole and supported by Supvr. Snyder that the Planning Commission submit their budget to the Board, at their meeting on April 10th. Carried.

Moved by Supvr. Cole and supported by Supvr. Spicer that the matter of an appropriation for a County Armory, be tabled until the April Session of this Board, and the Prosecuting Attorney be instructed to give his opinion as to the legality of the same. Carried.

Supvr. Cole presented the following resolution and moved its adoption, which was duly supported by Supvr. Snyder.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, a petition has been received by the Board of Supervisors of Livingston County, Michigan signed by a number of the owners of land abutting upon Base Line Lake, located in Section 31 of the Township of Hamburg, County of Livingston and State of Michigan which petition purports to contain not less than 51% of the owners of land abutting upon such lake, which petition asks that action be taken by this Board to determine the normal height and level of the water of said Base Line Lake, and this petition having been considered by this Board, and in views of the provisions of Section 11.236 Michigan Statutes Annotated, and related statutes,

WHEREAS it appears that Base Line Lake is located partly in the County of Livingston and partly in the County of Washtenaw, and that the greater portion of said lake is located in Washtenaw County and it further appearing that the establishment of any control dam or embankment to control the normal height and levels of the waters of such lake would be constructed in Washtenaw County where the out-let of such lake is located,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Supervisors of Washtenaw County, Michigan, is hereby requested to direct the Prosecuting Attorney of Washtenaw County to institute appropriate proceedings under the statute in such case made and provided to determine the normal height and level of the waters of Base Line Lake, a portion of which is located in Sections 31 and 32 of Hamburg Township, Livingston County, Michigan.

The above resolution adopted at a regular meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Livingston County, Michigan, held at the Court House in the City of Howell on the 22nd day of March, 1956.
