MICHIGAN MIRROR

When the legislature returns to adjourn May 10-11, they will have an \$111 million budget to check. They have been deadlocked so much there has been little time to check details. Most of the checking will be on the 35 million building program mental health and public health. Their \$230 million budget is liable to cause trouble. This is \$41 million more than last year. If the tax collections fail to hold up the state will be in the red again.

114 new state police who just graduated are patrolling the highways. In addition 200 more recruits have started training.

Injured workers in factories will now receive more money per month. Single men \$33 to \$34 more and married men \$42 to \$57 for the rest of their lives if the disability is permanent.

Republicans are still looking for a candidate for governor with little success. Still Donald Leonard, beaten 2 years ago by Gov. Williams is industriously campaigning. Gov. Williams will be renominated by the Democrats unless he is put on the national ticket. In that case Lt. Gov. Phil Hart will get the nomination.

CURRENT COMMENT

The gyrations and antics over the location of a jet air base in northern Michigan has no diary. Two years have been spent in mass persuasion and wire pulling and the people are beginning to think that if time is so unimportant maybe the base is not needed at all.

The sight first chosen was Cadillac. In Congressman Ruth Thompson's district. For some reason she did not want it there but favored Manistee and squabble took place. While this was going on the war dept. suddenly announced it had selected Kalamazoo in Cong. Knox's district. Since then it has spent \$500,000 on it and had 8000 acres of state land donated to it. Last week the house at Washington voted to abandon Kalamazoo and locate the base at Manistee, letting the \$500,000 already spent at Kalamazoo go down drain. The chivilarous southern Congressmen said they did it to rescue a lady in distress. That Congressman Thompson had promised her district the air base and faced defeat if she did not deliver. The end is not yet as the senate has to ratify it. But the result of all this may be no jet base at all for Michigan.

President Eisenhower's manifesto that this country would intervene in the Holy Land to prevent aggression between Israel and Egypt. Arab has been interpreted several ways. Some regarded it as another Kor. ex and it was reported that U. S. troops have been shifted there from points in Europe. This was later denied. Others said it merely affirmed our pact with Great Britain and France to maintain peace in the far East. Things nearly reached a boiling point there last week owing to commando raids in each others territory by Israel and Egyptians. The latter raided a Jewish school last week and machine gunned a number of women and children in retaliation for a Jewish raid. The president is confident he can prevent war and has sent President Hammerfeld of the U. N. there to arrange a truce. Others do not share his confidence.

Evidently professional foot ball and base ball has not paid off so well in Detroit recently. It is said the sale of beer, hot dogs and peanuts is all that keeps them out of the red. Walter Briggs who owned the stadium named after him there died. As he had a large family it is necessary for the Briggs to sell the athletic stadium to settle the estate. His son, Spike, who has been managing it wanted it but could not raise the money. Then the Detroit Lions entered the picture but they could not finance it either. Now they want the City of Detroit to buy it and rent it to them. The cities in the following places own athletic stadiums: Cleveland, Milwaukee, Kansas City and Baltimore.

Alarmed by complaints about hypnotism the Wayne county prosecutor is investigating to see if it should be regulated. This started a few weeks ago when a girl who was hypnotized claimed to remember another life in Ireland hundreds of years ago when her name was Bridget Murphy. We always considered hypnotism a fake for the following reason. Years ago a student at the University of Michigan worked his way through the law dept. there by putting on hypnotic shows. He was at Dexter once. One of his stunts was to mesmerize a person, render him rigid and place his head on one chair and his heels on another and let 2 or 3 persons set on his stomach. He also did the driving act. His feature act was the second day when he mesmerized a boy member of his troupe and put him to sleep on a cot in a store window. Attempts were made to arouse him and a girl picked him with a hatpin with no apparent effect. At 8 p. m. he was carried to the opera house on the cot and awakened at the end of the show. Lucky got his law degree and started practice in Denver. He was very successful. Lawyers looked up his record and started a move to disbar him, claiming he used hypnotism on the jury. Lucky went on the stand, swore hypnotism was a fake and that he had never hypnotized anyone in his life.
