MICHIGAN MIRROR

Mich. Senior Citizens are subject for new appreciation. This was evident Michigan Week when they were encouraged to record on paper and tape their recollections of early days. This was announced by Roscoe Bonis, steel, regent of the University of Michigan and Lewis Beeson, secretary-treasurer of the Michigan Historical Society. They want to record facts of early statehood. Letters and dairies are excellent material. Anyone having these are asked to contact Michael Church, University of Michigan Extension Service. They will be published in the Michigan History, the commissions quarterly journal. Woodrow Wilson once said "History of a nation is a history of a small town written big."

Governor Williams is a master of the technique of taking quadruple advantage of a single opportunity. He usually picks qualified men for his appointments. Masonic Grand Lodge

At the Masonic grand lodge held in Detroit last Tuesday and Wednesday, Francis Dodge, Detroit attorney, well known here was elected grand master. Glen Alt, Ann Arbor, University of Michigan engineering professor was elected grand marshal on the 3rd ballot, the bottom rung of the ladder which leads to grand master in 7 years. He was one of 8 candidates. His chief competitors were Percy Williams of Detroit and Newton Bacon of Niles who will probably run again next year.

Grand lodge which approved about all measures presented in 1955 voted down most of them this year. Among the casualties were one to revise the blue book every year, raise the salaries of the secretary, treasurer, grand lecturer and tiler, review the bylaws of constituent lodges and provide for one ballot for any number of candidates for any degree instead of separate ballots. The first day Paul Strawhecker,



presented resolution to strike out the word hospital from the term "Masonic Home and Hospital". He contended the charter only of a Masonic Home and the infirmary there did not constitute a hospital. The amendment was Francis Dodge who presented it. The resolution carried all donations made out to the Masonic Home and Hospital would have to be returned, including the one from the Levine Bros. for \$100,000. The resolution lost. Strawhecker came right back with a motion to refer it to a 3 man committee for further study to report back next year. This carried. They approved issuing proficiency cards and raised the per diem for delegates and grand lodge officers from \$7 to \$9 a day. The 7c a mile was not changed.

The amendment to put Wayne, Oakland and Macomb county in one metropolitan district with concurrent jurisdiction lost 283 to 149. In Oakland 32 out of 34 lodges signed a petition against it and in Macomb 18 out of 20. The small lodges gave Macomb & Oakland big support. Wayne lodges wanted this as they claim the population has shifted to the outskirts of Detroit and over the county line, making Masonic material scarce in the vicinity of the Detroit Masonic temple.

The speaker at the banquet Tuesday night was George Bushnell, former supreme court justice and now Grand Sovereign 33rd Degree Masons of North America. A chorus 50 voices and a 12 piece orchestra, which included 5 harps, played and sang.

The Golden Book of Memories purchased by Livingston Lodge at a cost of \$500 and presented to the grand lodge was on a display in a large showcase in the lobby of the temple. The names of those making donations to the home are inscribed in it. Clare Miller acted as guard of it the first day.

Al. Liphart of Ann Arbor was appointed to the Masonic Service Commission.

Grand Lodge is in Detroit again next year.

THE COUNTY ROADS

The roads of the county have been allowed to get in very bad condition and repair attempts are way behind. At the May supervisors meeting the Iosco township residents presented a petition asking that County Engineer, Fred Rogers in charge of road work be removed from office. As it was a one day session, the matter was made a point of business for the June meeting and Mr. Rogers and the 3 county road commissioners, Ross Robb, Fowlerville, Fred Berry, Howell, Elbert Smith who lives near the Oakland county line were summoned to appear before the board and answer questions.

The rainy spring has had on the roads and the road engineers did get caught up on repairs. The road between here and Howell is so full of holes it is practically unsafe to drive on.

Saturday night we heard the removal movement had spread & there were now 80 petitions out all over the county asking the removal of Mr. Rogers.

Since the days of L.D. Kuhn of Gregory they have never had a man from the south part if the county on the road commission. We wanted Stanley Dinkel to run 2 years ago but Elbert Smith who retired and came out here from the city lives near South Lyon got the job. Mr. Rogers was in this office about a year after we wrote an article about the road.

He said the road commission had insufficient funds but what they got the extra gas tax money they would go right to town. They get the money but conditions are no better.

CURRENT COMMENT

Trust Ex President Harry Truman who is on a trip around the world to make the front pages. He did so with a vengeance last week when he is supposed to have said in Italy that the landing at Anzio Beachhead in World War II which resulted in big casualties was conceived by a few squirrel headed generals. This was spread over the front pages of the papers of the world and drew angry letters from Field Marshall Alexander head of the operation and Gen. Mark Clark, head of the American divisions. Truman at once repudiated the statement saying it was made by a news reporter with the party. President Eisenhower was appealed but declined to be pinned down. He said he and his staff did not favor the operation as it was carried out but it could not be classed as a failure as it caused large numbers of German troops to be sent from the west front to Germany.

The country was enlivened last week by a tussle between the army and the air corp in which Secretary of Defense Wilson was in the middle. The army is peeved because the air force has been getting more appropriations than the army and let loose a tirade against them. This feud has existed for years and was the cause of the court martial of Gen. Billy Mitchell who declared the army was obsolete. He was found guilty and ousted from the service. This did not change the views of the air force to any great extent who hailed Mitchell as a martyr and likened him to Gen. Dreyfus of France who was courtmartialled and ousted from the army for political reasons. He performed testimony. The Detroit Free Press remarks the Pentagon has evolved a new system of warfare. They fight the air corp and the scientists fight the Russians.

Layoffs are still continuing in the auto industry & the list of unemployed has climbed to 200,000. The Gen. Motors, Ford and Chrysler announce further layoffs and other factories are on a 1 day week. The government has promised to channel some \$75,000,000 in defense contracts to Michigan but they will not be available until next year. So unless there is a jump in production there is liable to be considerable unemployment around election time. In the past the party in power has always had to take the blame for this. Farm prices will probably be down as congress refused to let the president make advance soil bank payments on land taken out of production.

Mayor Cobo has been a successful mayor of the Detroit because he got things done, slum clearance, civic centers, expressways and converting the street cars to busses. However in our opinion he lacks one essential, the human touch. Gov. Williams excels in this. He has twice visited functions of the Pinckney Masons, called square dances at Howell and Stockbridge and other places in the vicinity. Also attended Masonic degree work at Ann Arbor in April. Mayor Cobo is also a Mason. At the big Masonic convention it is customary for the mayor in whose city it is held to give the welcome address. This is given in closed lodge. In some instances where the mayor is of the Catholic faith he sends another city official who is a Mason. Three times since Cobo has been mayor grand lodge has been in Detroit. 2 times city Clerk Ledbetter gave the welcome address and last year Police Comm. Piggins. This year Cobo did not come himself or send anyone and for the first time in the history of grand lodge there was no welcome address.

Michigan has taken the lead in tornado relief. They have gotten together an emergency task force and functioned in the recent disaster. Civil Defense Director Griffin and Mayor Cobo of Detroit have both appealed to Washington for relief and were told it would be considered.

Masonic Grand Lodge

At the Masonic grand lodge held in Detroit last Tuesday and Wednesday, Francis Dodge, Detroit attorney, well known here was elected grand master. Glen Alt, Ann Arbor, University of Michigan engineering professor was elected grand marshal on the 3rd ballot, the bottom rung of the ladder which leads to grand master in 7 years. He was one of 8 candidates. His chief competitors were Percy Williams of Detroit and Newton Bacon of Niles who will probably run again next year.

Grand lodge which approved about all measures presented in 1955 voted down most of them this year. Among the casualties were one to revise the blue book every year, raise the salaries of the secretary, treasurer, grand lecturer and tiler, review the bylaws of constituent lodges and provide for one ballot for any number of candidates for any degree instead of separate ballots. The first day Paul Strawhecker,



presented resolution to strike out the word hospital from the term "Masonic Home and Hospital". He contended the charter only said "Masonic Home and the infirmary" there did not constitute a hospital. The amendment was Francis Dodge who presented it. The resolution carried all donations made out to the Masonic Home and Hospital would have to be returned, including the one from the Levine Bros. for \$100,000. The resolution lost. Strawhecker came right back with a motion to refer it to a 3 man committee for further study to report back next year. This carried. They approved issuing proficiency cards and raised the per diem for delegates and grand lodge officers from \$7 to \$9 a day. The 7c a mile was not changed.

The amendment to put Wayne, Oakland and Macomb county in one metropolitan district with concurrent jurisdiction lost 283 to 140. In Oakland 32 out of 34 lodges signed a petition against it and in Macomb 18 out of 20. The small lodges gave Macomb & Oakland big support. Wayne lodges wanted this as they claim the population has shifted to the outskirts of Detroit and over the county line, making Masonic material scarce in the vicinity of the Detroit Masonic temple.

The speaker at the banquet Tuesday night was George Bushnell, former supreme court justice and now Grand Sovereign 33rd Degree Masons of North America. A chorus of 50 voices and a 12 piece orchestra, which included 5 harps, played and sang.

The Golden Book of Memories purchased by Livingston Lodge at a cost of \$500 and presented to the grand lodge was on a display in a large showcase in the lobby of the temple. The names of those making donations to the home are inscribed in it. Clare Miller acted as guard of the first day.

Al. Liphart of Ann Arbor was appointed to the Masonic Service Commission. Grand Lodge is in Detroit again next year.

CURRENT COMMENT

Trust Ex President Harry Truman who is on a trip around the world to make the front pages. He did so with a vengeance last week when he is supposed to have said in Italy that the landing at Anzio Beachhead in World War II which resulted in big casualties was conceived by a few squirrel headed generals. This was spread over the front pages of the papers of the world and drew angry reports from Field Marshall Alexander head of the operation and Gen. Mark Clark, head of the American divisions. Truman at once repudiated the statement saying it was made by a news reporter with the party. President Eisenhower was appealed but declined to be pinned down. He said he and his staff did not favor the operation as it was carried out but it could not be classed as a failure as it caused large numbers of German troops to be sent from the west front to Germany.

The country was enlivened last week by a tussle between the army and the air corp in which Secretary of Defense Wilson was in the middle. The army is peeved because the air force has been getting more appropriations than the army and let loose a tirade against them. This feud has existed for years and was the cause of the court martial of Gen. Billy Mitchell who declared the army was obsolete. He was found guilty and ousted from the service. This did not change the views of the air force to any great extent who hailed Mitchell as a martyr and likened him to Gen. Dreyfus of France who was courtmartialled and ousted from the army for political reasons. On perjured testimony. The Detroit Free Press remarks the Pentagon has evolved a new system of warfare. They fight the air corp and the scientists fight the Russians.

Layoffs are still continuing in the auto industry & the list of unemployed has climbed to 200,000. The Gen. Motors, Ford and Chrysler announce further layoffs and other factories are on a 4 day week. The government has promised to channel some \$75,000,000 in defense contracts to Michigan but they will not be available until next year. So unless there is a jump in production there is liable to be considerable unemployment around election time. In the past the party in power has always had to take the blame for this. Farm prices will probably be down as congress refused to let the president make advance soil bank payments on land taken out of production.

Mayor Cobo has been a successful mayor of the Detroit because he got things done, slum clearance, civic centers, expressways and converting the street cars to buses. However in our opinion he lacks one essential, the human touch. Gov. Williams excels in this. He has twice visited functions of the Pinckney Masons, called square dances at Howell and Stockbridge and other places in the vicinity. Also attended Masonic degree work at Ann Arbor in April. Mayor Cobo is also a Mason. At the big Masonic convention it is customary for the mayor in whose city it is held to give the welcome address. This is given in closed lodge. In some instances where the mayor is of the Catholic faith he sends another city official who is a Mason. Three times since Cobo has been mayor grand lodge has been in Detroit. 2 times City Clerk Ledbetter gave the welcome address and last year Police Com. Piggins. This year Cobo did not come himself or send anyone and for the first time in the history of grand lodge there was no welcome address.
