MICHIGAN MIRROR

A survey is being made of Michigan colleges to provide a basis for future legislation and help legislators aid existing colleges and indicate how many more colleges are needed. The state pays \$75,000 and the Kellogg Foundation \$75,000. Dr. John Russell of Santa Fe, New Mexico is director. It will not be finished until 1958. There is much opposition to a new medical school until all the state needs are ascertained. Dr. Russell has made such surveys in Ohio, Kentucky, Florida and Indiana. The one thing he has found in general is that teaching salaries are too low.

Growth in colleges the next 15 years will be tremendous. For instance Ohio State will grow from 22,000 to 80,000. He favors decentralizing educational units and starting colleges in local communities.

A bumper apple crop of 85 million bushels is expected this year.

Five million more visitors are expected in Michigan this year. The Mackinac Bridge is credited with part of this increase. 75 events are scheduled for Michigan in June ranging from a water carnival to a music festival.

To promote greater safety 500,000 "Summer Safety Pledges" have been distributed to school children. Last year 140 children were killed in traffic and 4,499 injured.

The Michigan Dairy Ass'n. will present a silver dollar to all restaurant personal who suggest milk to their patrons during June, Dairy month.

The Michigan Council of Churches is organizing to fight legal bingo to be voted on in Nov. They say it exposes the state to the same dangers as the one defeated in 1954.

MUSCULAR DYSTROPHY AID

We have received a letter from Ralph Filkins 53, of Howell who has been a muscular dystrophy victim 22 years. He has been confined to a wheel chair the last 2 years.

In 1954 an amendment to the Social Security law was introduced in congress entitling persons 50 years of age to the benefits of this law who were totally disabled. It passed the house but not the senate. The same bill was introduced again this year, passed the house but lost in the senate. It was reconsidered and sent to a conference committee. Under the bill a person who paid 3 percent on a \$4200.00 income for 6 quarters is fully insured. Filkins has paid this tax through 27 quarters by sale of magazine subscriptions and Christmas cards, and if the bill passes would receive \$162.80 a month. He feels he should get this aid. What do you think about it?

CURRENT COMMENT

The presidents condition is still front page news but he is not getting as much space as formerly. He has been vein fed but Friday took some nourishment through his mouth. So far there has been no mention of the removal of the tube leading through his nose to his stomach. The consensus of opinion is that he will run for a second term. He is a soldier, accustomed to face death in battle considers his life expendable. The pressure is tremendous and they have appealed to his patriotism and impressed him with the fact that without him heading the Republican ticket his party faces certain defeat and that all that he stands for and has gained will be lost. They also point out that the old Taft followers, McCarthy, Bricker and Dickinson element of the party from whom he wrested control might take over again in the chaos that would ensue if he declined to run again. More medical authorities have been quoted by the press. Most are optimistic but a few say there is danger of more insinual attacks. In 1912 the Republicans renominated James Sherman for vice president who was a sick man. He died before the election and the national committee replaced him with Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University. Bill Taft was the candidate for president and both he and Butler lost.

Judge Mike Carland of this district handed down a far reaching decision in circuit court last week. In 1932 Michael Bodary married a widow, Mrs. Anna Lowery with a daughter, Thelma. She died. He married Thelma. They did not get along and he sued for divorce. Judge Carland annulled the marriage, ruling that a marriage between father and step daughter was illegal. There have been a number of such marriages in the state and in some cases there are children. We wonder just what their status is now? Marriages of first cousins is also illegal in Michigan but take place, the participants going to states which allow them for the ceremony. So far as we know none of Judge Mike Carland's decisions have ever been reversed. Two years ago he got state wide attention when he ruled a qualifying oath for candidates who file for the primary unconstitutional. Under this law the county election commission had ruled all the Democrat ticket and 4 Republicans off the ballot. The Republican attorney general announced he would appeal the decision to the supreme court. He never did. Judge Carland's ruling still stands.

The postal rate increase bill has been killed in committee in Washington and there is little likelihood of it being acted on. A poll there showed a big majority against it. A 400 million dollar increase would not have put the dept. out if the red as the deficit is \$470 million. The increases would raise 3 cent letter postage to 4 cents, air mail from 6c to 7c. There would have been slight increases in second and third class mail. Nothing was said about the tons of junk mail sent out by senators, congressmen and all others government employees free. Nine tenths of which goes in the waste basket. The postal dept. has never been out of the red to my knowledge. Most people regard it as a public service, the same as the police and fire dept. to be paid for by them. Nothing much will be done until the free mail privileges of government employees is curbed.

75,000 migrant workers mostly from Mexico will shortly come to this state to harvest seasonal crops, such as cherries, strawberries, raspberries, apples, grapes, onions etc. They get from 6 to \$7 a day. One would think from the large number of unemployed there would be no need for these workers but people here will not work for this money. They are recruited by contractors and no one below the age of 14 is allowed to work. The employers have to furnish them housing. This was wretched at first being mostly tents with no sanitary facilities but the board of health stepped in and the conditions are much improved.
