MICHIGAN MIRROR

No matter how many schools are built, the birth rate always seems to stay a jump ahead of them. Michigan had her largest school registration in history this month when approximately 1,454 children registered in Sept. in the elementary and secondary grades. Some 2,200 additional teachers and 2,000 new classrooms were utilized to take care of this 70,000 pupil increase.

Michigan schools added more than \$100 million dollars worth of classrooms, additions and buildings to additional facilities. Most of the teaching facilities were filled but in most cases the schools had to pay higher salaries. Schools in urban districts had to pay \$4,000 & most all \$3,500. Salaries in other states are about the same. Not all teachers met the standard qualifications as many special permits were issued.

The earliest war babies that followed the birth boom after World War II are now in the first and second grades. The birth increase is expected to continue for a number of years yet. Some 117,000 high school graduates will enroll in Michigan colleges this month.

Michigan sportsmen meet at Multi Lake Ass'n., Walled Lake Sept. 22, 23 to test their skill in bait and fly casting. Also archery. This is sponsored by the Detroit Times.

Skeptics who fear the Mackinac Bridge is not strong enough to withstand wind velocity are reassured by Dr. Stedman, the designer. He says it will withstand winds of 90 miles an hour. Winds there are 100 miles an hour.

CONSERVATION DEPT.

\$372,000 worth of lumber was sold by state of Michigan last year from its state forests, \$81,000 worth more than in 1954. In 1941 only \$7,000 worth was sold.

Deer hunting information folders are now available from the conservation office.

997,000 fishing licenses were sold so far in the state this year. 2 percent less than last year.

The conservation dept. approved the purchase of 498 acres of hunting land Sept. 1. Mostly in northern Michigan.

The commission's wild goose trapping project resulted in 45 geese being trapped, banded and released in the Seney Refuge in Schoolcraft county. Only 11 were goslings.

Michigan forest fires are 65 percent less than in 1955. Only 2 fires reported last week.

In their opening game of the football season here Friday night the local Pirates lost to the Saline Hornets 7 to 6. Saline opened the scoring in the 4th quarter with about 4 minutes left when Dick Lehtonen took a Pinckney punt on his own 30 yard line and behind beautiful blocking and some good side stepping went 70 yards for a touchdown. The extra point was made on a pass from Wagner to Myers.

In the 2nd quarter the Pirates began a march which carried them to the Saline one inch line before they were stopped on 4th down by the Saline line. Score at half Saline 7, Pinckney 0.

In the 3d quarter the Pirates once again started a march which took them to the Saline one yard line. With 3rd down on the 3 yard line Boh Kelly, Pinckney was thrown for a 13 yard loss. With 4th down on the 16 yard line, Pete Gerycz took pass from Davy Burns but knocked out of bounds on the one foot line and Saline again took over on downs.

Saline carried the ball to their 37 yard line. Here big Tom Radey of Pinckney blocked Wagner's punt on the 30 yard line and Len Kitchen recovered for Pinckney. On the first play Davy Burns of the Pirates ran 70 yards for a touchdown, not a yard was laid on him. The extra point try failed as there was a mix up in the Pinckney backfield and the ball was fumbled. Final score was Saline 7, Pinckney 6.

Pinckney plays Boy's Vocational school at Lansing at 2:30 p.m., Sept. 21. The next week they play Dexter here.

Current Comment

The Chelsea Standard last week commented on what it calls lack of respect for the United States Supreme Court. This it claims is evidenced at the recent American meeting at Dallas, Texas when a body only voted 118 to 101 to comply with the recent supreme court desegregation decision. It claims it only voted compliance as a matter of principle. It raps the supreme court which it says is made up of political appointees most of whom have had no judicial experience. As a result the court has moved over to the left. The members of supreme court have always been pointed. They have been under a before and weathered the decision. What about the Dred Scott decision? Mr. Dooley once said the supreme court follows the election returns. What he meant was the presidents appoint men of their viewpoint. From the civil war to 18 the Republicans were in power and the judges appointed were all conservatives. Then Woodrow Wilson was elected and appointed liberal judges. Brandeis, a noted liberal. Then the Republicans were in power 12 years and appointed more conservative judges. During Franklin Roosevelt and Harry Trumans term they completely remade the court. Eisenhower appointed more liberals and one them Chief Justice Warren wrote controversial desegregation decisions. We do not see how they could have ruled otherwise. The 14th amendment made the negroes citizens and gave them all the rights of citizens. David Lawrence in an article as the 14th amendments was put of idealy because the white vote of the south were disenfranchised at the time. This is the bunk. If the supreme court should overturn would that make the negroes slaves again.

Editor John Knight in the Detroit Free Press says there is very little difference in the platforms of the 2 parties. Both are liberals and way the 1st. Herbert Hoover's defeat in 1932 was the death knell of the Republican conservatives who had ruled the party since 1917. After Franklin Roosevelt's years of control they picked General Eisenhower as their candidate. Each he had trouble deciding whether he was a Republican or Democrat. The latter a liberal at once adopted the Democratic principles such as social security, old age pensions, federal aid to schools and highways and foreign aid which Republicans still oppose which he was able to pull over by a Democrat votes. In 1936 all the measures, including social security were chused by the Republicans. Rank socialism.

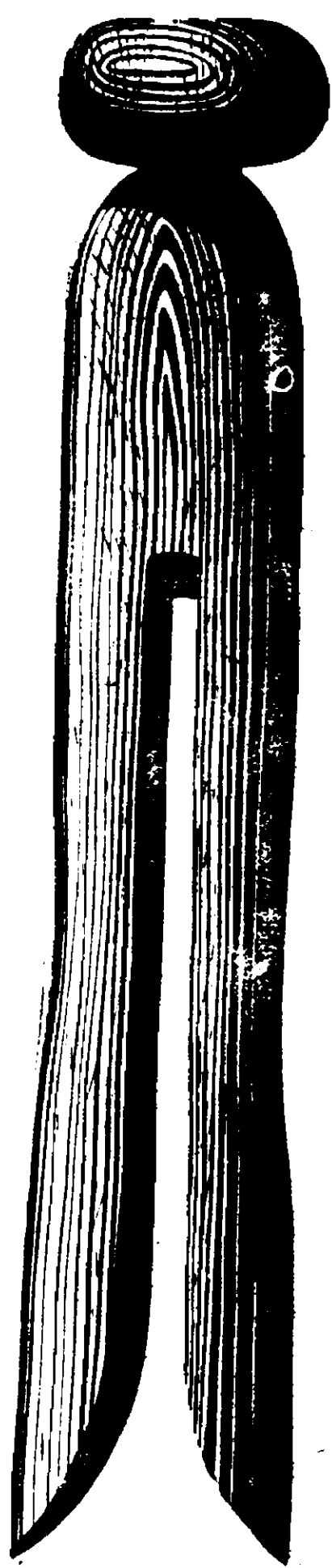
President Eisenhower held a conference of Republican state chairmen, the press called them "the elite" at his Gettysburg farm last week. Coming right after the election it was decided to adopt a old Spanish American War slogan "Remember the Maine" with the left out. President Eisenhower's defeat to complacency and urged extra efforts to get the stay-at-home vote out. Now wise men have been working on this problem for years and it seems impossible to get 50 percent of the people to vote. 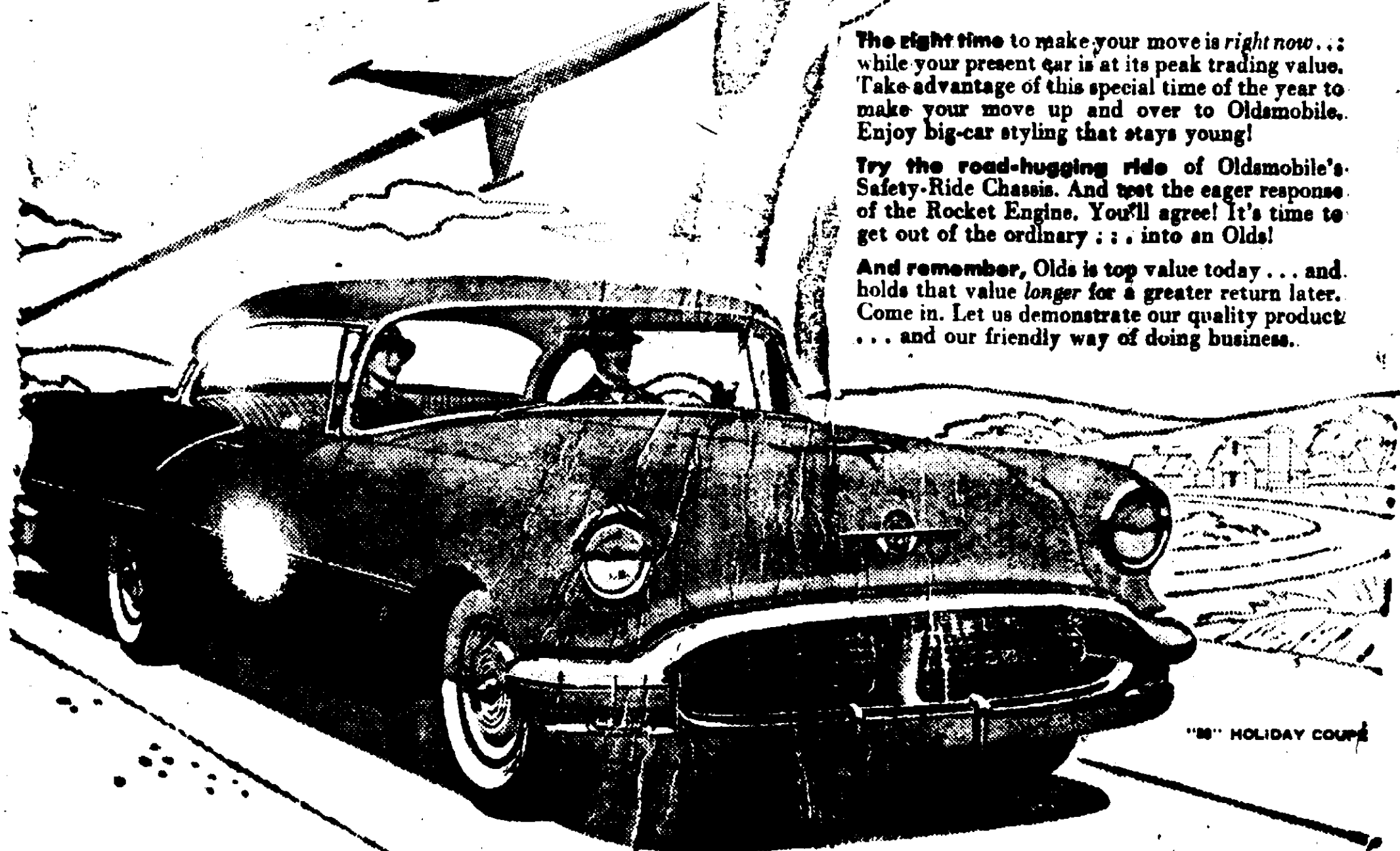

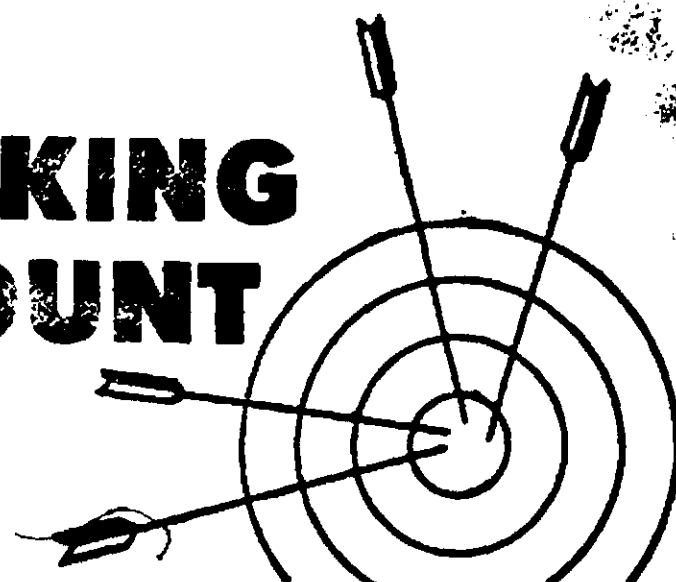
