MICHIGAN MIRROR

The little voter is a mighty big man. Both parties believe their success is to get out vote. Republicans hope to hold their outstate vote of 2 years ago and get a bigger vote in Wayne county if a million new voters are registered they expect to get half of them. The Democrats expect to continue their gains outstate and say 100,000 new voters will be registered, mostly in industrial areas and they will get most of them. A new minority group has started a campaign to better their situation. They are the Indians. There are 18,000 in state. PINCKNEY DEFEATS DEXTER 26-6 IN LEAGUE OPENER

On Friday night the Pinckney Pirates opened their League of the Lakes season by defeating arch-rival Dexter 26 to 6. The game, which was played in 50 degree weather was dominated by Dexter in the first half and Pinckney in the second.

The game got off to a slow start in the first quarter with teams exchanging punts. Then in the second quarter Dexter, driven deep into its own territory by a Pirate punt attempted to pass and Donald Clark, a sophomore, playing his first game of football picked off a Dreadnaught pass on the 10 yard line and went in unopposed for a touchdown. Gene Hill then ran the right end for the extra point making it Pinckney 7-0. Dexter bounded right back and marched 70 yards for a touchdown with Jim Delanois going over from the 6 yard line. This ended the first half scoring.

In the second half Pinckney playing once again like a revitalized team took the opening kick-off and marched 55 yards for a touchdown with Dave Burns going the final five on an off-tackle play. The next time the Pirates got their hands on the ball when they recovered a Dreadnaught fumble. They immediately set to work and Dave Burns passed to Gene Hill for 22 yards and a touchdown. Tom Wylie snuck over from the two for the extra point and Pinckney led 20 to 6 at the end of the 3rd quarter. Their final score came in the 4th quarter as Jim McCleer smashed over from the 2 1/2 yard line. This week the Pirates will be out for their second league victory when they meet Boysville at Pinckney.

SENATOR McNAMARA HERE THURSDAY

United States Senator Patrick J. McNamara of Detroit will talk at the Pinckney school at a Democrat Rally on Thursday night of this week, October 4. This will be the first occasion on which Pinckney has been honored by the presence of a United States Senator. In the old days they had no occasion to as they were elected by the legislature in contests in which money and influence played a big part.

The primary system of nominations were instituted about 1912. Since then the senators have been Charles Townsend, Woodbridge N. Ferris, Truman Newberry, James Couzens, Prentiss Brown, Charles Potter, Homer Ferguson. Ferris spoke here but that was before he became senator and he was on a lecture course program.

Senator McNamara's rise reads like a Horatio Alger story. He became head of the steam fitters union and was elected to the Detroit City Council. He was given little chance of beating Senator Ferguson 2 years ago but surprised everyone by doing so. His wife is a school teacher and he has a married son.

His career as a senator has been spectacular. Congressman Hayworth will also be here and the county candidates.

The Boy Scout Drive

Lawrence E. Baughn announced today that he has accepted the Chairmanship of the Local Drive for Boy Scout Funds. Mr. Baughn will organize the Pinckney Community Committee, October 3 with the Drive Kick-Off October 15, 1956.

The Boy Scout Unit and Cub Scout Unit is sponsored by the Pinckney Kiwanis Club. 63 Boy Scouts and Explorer Scouts are registered in the Boy Scout Troop No. 58, Keith Koch, Scoutmaster. 30 Cub Scouts are registered in the Cub Scout Pack No. 58, John C. Walton, Cubmaster. 37 adults are registered in these units either as members of the Unit Committee or in leadership capacity.

The Scout Units in Pinckney are a part of the Livingston District of the Portage Trails Council, Boy Scouts of America. The Livingston District is one of three districts in the Portage Trails Council and exists to help local units by providing the cooperative efforts of all institutions sponsoring the Scouting Program in Training leadership, advancement, camping and activities, health and safety—organization and extension of the program to all boys, and finance.

Mr. Francis Martin, Howell, is the District Finance Chairman of the Livingston District. The Livingston District Finance Committee has set a goal of \$6300.00 to be raised in the communities concerned in the County.

Mr. Baughn, in setting the drive, the Pinckney Area is determining lead a drive that will provide necessary funds to carry on this worthwhile program in the Community. Mr. Baughn states, "The same interested volunteers, who provide so many services to Scouting through their own time and effort secure funds through Boy Scout finance campaigns. Thus large numbers of citizens have the opportunity to have a part in supporting this character-building, citizenship-training program. In giving to the Portage Trails Council Budget we know that we are not subsidizing boys or undermining their independence and self-reliance, but that we are supporting a program to help boys to help themselves."

Current Comment


Becky Harris has resigned after 8 years as manager of the Detroit Tigers. He sort of beat the bell as he was sure to be replaced by the new owners. We never could figure out why he was hired in the first place. He had been around a long time, did 2 stretches at Washington, one each at New York and Boston. This was his second term at Detroit. Aside from his first term at Washington when he played second base and won 2 pennants his success has not been spectacular. He won a pennant at New York but quit when he could not get a 3 year contract. At Washington he had Walter Johnson, one of the all time greats as pitcher. Just why Detroit has languished in the second division all the year is a mystery. They have one of the best catchers in the league, all 300 hitters, the best shortstop, one of the best third basemen and a fair to middling second baseman. And a pitchers who have each won around 20 games. New York who won the pennant did not have a single win a winner. They have lacked vital spark and have lost more by one run than any team in the league. Maybe a new manager will supply the needed incentive.

The battle on desegregation still rages in the south. In Alabama six Parent-Teacher organizations have withdrawn from the national organization because it came out in favor of desegregation. In Virginia the legislature has passed the question. The Stanley law named after the governor. Previously the Gray bill had been presented. This would have provided a sort of local option and let each district decide on whether they wanted segregated or desegregated schools. This was shelved and the Stanley substituted. It defines the word efficient schools in the state constitution as demanding segregated schools and order state funds withheld from all desegregated schools and gave the governor power to intervene and assign pupils to segregated and desegregated schools. This gives the governor the supreme power. It flaunts the chance of being overruled by the United States Supreme Court.

For some years there have been complaints to the effect that the different election products in the state were not appointing balanced election boards as the law provides. The law reads that both parties, must be represented on the board. As far as we know this has always been done here but not in some heavily Democratic or Republican precincts. To enforce this law the last legislature passed a law that members of election boards must declare their party affiliations. Attorney General Kav. Kavanagh has just handed down an opinion that this bars independents from election boards as there is no Independent party. This rather throws a monkey wrench in the machinery as about one third of the voters are classed as independents.

In a speech on the Pacific coast decision, it runs a last week Vice Pres. Nixon who heads the Republican campaign speakers came out for a 4 day work week. Walter Reuther, head of the C. I. O. and has long advocated such week, 4 days work for 5 days pay, at once wired Nixon for details and likewise President Eisenhower asking if he approved of a 4 day week. So far he has received no replies. The plan has been advocated before to relieve unemployment but it always seemed to us like cutting off the limb you were setting on. Carried to a conclusion if unemployment increased the work week could be cut to 3 days, then 2 and even 1. We do not think this would afford a living wage.

The Democrats charge the president's soil bank plan for which payments are expected before the November election. It is becoming a racket. For allowing 10 acres to lay idle a farmer can draw about \$250. It is charged that it is possible to collect this on swamp land, waste land and land that has never been in production. The average farmer cannot allow his land to lay idle. Consequently the farmers with hundreds and thousands of acres are reaping the benefits. According to the bulletin we received 150 farmers in this county signed up for soil conservation benefits.







Fall color tours are now in order as autumn brings gorgeous hues to the trees and shrubs throughout Michigan. Robert Furlong, director of the State Tourist Council urges Michigan residents to see their state at its best. If you plan a tour write him at the tourist office, Lansing and he will tell you when the area you plan to visit is at its best.

When ye editor was on the road some 10 years ago he started the campaign to get the lights on the high school field here. He also voted to locate the grounds that would attend the games. 1500 attended the recent game here and better than were at each the Saline and Boylston games. The biggest trouble with the grounds is the lack of parking space for cars. The grounds are used and the new lights. There is no supervision of the cars are parked every which way. The result is that when the game ends and they make a rush for the lights. After the game 4 cars were in wrecks and the Boysville game a woman was knocked down and had her arm broken. Supervised parking would solve some of this. If the lights were on the elementary school there would be plenty of parking without using the highway. It may have to be solved here yet.

It seems that every so often some tragedy takes place in spite of all the safety laws passed to protect them. We can remember a lot of them and most of these tragedies were due to carelessness and refusal to follow the letter of the law. Last Wednesday the new Consumers Union building at Jackson under construction collapsed killing 10 people and injuring over 20 more. The building was a 4 story steel and concrete and supposed to be so carefully constructed that it would withstand bomb shocks. Prof. Glenn Alt of the University of Michigan who is well known here is one of the state investigators together with engineering professors from Michigan State and Wayne University. They have taken samples of the concrete for laboratory analysis. Among the injured is Richard Hines, an apprentice electrician who was on the third floor and fell from the third floor to the basement where he was buried under concrete. He managed to get out. His father was an electrician here some years ago and is member of Livingston Lodge. With his son he called on ye editor in August. Richard is in State hospital with a fractured skull.
