50th Anniversary

OBSERVE 50th ANNIVERSARY

On Sunday, October 22, Mr. and Mrs. Ross T. Read will observe their 50th wedding anniversary with an open house at their home from two to five p. m. with everybody welcome.

Mr. and Mrs. Read were married on October 24, 1906 by Rev. George Mylne at Pinckney and moved into their present home a year later.

In 1902 Mr. Read became associated with his father, the late Thomas Read in the lumber and building supply business which the latter established in 1885.

Upon the death of Thomas Read in 1925 Fred Read joined his brother in a partnership known as Thomas Read's Sons which still continues.

Robert and Howard Read, sons of Fred and Ross, respectively, are now active in the business which is in its 71st year and the oldest in this area.

Mr. Read has been active in civic and public affairs of the community having served in the village, township and school offices and is a former chairman of the Livingston Republican County Committee.

He is a past master and life member of the local Masonic lodge.

Mrs. Read, the former Sadie Burckel, was born in Bleinham, Ontario and moved with her parents to Pinckney in 1904. The couple have two children, Russell of Pittsburg and Howard of Pinckney. Two other children, Erma and Allan, died a number of years ago. There are 7 grandchildren.

Friday night the Pinckney Pirates won their third league game from the Hartland Eagles 20 to 6. Pinckney dominated the game out-gaining Hartland 244 to 76. This stages the way for the showdown game Friday with unbeaten Mancheser there. The winner will be favored to take the league title.

In the Hartland game Coach Reader started his second team line and they played good ball holding Hartland to a gain of 6 yds. the first quarter. In the second quarter the first team line and backfield went in and the Pirates opened the scoring with Dave Burns scoring from the 4 yd. line after a 48 yd. march in 6 plays. They failed to run the extra point. Hartland was forced to punt and Dave Burns ran the kick back 46 yds. only to have it nullified by a clipping penalty to the Pinckney 18. They gained a yd. through the line and then Jim McCleer ran 71 yds. to the Hartland 10 where he went out of bounds. Here Dave Burns threw a 10 yd. touchdown pass to Gene Hill. Alvin Simonson ran the extra point. Score at half Pinckney 13, Hartland 0.

The Pirates could not get started the third quarter. Gene Hill went back to kick. The pass from center was bad and he had to fall on the ball of the 1 yd. line. Two plays later Lar Simmons went over for the Hartland touchdown and Pinckney still led 13 to 6.

The last play the third quarter, a 14 yd. pass from Gene Hill to Dennis Clark put the ball on the Hartland 40 yard line. A penalty set back to the 6 yd. line. Dave Burns picked up 4 yards and then went over from the 2 yd. line. Alvin Simonson ran extra points. Final score Pinckney 20, Hartland 6. The Manchester game starts at 7:30 p. m.

DECLINES INVITATION

At the annual meeting of the Livingston County Farm Bureau, the county candidates of both parties were invited to appear and state their qualifications. Most of them did and quite an argument developed on the fee system of paying the register of deeds who drew \$17,000 last year and the so called speed trap in Genoa township where a justice of peace has been drawing \$1000 a month in traffic violations fees. Martin Lavan, Democrat county chairman suggested another meeting between the candidates of both parties before the November election at which the candidates could discuss their qualifications and that it be sponsored by a civic group.

Harold Borden, Rep. county chairman has turned down the invitation. He says there is insufficient time to find a sponsor and advertise such a meeting before the election out that it might be possible in 1958.

SAYS HE WAS SMEARED

We have received a letter from Stanley Poviak, Genoa Justice condemning an article appearing in the county papers last week relating to a meeting of the Livingston County Bar Ass'n. condemning his office as a speed trap and alleging he was collecting \$1000 a month in fees from traffic violators and announcing an investigation. He says the decision was arrived at without evidence to back it up and he was not given a chance to defend himself. That he will welcome an investigation. He calls on the bar association to retract their accusation.

The Dispatch did not publish the bar ass'n. article as it arrived too late. Mr. Poviak is a former member of the state police living in Genoa. It is also charged he has been getting into the justice business in the country.

Regular meeting of Pinckney school held at the high school 7:30 p. m. Oct. 11, 1956.

Called to order by President Thayer. Present: Thayer, Russell, McAfee, Kennedy, Bonner. Absent none. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

Request of Missionary Group to hold services in elementary school denied because of conflict with established policy.

Report received from supt. of the schools that our system lacks four teachers and that unless the staff is completed we will not be accredited by University of Michigan and will lose a portion of state aid funds.

Motion by Bonner supported by Kennedy that superintendent be empowered to employ the required teachers even if it is necessary to exceed the present salary schedule.

Ayes: all. Noes none. Carried.

Motion by Bonner supported by Kennedy that Asst. Supt. be authorized to sign contract for fuel oil with company submitting the lowest bid. Ayes: all. Noes None. Carried.

Motion by Kennedy, supported by Russell that High School Principal be paid \$500.00 extra this year because some work is done after regular school hours.

Ayes: Kennedy, Russell, McAfee. Not Voting: Thayer, Bonner. Motion Carried.

NOTICE SCHOOL DISTRICT BOUNDARY ALTERATION

The Livingston County Board of Education and the Washtenaw County Board of Education will hold a joint meeting at the High School on October 26, 1956 at 8 p. m. to consider altering the school district boundaries as follows: To transfer from Putnam 1 to the Ticks School District to the Pinckney Community School District Livingston and Washtenaw counties the property described as follows:

Putnam Township-- Commencing forty (40) feet north of the North east corner of Lot 85 of the plat of "Swarthout's Cove No. 1" as recorded in Liber 2 of Plats on page 95, Livingston County Records; thence north 80 feet on Putnam-Hamburg Township Line, thence west at right angles 80 feet; thence south 80 ft. to north line of street; thence east along north line of street 80 feet to point of beginning; being a parcel of land in the SE 1/4 of the SE 1/4 of Section 25, Township 1 North Range (4) East.

A part of the Northeast quarter (1-4) of the Southeast quarter (1-4) of Section twenty-five (25) in Town one (1) North Range four (4) East, Michigan and described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the East line of said section and the north line of highway thence West ten (10) rods; thence north thirty-two (32) rods; thence east ten (10) rods; thence South thirty-two (32) rods to the place of beginning and containing two (2) acres of land more or less.

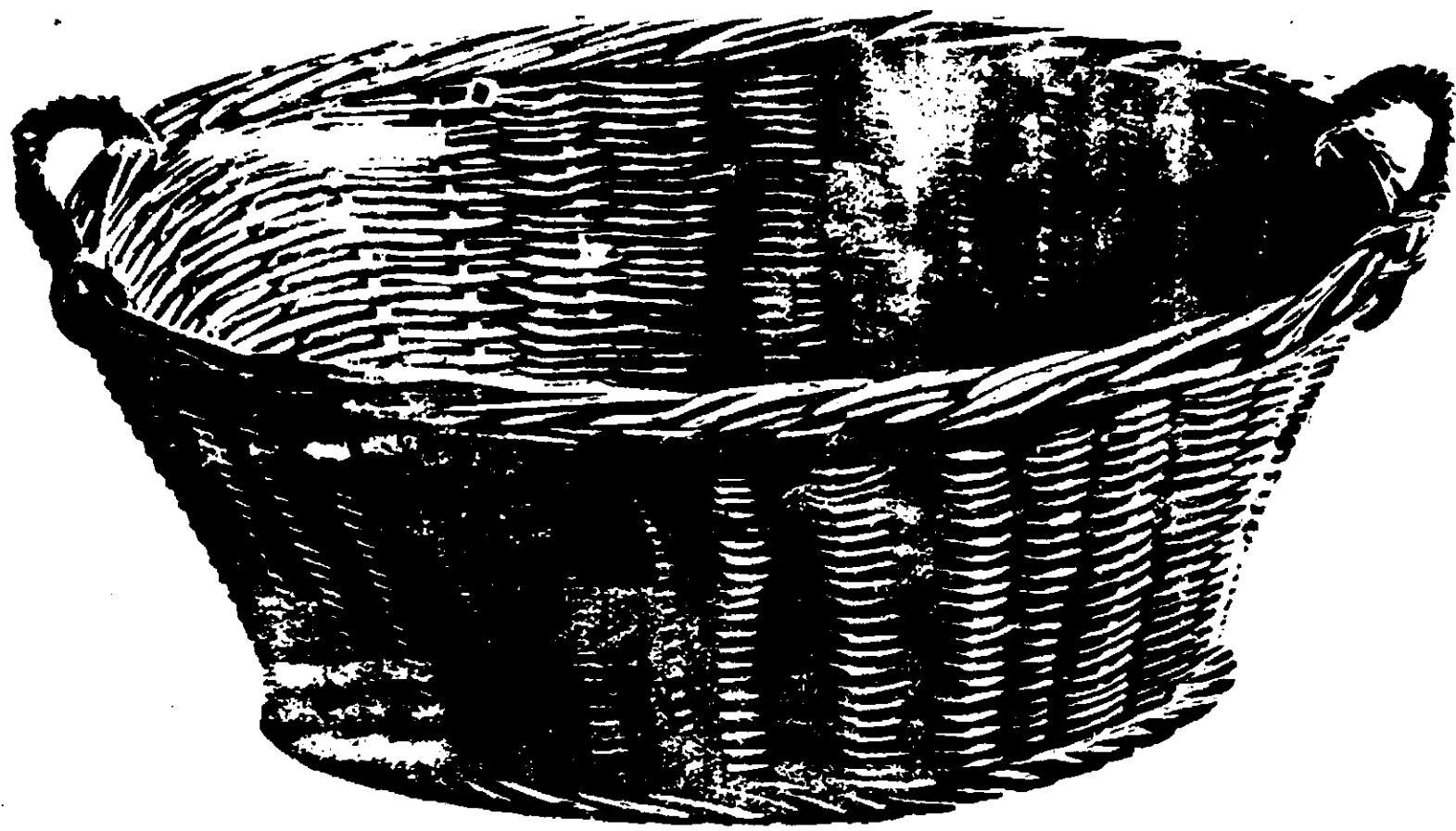

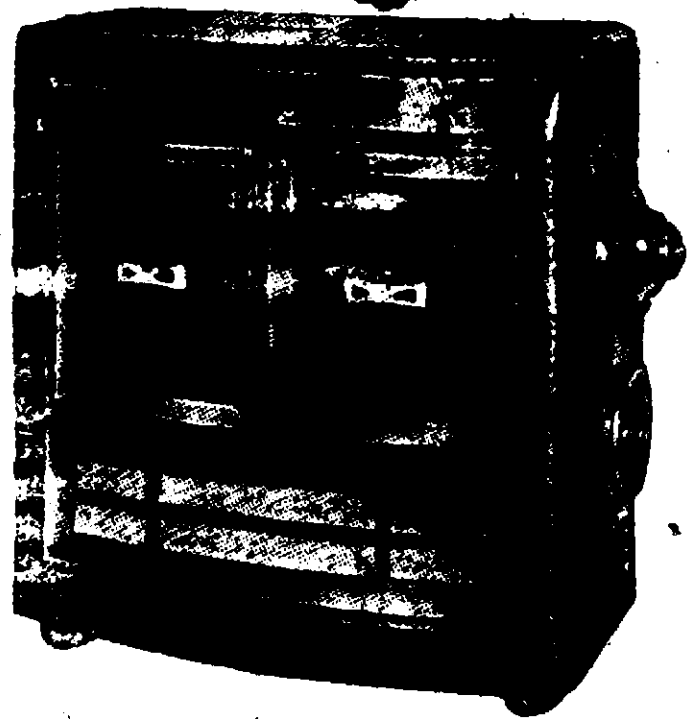

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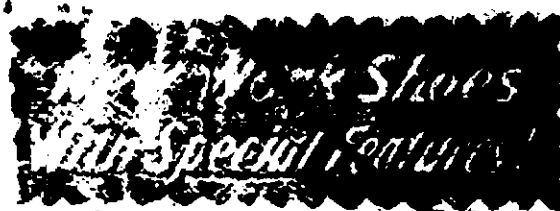
