Hunters are finding plenty of grey squirrels but the supply in northern Michigan is apt to be small next year as the acorn crop failed.

The dept. reminds hunters it is un-legal to smoke raccoons out of their dens.

Fewer birds and more hunters is the report on pheasant season. The sky ground has made it impossible for dogs track them.

Special permits for the any deer season are being mailed out. Quotas for 8 areas are not yet filled. Those who applied for permits in areas where the quotas are filled may transfer to one of these. Gladwin and Gay land are listed among these areas.

The dept. has bought 240 more traps of hunting lands.

Wagner Falls in Alger county will be dedicated as a state park. It contains 84 acres.

Goose hunting continues poor. Only 118 have been bagged at Swan Creek.

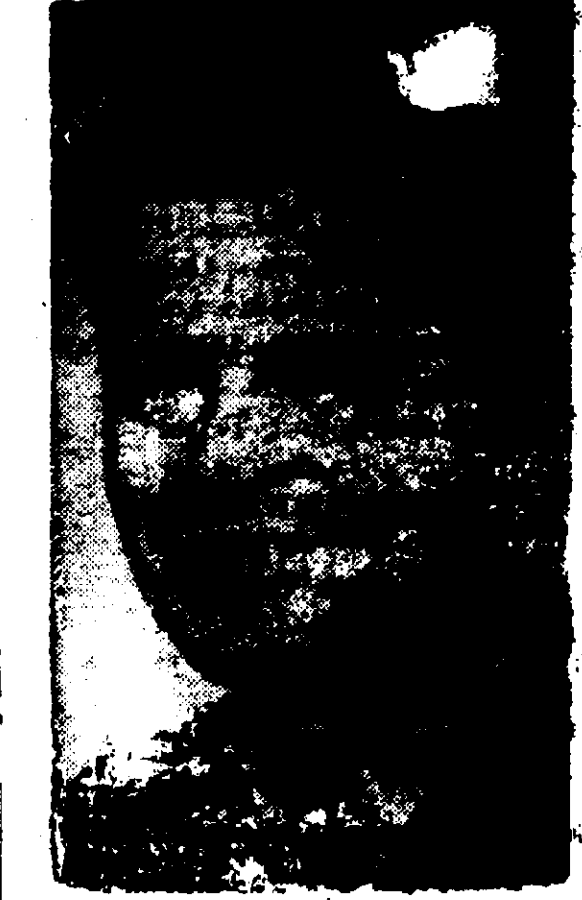
## NOTICE

## ELECTION RESULTS

The vote here broke all records Tuesday when 896 votes were cast, evidently most of the new voters were Republican as President Eisenhower got 144 majority and Gov. Williams on the state ticket and Murray Kennedy, Lorenzo Murphy, Barton and Attarian were the only Democrats on the county ticket to get majorities.

## Current Comment

The quick developments in Egypt last week caught this country dozing and left them apparently holding the bag and the press in general seems to be inclined to make Secretary of State Dulles the goat for letting the British and French put it over on him. Senator Bender, Republican of Ohio said Mr. Dulles resignation is expected in a matter of days. The president pulled out of foreign affairs and Dulles has been making flights all over the world with no apparent results except to make us unpopular and lose us our allies. In Vietnam he told the Communists if they did not withdraw this country would intervene. They ignored it and there was no intervention. He refused to sell arms to Israel or make them a loan. He also refused arms to Egypt because he said they were getting them from Russia and cancelled the loan to them to build the Asam Dam. This killed our influence with both countries. Whether Great Britain and France were in cahoots with Israel or the latter raid into Egypt we do not know but we do not blame Israel. The raid was a matter of self preservation for them. They are hemmed in on all sides by hostile Arab tribes who are determined to exterminate them. There were indications they were about to attack Israel so the Jews beat them to the punch. Anyone who reads foreign affairs at all should know that Great Britain and France would not let the Suez canal be closed to them. It is their life line and most of their supplies come through it. While they politely begged Dulles fantastic plan of bypassing the canal and going around by the Cape of Good Hope they were busy making plans to seize the canal and take control. They completely pulled the wool over Dulles eye and no one was more surprised than he or President Eisenhower when they launched their attack on Egypt. This country got a cease fire ordered by the United Nations which Russia vetoed. The United Nations voted and other nations refrained from voting. The United Nations is not a sounding board. It is merely issue ultimatum but has no power to enforce them. Our stand now is clearly isolation. We have broken our alliance with Great Britain and with France. Can we go it alone without them?

The Irish sweepstakes have been run and two people in this area were big winners. Evelyn Hall, a 33 year old clerk in Sarnia won \$84,000 and Albert Walton, 33, an orderly at University hospital, Ann Arbor won \$40,000. After the taxes are deducted they will have half the sum left. These lotteries are conducted by the government and the money is used for government expenses. Many people have them including Great Britain, Cuba, Spain etc. Many people have been buying these tickets for years in hopes the lightning will strike them some day. There have been efforts to have nation sponsor such a lottery but they have failed.

Church membership in the United States has passed the 1,000,000,000 for the first time in history. There are now 100,162,529. This is an increase of 97,482,611 over a year ago. This upsurge in church membership began right after World War II and now 60.9 of the people in the nation are church members. 100 years ago only 20 percent of the people belonged to a church. In 1900 it rose to 37 and in 1950 to 57. There are 58,448,000 Protestants, 33,596,000 Catholics, 5,500,000 Jews and 2,385,000 Eastern orthodox church members in nation. Per capita contributions to churches last year were \$48 per person. The nation is spending \$5,000,000,000 a year for religious purposes.

There have been developments in the far east. The United Nations with 19 nations voting no agreed to establish international police force on the Israel-Egyptian border. This country will furnish supplies, arms and air transportation and the other countries troops. Gen. Maxwell Taylor head of American forces said we have only 3 divisions available, the others being occupied in Asia, Europe and the far east. So we are to be edging into the conflict one way or by the back door.
