MICHIGAN MIRROR

Hot arguments about school annexations are taking place in many parts of state and court decisions are forcing parent and taxpayers in inadequate school districts to annex to better equipped districts. Previous by things ran quietly. Bigger schools built schools with a capacity for more pupils than they had and took pupils from other districts, collecting tuition from said district. The poorer districts did not have to build new schools and the bigger districts had another source of revenue with little added expense.

The soaring birth rate changed all this. The big schools found themselves with such a flood of pupils they had no room for any outside ones, and the poorer districts had no place to send their high school pupils. To remedy this the legislature gave the county boards of education power to change school district boundary lines. Since then the Supt. of Public Instruction has been receiving notices of annexations at the rate of one a day. Of 1100 districts not in consolidations about 500 have until June to take action on consolidation. The court has ruled that the schools do not have to accept tuition pupils but the law still requires the district to send its pupils to school. 20 years ago there were 6300 school districts in the state. Today there are 3300, and 500 of these will be gone by next June. Of course the reason is increased population.

A big political prize will soon fall to Governor G. Mennen Williams. Within 30 days all supreme court, circuit court and probate court judges who are 70 years old must retire or lose their pension benefits. Judges affected are those who begin their term after reaching the age of 70. There are about 20 in all. Most of them have indicated they will retire.

CONSERVATION DEPT

The City of Grosse Pointe will pay the state of Michigan \$10,711.5 for a deed to 4 acres of submerged land on Lake St. Claire under the act of 1956 legislature.

568 acres of hunting lands have been purchased and \$39,328 worth of timber sold. A dune car ride will be built at the dunes at Silver Lake State Park.

1104,000 persons applied for the 53,340 special deer hunting permits. 50 complainers were received from persons who did not get permits and one lawsuit started.

The deer season got away to a slow start with less hunters in the woods and a lighter deer kill. Four people were accidentally shot and killed the first day. There was no lineup at the Straits this year. In other years it has been 5 miles long.

KIWANIS NOTES

The county road commission were guests of the Kiwanis Tuesday night. Also Supervisor Ralph Glenn of Unadilla. Ye editor was chairman and a panel discussion took place. Ross Robb, Fred Berry, Norman Toppin and Fred Rogers of the road commission were present. Mr. Rogers talked for the road commission. He said the first blacktop roads were not made strong enough and the yearly repair bill was huge. He said road funds were earmarked, so much for primary, secondary roads etc which leaves little for township roads. Each township gets its share of roads but the only blacktop jobs slated for Putnam are Tom and Glennbrook to Washtenaw county line. He told Joe Baydlo that the Pettysville Rd. did not have enough traffic to rate blacktop but admitted it had more than Bull Run Road slated for blacktop. He told Gilbert Rocks there was no project to blacktop McGregor Rd. from Anchor Inn to M-36E but it might be done if the property owners paid the cost as was done on Crest Rd. He told Mrs. Willard Wilts Pingree Rd. was a primary Rd. but there was no project to blacktop it. Others who got in the debate were Cliff Miller, Albert Dinkel, Ernest Botke, Fred and Ross Read, Ralph Glenn said that the board of supervisors considered levying a 2 mill tax for road work. It would raise \$80,000 but took no definite action. The debate was warm at times.

THE COUNTY DEER HERDS

We noticed in a writeup by Ken Dick Kimball, Detroit News wild life writer he gives credit for starting the Livingston county deer herd to John Wrigglesworth who planted 2 deer in Deerfield about 1914. As the old fellow on the Fibber McGee program used to say, "That Ain't the way I heard it."

From my own knowledge I know there were wild deer here long before that. I was born in Dexter and often came to Pinckney by horse and buggy before 1900. We often stopped at the Birkett deer park where Thomas Birkett, Dexter banker had a herd of deer in a high fenced enclosure between his home and barns on his estate on the Dexter-Pinckney Road. I called up William Pidd of Dexter who used to live near Birketts. He said Mr. Birkett started the herd about 1884 when he brought 2 pair of deer from Mt. Pleasant. He had a relative at Mt. Pleasant named William Birkett. His hired man, William Voorhees, father of Ernest Voorhees of Fisher Hardware, Ann Arbor hauled the deer to Birketts by team and wagon. The herd multiplied and I think it was kept around 25. They were fed the same as cattle and sheep. Occasionally one go away and wandered the country. Around 1900 a disease got in the herd and a number died off. Mr. Birkett turned the survivors loose. Some were illegally killed but there were always wild deer around here after that. Mr. Birkett was the grandfather of Birkett Newkirk and great grandfather of Mrs. Patricia Hardy, reg. of deers in Washtenaw county. It has been told the Watkins family at Manchester also had a deer herd.

ASK RATE INCREASE

The Michigan Bell Telephone Co. has filed a petition with the Public Service Commission for an interstate rate increase calling for a 5 percent increase in company revenues. Russell Englehart, Livingston county mgr. said increase is needed to cover two upward wage adjustments for company employees and increased costs.

The pay adjustments were necessary to keep wages in line with those paid by outside industry and in order to keep the type of employees required to furnish good service. They were based on a survey showing the general level of wages paid in communities served by the company. They also reflect the growing value of service furnished in growing communities. The present rates are based on a census taken in 1948. Since then the number of phones in the Pinckney area has increased from 5118 to 8148. The rate increases are as follows:

Installation and moving charges, extra directory listing and miscellaneous service would also be increased. They reflect the number of phones in the local calling areas. The requested increase would amount to \$12,500,000 a year. \$2,500,000 would go to the federal government in taxes. Since 1948 the company's wage costs have gone up \$13,500,000 a year and operating costs 13 percent.

Current Comment

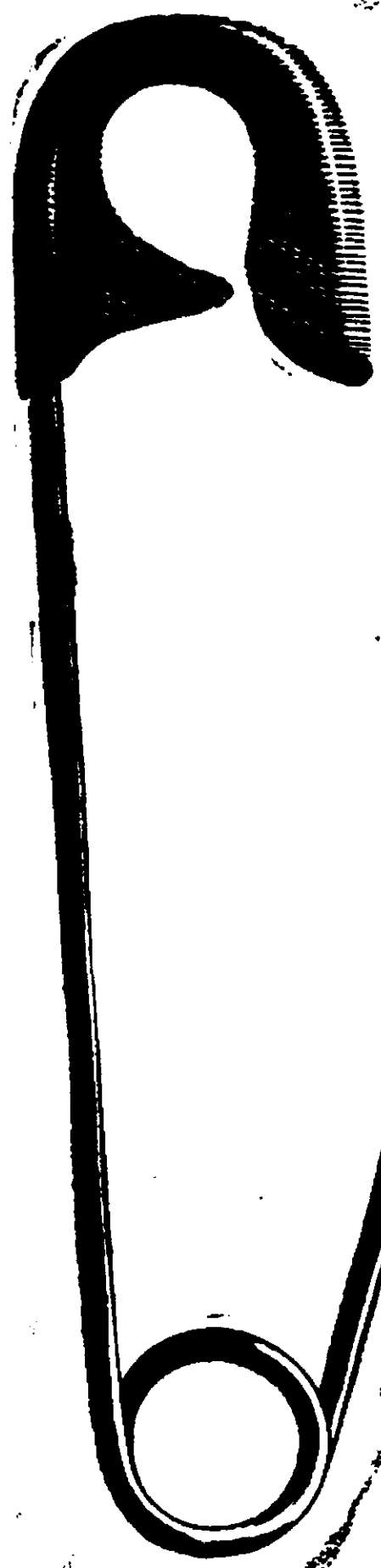
Things seem to have worsened in the Egyptian situation with the sending of UN troops there, and the quick of late finds the United States backing Soviet Russia's demand that all British, French and Israeli troops be withdrawn from Egypt and directly opposed to her former Big Three Allies, Great Britain and France. This has been a life saver to Premier Nasser of Egypt who was about to lose out and he has been issuing orders right and left. He now wants Israel to give back all the territory and arms she took and does not want the UN troops in the canal zone at all, only on Egyptian-Israel border and to withdraw from there when the British and French leave Egypt. The British and French forces are refusing to withdraw until the UN takes over the canal zone. The UN forces are commanded by Gen. Ban, an officer of World I and III. Premier Nasser says if the British and French do not withdraw he will expel them. President Eisenhower says he will not allow such volunteers to fight in Egypt but is disposed to turn the whole affair over to the UN. As yet they only have a few hundred men in Egypt. The UN Secretary Hammarskjold is in Egypt doing his best to iron things out.

For many years the United States diplomatic and intelligence service has not been what it should be. Dewey Harbor proved this. The Japs were able to mass ships and planes there without the U. S. intelligence knowing it. Most of the ship crews were on week end leave and the planes were sitting ducks when the Japs attacked. The same thing happened in Korea. Gen. MacArthur didn't know his medals and went over there to die out a few hundred feet but unknown to him and his intelligence the Chinese had massed on the border in huge numbers and he was nearly annihilated and lucky he got his shirt. Again the same thing happened in the Egyptian affair. Secretary Dulles had just returned from London to report that everything was lovely when the British and French who had been sending troops without his knowledge suddenly attacked Egypt. If he had known it he might have been able to stop it. Now we find ourselves in the unenviable position of supporting the Russian demand and all foreign troops be removed from Egypt and that Nasser, the Red leader be installed in his position of power. We have not as yet figured out our position in the Hungarian affair.

In his interview with the press last week President Eisenhower said the Eisenhower party will have to be re-elected again before it gains the confidence of the people and wins an election and is restored to power. In the recent election while the president got a ton heavy majority his party lost both houses of congress and a majority of the senatorial and gubernatorial contests. The president has always been a New Dealer at heart and has not advocated repeal of a single measure passed by the Roosevelt or Truman administrations. In this he has not had the support of his own party. Neither did they supported his foreign aid program. One commentator blames things for the party's western defeats. Low price supports and the favoring of private power dams over federal ones. Whether the president can remake his party is problematical. The law bars him from running a third term and deprives him of a lot of pressure as a potential candidate. He has said he does not like the law. Neither do we. The people should be allowed to choose whom they desire for president. The same applies to the governorship. Neither law was passed in 1954. The first law was aimed at Franklin Roosevelt and the second at Governor Williams. We know that both were exempted from it but the laws will prevent another Roosevelt or Williams from taking over. In other words the politicians want a measure it won't happen again.
