MICHIGAN MIRROR

You can influence legislation more than you realize. Your senator or state representative wants to hear from you. They can't know everything contained in all of them. They would like to know what you think about them. The best way to contact them is by letter. Telephone calls and telegrams are also effective. Form letters are least effective. One important point. Don't threaten him. He may vote negatively. Give him facts. Letters to your representative should be addressed to the state house and to your senator to the state senate.

The biggest battle in Washington is the hearing room of the Atomic Energy Commission. It is desired to build a \$40 million dollar atomic power plant at Monroe, Mich., and now the question is will it endanger millions of lives in the Detroit and Toledo area?

The 26 companies who will build the plant say No. Three of the AFL CIO union say yes.

A permit has been issued to the companies but it is for construction only. Permission withheld until the plant is completed in 1960. The biggest objection is the report on Reactor safeguards. They say not much is known about the type of reactors to be built here. It is a fast breeder and creates more fuel than it uses. One has been built at Arco, Idaho. During a test it got out of control but no one was hurt. The Monroe plant will be five times more powerful than that one. The Monroe location is 30 miles from Detroit and 20 from Toledo. A second experimental reactor station goes into operation next year and should provide more information.

CONSERVATION DEPT.

The conservation dept. is studying a survey which indicates the public is willing to finance state parks through users' fees. 85 percent were in favor of it. Most favored the 32 cent sticker proposal. The average park user visits the parks 4 times a year.

Forest fires set an all time low in 1956. 762 fires burned over 34,000 acres. Smokers only caused 211 fires. Persons burning debris caused 229. Nearly a million trees were planted on 80,000 acres of state lands in 1956.

The first known recovery of a bald eagle mourning dove has taken place. It was one of ten banded at Fenimore in June 1956 and was shot at Ft. Lauderdale October 9. None of the others have been heard from.

66 persons were arrested for violating the special deer season. They paid fines totalling \$1442 and costs of \$250.

Current Comment

Pack in our distant youth you could buy a lot of things for 5c or a nickel, including an ice cream soda loaf of bread, half a dozen cookies, half a dozen eggs, a street car ride admission to the picture show then and many of the thirst parlors had signs stating they sold the biggest glass of beer in town for 5 cents. Those days are gone forever! About the only thing a nickel is good for today is to make change. Postmaster General Summerfield has evolved a plan to bring back the nickel from the land of forgotten things. He would raise 3 cent letter postage to 5 cents, bring back the nickel and pay off the postal deficit at the same time. He will have to convince congress and congress will need a lot of convincing.

With the tacit support of this country Premier Nasser of Egypt is still strutting about. The canal is being slowly cleaned out in spite of the road blocks he has thrown up. The workmen have been fired on by Egyptian troops several times. About every day he issues an ultimatum. The latest was that Great Britain and France will not be allowed to use the canal until Israel gives up all the land she took from Egypt. Israel was long ago barred from the use of the canal. Premier Nasser is President Eisenhower's baby.

Vice President Nixon threw a scare in the ranks of the filibuster forces last week when he said that in his opinion the filibuster is unconstitutional. That in his opinion one senate could not pass a rule that would apply to all succeeding and successive senates. So the matter may eventually find its way to the supreme court and if the court voids the filibuster the wrath of the south against that body will explode. Nixon once called as a Taft and McCarthy man is moving more and more to the left. He is expected to be a candidate for president in 1960 and has apparently seen the light and concluded that the Taft philosophy is outmoded. Not so his fellow Californian Senator Knowland who also aspires to the presidency and has put himself forward as a leader of the Taft followers. Although he is the Republican floor leader he has opposed President Eisenhower on nearly all points of his foreign policy. He has announced he will not run for reelection in 1958. He is expected to run for governor of California then and the presidency in 1960. He should watch out that while he and Nixon are duelling a third party don't cop the nomination.

Investigations into gambling and corruption are common in our cities where these things flourish. Detroit has had a number of them and several downriver communities there are being investigated now. One is taking place in Flint and Mike Calland circuit judge of this district will conduct it. It is the old familiar combination the charge being that the gamblers and police are working hand in hand, the latter getting pay offs to allow gambling to flourish. Judge Mike has come rapidly to the front the last few years. A few years ago he was unheard of. When Judge Collins died he was a candidate to serve out his term but lost out to Judge Willis Lyons. In 1958 he ran for the full term and won. He soon made the front pages. The legislators had passed a law that all the candidates in the primary had to file citizenship oaths. Under this law the county election commission barred all the Democrat candidates from the ballot and a number of Republican candidates who had not run before. They started suit in circuit court. The attorney general a Republican defended the law. Judge Calland ruled the oath unconstitutional. He said when candidates take out their petitions they take such an oath, the attorney general announced an appeal but it was never taken and the ruling still stands. Judge Calland is rapidly gaining distinction as one of the state's leading jurists.
