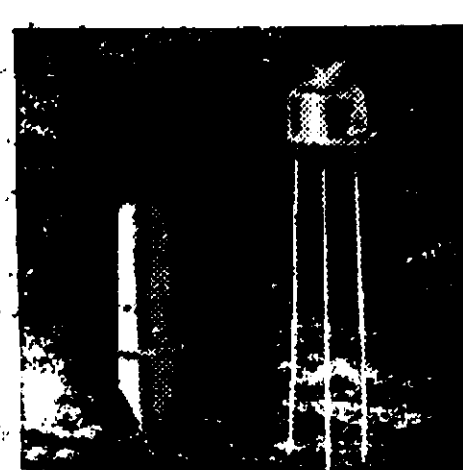

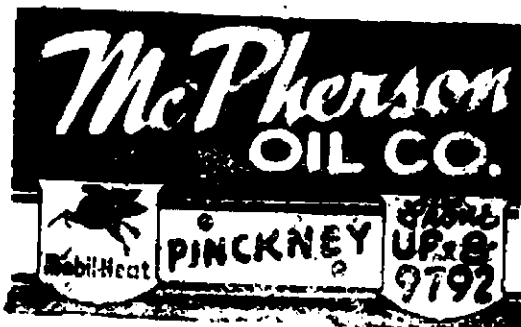

Who Started The Christmas Tree?

A MINIATURE 200 hanging from a Christmas tree may be a striking sight, but actually is out of place there. Like many other Christmas symbols and customs, the Christmas tree has a deep and spiritual significance.

When and where did Christmas trees begin? Some say the Christmas tree comes from the ancient Yule tree and pagan fire customs. But this is more guessing and doesn't fit the facts.

THE CHRISTMAS TREE is a combination of two religious symbols, from medieval days, the Paradise tree and the Christmas light, and it began in Germany.

From the eleventh century on, religious plays used to be performed in churches or outdoors in front of churches. One of the most popular of these "mystery plays" as they were called, was the Paradise play. It told of the creation of man, the sin of Adam and Eve, and their expulsion from Paradise. This play closed with the consoling promise of the coming Saviour. For this reason the Paradise play was a favorite in Advent, the preparatory season for the coming of Christ.

IN THE PLAY the garden of Eden was indicated by a fir tree hung with apples, from which Eve broke the fruit and gave it to Adam to eat. This "Paradise tree" attracted the attention of all onlookers, especially the
