Charges of politics are made to regard to the Republican attempt to keep John C. Mackie, Democrat candidate for highway commissioner off the ballot. They have already carried it to the supreme court once who refused to rule on it. The contention is he is not a registered engineer but a surveyor. He has been Genesee county surveyor for a number of years. Robert Childs who brought the suit and is a Republican supreme court candidate, says if Mackie is elected suit will be brought to prevent taking office.

Mackie, 39, now holds a degree in civil engineering from the Michigan State University. Democrats point out he only has to take the state examination to become registered.

A law passed in 1937 requires the state highway commissioner to be a registered engineer. A ruling in 1945 required all county road commissioners to be qualified engineers. This has never been enforced. If Mackie should be disqualified Gov. Williams would appoint his successor.

Michigan's new teen age driving law is off to a flying start. Since Feb. 1 no 18 year old person can get a drivers license without attending drivers school. About 68,000 students are enrolled in the state. A student can start taking instructions after his or her 15th birthday. CONSERVATION NOTES

Michigan faces a critical forest fire season due to mild weather and lack of snow. Up to March 10 67 fires had burned over 884 acres. Hard est hit were the northern counties of Clare, Gladwin Arenac, Isabella, Midland and Bay. None were reported in the upper peninsula which still has a blanket of snow. People are warned not to set fires on windy days and to have tools handy to prevent them spreading.

The smelt runs are soon due to be followed by wall eyes and suckers. Mild deer starvation losses are expected in the lower peninsula but higher in the upper which still has a blanket of snow.

The spearing and archery season on carp, dog fish, suckers, mullet and gar fish starts April 1.

THE ALCAN HIGHWAY

The Alcan Highway built by the United States as a wartime measure is becoming a busy commercial route playing a part in opening Canada's northern lands to development. It is just 5 years since a group of U. S. Army engineers arrived there to begin construction.

There were the advance guard of 10,000 U. S. soldiers and 2,000 civilians who pushed a highway 1,800 miles through a wilderness of rock, muskeg, and timber to Alaska. A year later an all weather highway linked Dawson Creek and Fairbanks, Alaska.

Today a Canadian Army staff of 350 men to repair the roadway and bridges during the summer and patrol and snowplow during the winter along the 1,221 mile Canadian section.

Every year more than 20,000 vehicles carry 75,000 passengers and 13,000 tons of freight on the road. The road was built and paid for by the United States on the understanding that it would be turned over to Canada after the war.

Two Pinckneyites that we know of have traversed this highway. They are James Whitley and Frank Lange. What a boon this road would have been to the old sour doughs in the days of the gold strike of the 90's.

Current Comment

Congress is trying to pass the buck on the presidents \$71.8 billion dollar budget. The revenues coming in will not be sufficient to carry it out and it is doubtful if the people will stand for more taxes. So to make it fit the available funds. Congress has to make the cuts and whatever gets their funds cut are going to be sore. So congress got smart & asked the president to indicate what funds to be cut. This would put blame on spot and make him take the blame for the cuts. He probably will not bother to answer them. It is the duty of congress to make the cuts. Besides as he submitted the budget he is not liable to admit he asked for more funds than were needed. So congress will finally get down to business and make the cuts which will probably be mostly in foreign aid as local depts. have votes and foreign countries do not. Besides many people are coming around to the idea that we cannot have foreign countries not to turn Communist.

James Hoffa, Detroit, whose teamster union has 1,500,000 members and is the largest in the world, was arrested in Washington D.C. last week charged with giving a member of the congressional staff investigating the tieup between the union and gambling and prostitution in Portland, Oregon, a bribe for testimony taken by committee. Hoffa's life story reads like a Horatio Alger book. His father died when he was young and he quit school in the 7th grade to help in support of his family. In 1932 he worked in the Kroger warehouse for 32 hours. He organized a union. It grew and he affiliated with the teamsters union. He climbed the ladder rapidly and is now national vice president with a salary of \$19,000 a year. He came up the hard way and has a record of 17 arrests and no convictions except for traffic violations. He has passed an intelligence test 100% and has lectured at Harvard University. Last year he pocketed a \$100 a plate dinner in Detroit and raised \$350,000 for an orphanage and school in Israel which he went there to dedicate. He is a Republican and supported Senator Ferguson in 1954 and Mayor Cobo last year. Congress investigated him in 1954 on an insurance deal but the investigation was quashed.

Drew Pearson states that the drys are all heated up about the cocktail parties being held in the senate of the new building at Washington D. C. He says that way back in 1937 congress voted to abolish the office. It has been from the halls of congress, mainly it was said because Daniel Webster and Henry Clay spent so much time there. All the bars around the capitol were abolished and they stayed abolished until the Eisenhower administration came in. Then the Capitol Hill Club was established across the street from the capitol. Memberships were \$500 each and include many prominent Washington personages. This caused a furor among the drys and bills have been introduced to go back to the laws of 1937. In regard to Daniel Webster and Henry Clay the Old Crow distillery still features them in their advertising.

Vice Pres. Nixon is still on his good will tour to keep the newly formed countries of Africa from falling into the Communist net. He got a warm reception in Ghana but a cold one in Sudan. Both want U.S. loans. South America is said to be not too well pleased with his tour. We get most of our cocoa and chocolate from Brazil now which Ghana and Sudan can produce cheaper on account of their slave labor.

An occurrence took place in California last week which should be a strong argument against capital punishment. George Bradley was under sentence for murder of a girl whose body was found. The evidence against him was circumstantial. There had been several reprieves. Execution was set for Friday, Gov. Knight issued another reprieve but it was delayed and the gas had been put on in the death chamber just two minutes before it arrived.
