Michigan Mirror

Tax cut bills which usually mean some one else will have to pay more, will bring relief to financially distressed bus companies this year. The legislature passed a bill that any bus company that uses more than 94 percent of its income for operating expenses will get a partial waiver on gasoline, weight and state taxes this year. The bus companies claim this is the only thing that will prevent municipal ownership. If all 17 major companies take advantage of it the state could lose \$1,500,000 in tax money. All companies cannot qualify though.

Michigan will get a new office building in Lansing in 8 years. It now has 2 office buildings besides the capitol but there are 24,000 employees are many are using rented quarters.

The legislature will hold hearings to study the tax situation this summer.

At one point in the tax dispute Gov. Williams corporations profits tax with the support of Young Republicans lacked but one vote of passing. The Republican legislature taking up the cause of industry said more taxes would drive industry out of Michigan. The governor disputed this and cited figures to show industrial concerns have increased in Michigan. Finally they passed the tax shift, cigarette and liquor tax for support of the schools and so the schools who have always taught the evil effects of liquor and tobacco are now dependent on these goods for their existence.

Outstate Michigan gas users may get more to the extent of 175,000 feet if the Panhandle Co. can get permission to drill that much gas from Detroit. The Mich. Consolidated Gas which supplies most of Detroit's gas is the principal objector.

One of the last acts of the legislature was to appropriate \$87,000 to start planning for the new Ray's Vocational School for which a site has been bought in Green Oak.

CONSERVATION NOTES

The State of Michigan is buying 1140 more acres of hunting lands, 139 at Oak Grove and 20 in Waterloo.

Nesting pheasants are doing well this year but the breeding stock is down from last year. The survey by rural mail carriers will be made in June.

Many drownings occur among fishermen whose boats capsize. There are 7 safety rules listed for them: 1. Know your boat. 2. Don't overload. 3. Balance your load. 4. Keep low. 5. Watch the weather. 6. Use the right motor. 7. Avoid sharp turns.

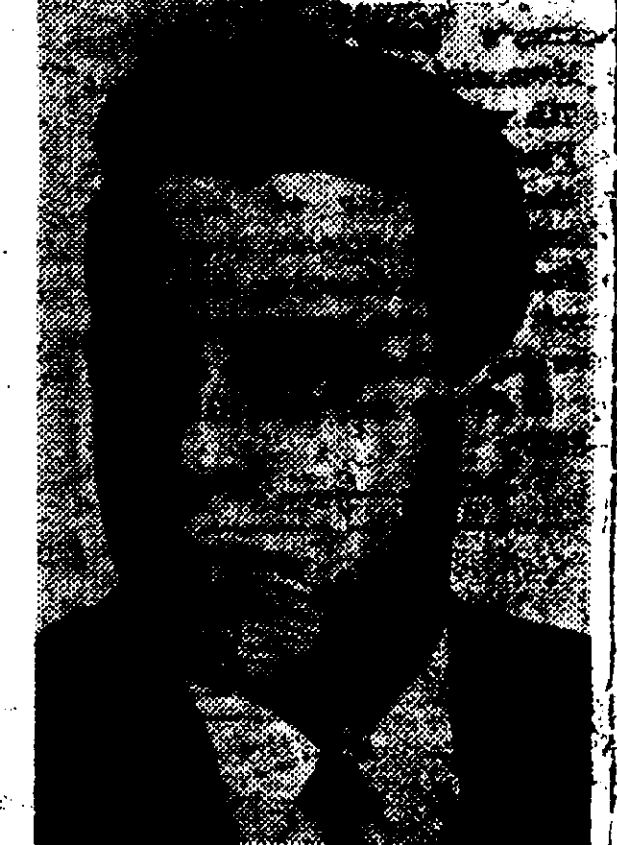

Memorial Day

Then came the Chelsea high school band in uniform, The Zal Zaz Groto drum and bugle corps of Ann Arbor and the V. F. Current Comments

George VanPurse, speaker of the house is trying to build himself up into the Republican candidate for governor in 1958. He considers the Michigan Republican party leader. Since Mayor Cobos disappeared in 1956 and is perfectly willing to grab the reins of leadership himself. He sends out a weekly letter to the press of which we have not seen many in print and recently wrote all Republican members of the legislature asking them to form an organization for him and raise a fund. Rep. George Sallade of Ann Arbor refused. He said he might be a candidate for governor himself. Senator Paster is also not inclined to go along with him. In a press release last week he came out for Cong. Ford of Grand Rapids for governor. In his last press release VanPurse takes great pride for raising \$24,000.00 for the schools by boosting the liquor and cigarette tax. There is something unusual about this tax. The Ann Arbor News Friday night had a cartoon depicting a drunk standing before the bar and pleading with the bartender for just one more little drink for the sake of the schools. We do not like to see the welfare of the schools dependent on the consumption of liquor and cigarettes.

The riots in Formosa last week in which the American embassy was wrecked and American citizens beat on probably means the beginning of the end for Chiang Kai Chek, whom this country has been supporting since the end of the Korea war as a check against China. This is the only country which does not recognize China. Great Britain relaxed most of her trade restrictions against China last week. Chiang's fond dream is that this country will supply him with boats, planes, guns and men to invade China and be restored to power. This would amount to a declaration of war on China. Senator Knowland his strongest supporter often referred to as the Senator from Formosa would not dare ask for. Incidentally the Formosa riots do not help the candidacy of Senator Knowland for the presidency in 1960 much.

De-segregation is still far from 100 percent accomplished even in Michigan. Senator Basil Brown, Detroit negro was recently given two traffic tickets in Lansing. On the tickets was a racial designation as to whether the offender was white or colored. Brown claims such a designation is contrary to law and will challenge it in court.

Gov. Williams signed the bill allowing the conservation commission to charge for parking cars at state parks but has said he might veto the \$2.00 windshield sticker bill. This law would make all park users buy a \$2 sticker good for a year. The governor favors it but only as a supplemental aid bill which it is not as the legislature voted no funds for state parks.

The cost of the White House upkeep at Washington has increased tremendously since President Eisenhower took over. In Harry Truman's last year the cost was \$1,883,000. This year the president asks \$2,061,000. The cost of the presidents office has increased even more. In Truman's last year was \$8,168,000. This year the president wants \$12,047,000. This does not include his helicopter, his charged to the defense dept., his plane charged to the air force, and his military aides charged to the war dept.

Fall-Fed Pastures Give More Grass, Extra Proteins

CATTLE can have extra days of grazing this fall and an earlier start on fields next spring when permanent pastures are top-dressed with fertilizer this fall, reports the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee.

Fertilized pastures get off to a quicker start in the spring and usually produce more grass per acre and more protein per pound of grass, according to studies by Midwestern agronomists.

Some agronomists say that fall application of fertilizer is preferable to spring application in many respects, because of the firmer footing for trucks and spreaders.

Earlier pasturing in the spring on fall-fertilized fields can mean important savings on feed bills. Bluegrass stays palatable later in the summer when it is well

fertilized and it recovers earlier in the fall for precious extra days of grazing.

In tests on 58 farm pastures in Wisconsin, the use of fall-applied fertilizer returned \$63 per acre after deducting the cost of fertilizer, according to C. J. Chapman, extension soils specialist.

The pastures received a fall application of 500 pounds per acre of 10-10-10 fertilizer, containing nitrogen, phosphate and potash. Each of the plots yielded an average of 3,562 extra pounds of dry matter per acre from two clippings. Chapman says this increased yield represented a return of \$3.50 for every dollar invested in fertilizer.
