Michigan Mirror

Tax payers are people who turn over part of their income to finance services they demand from the government. They elect the officials who write the tax laws and in some instances determine how the money shall be spent.

Last January auto sales were down and food and appliance sales were less which caused a drop in sales taxes, so much so that the schools who are dependent on it were imperiled. Then in May sales picked up and by aid of the \$24,000,000 liquor and cigarette tax the legislature passed the schools may get by but many do not like the idea of the schools being dependent on the sale of liquor and cigarettes for their existence.

This may not suffice for next year as the people keep demanding more and better services of the state.

The governor and the legislature are still disputing on industrial taxes. The governor says taxes are a minor consideration in industry. The industrial survey which will take 5 years will settle this. It will be done in co-operation with the University of Michigan, Michigan State University, University of Detroit, Wayne University and the Upjohn Foundation of Kalamazoo.

The legislature returns June 27-28 to adjourn. The governor has started a series of vetoes. He vetoed the new judgeships for Oakland and Saginaw counties because the legislature took away his appointive power. They would not fill them until the election of 1958 and they would take office in 1959. The governor said if they could wait that long the need could not be urgent. Also the mental health bill requiring the board to be composed of 4 Democrats and 3 Republicans. He said it would create a stalemate and some of the present members would have to be replaced.

AS WE HEARD IT

RETARDED CHILDREN

Last fall Mrs. Lyberg of Brighton started to teach a class of retarded children in the Rickett school near Brighton, 4 or 5 were sent there and they have done very well. They can read, sing and recite the Lord's prayer. It costs the families of the 4 or 5 children \$8 a week per child and they take turns furnishing transportation.

We called on Agnes McCallum, county school board president Friday and she told us one teacher can teach retarded children there are in that a bill has passed both houses of the legislature and is expected to be signed by the governor. By it each county would receive in school funds \$4000 or more a year in school funds for retarded children. The school district must furnish transportation. Miss McCallum wants the county to accept plan. A survey is now being made to determine how many retarded children there are in the county. Monroe, Oakland and Macomb have set up retarded children programs and Washtenaw expects to do this fall.

Current Comment

There has been much in the press of late about the killing of a Japanese woman by an American G. I. on a testing field there and the president's decision to turn him over to Japanese courts for trial. Many Japanese make a living by picking up scrap on testing fields. This woman was one of them. Girard fired an empty cartridge case in the air to scare her but it struck and killed her. President Eisenhower was disposed to refuse the Japanese request but yielded to pressure from Sec. of State Dulles, who said our prestige was low in Asia due to similar instances. Shooting of a Chinese peeping Tom in Formosa by a G. I. sergeant and a similar incident in Korea so Girard was considered expendable and will be turned over to the Japs for trial. Girard has a Japanese sweetheart who is standing by him.

We never could understand why Michigan forbids lotteries, but allows Irish, English and other lottery tickets to be sold here indiscriminately. Michigan had her share of winners in the Irish sweepstakes last week. A negro couple, Detroit, won \$66,000. Several others there mostly office workers won \$28,000. Undoubtedly thousands of these tickets were sold in Michigan to people who hoped some day lightning would strike them. We know people who have bought them 50 years without any return.

The best story comes from Arkansas. A priest there, Rev. Fr. McDavitt, prayed for money there for a new church and school. Last week he was notified he had won \$56,000 on a lottery ticket. As it will be used for religious purposes it is tax exempt. His brother in Ireland sent him the ticket.

Dr. Herbert Berger of the American Medical Society came out with a blast against tranquillizing pills and their like and said they are tainted amphetamine and are highly forming. He claims prize fighters have used them for years and also professional and college track and football stars. They prevent feeling fatigue. He adds the pills would never have been run in less than 4 minutes without their use. Of course the athletic coaches are up in arms and deny all his charges. Race horses have been doped for years and some of these doped horses have won races. Take the case of Rene Bertoa, Detroit player. A flop for 4 years he suddenly blossomed into a star over night and led the league in hitting but he did not hold up and was benched due to weak hitting and the numerous dumb plays he made.

The New York Giants and Brooklyn Dodgers have secured permission from their league to move their clubs to the west coast but that does not mean it will be done. Both want their cities to build them municipal stadiums which they refuse to do. so this is a sort of squeeze play. If they move to California all games will be televised and they say they can get a \$2,000,000 television contract. They offer \$500,000 a year now for part of their games.

Harry Holt, the Oregon farmer who has adopted 8 Korean orphan children of G. I. and Korean girls is returning to Europe. He wants to have found homes for 100 Korean war orphans. He has been introduced by Senator Neundorfer at his state to admit 10,000 war orphans. He claims there are 100,000 in Korea, Japan, Germany and other places where American G.I.s have been stationed.

Although the press reports times are booming employment figures do not show it. On April 15 last manufacturing employment was down to 1,075,000 for the 4th month in a row. It was 12,000 less than the previous month or 2,351,000. Not employment increase from mid-April 1956 to mid-April this year was 2000 compared to the year before increase of 16,000. Most of the reductions were in Flint, Detroit and Grand Rapids. Detroit was down 9,000. Flint and Grand Rapids 1400. Auto industry employment decreased by 24,000.
