# Slavery Civil Rights

The civil rights issue involving the fight for equal rights by the negroe was one of the results of American Slavery and was 90 years coming to a head. It was bound to do so some day as the delaying and stalling tactics of congress became outmoded. The big reason is that the negroe has advanced intellectually over the years and now holds many pos. itions of influence. During the high wage periods of the two world wars thousands of negroes came north and settled in the cities where they have become a political power. In New York Detroit Chicago and other cities they cast the deciding vote. Negross in these cities have been elected to judgeships, the legislature and to congress. The college and high school athletic teams have many megroes and so do the big begue base ball and foot ball teams.

In order to understand the situation it is necessary to go back a few hun. dred years to the introduction of slavery in America. Slavery has al ways existed and atill does in Arab ia, Africa and Siberia. It is mention. ed repeatedly in the Bible. The people were pastoral then and usually at war with other tribes. Their custom was to put the men of the conquored tribes to the sword and carry off the women and children captives. As they turned to agriculture slaves became of value and during the great building period of the middle ages thousands of slaves were used. > There were moral reactions against it and it might have ended much sponer except for the invention of the cotton gin in 1798 by Eli Whit. ney. Before this it took a slave two hours to clean the seeds from a lb. of cotton. The gin did it in minutes. Cotton became the nations No. 1 crop and with it a demand for cheap labor. From 1793 to the civil war some 20,000,000 slaves were landed and Mrs Carolyn Cameron of Ingleside, traders were mostly New England captains and at one time 200 slave ships were based at Newport, Rhous Island. They were called blackbirders. Sunday. They gave 150 gallons of rum worth about \$80 for a slave between 18 and 35 years old. Older ones cost less. Some sold for \$300, others - \$1905, They sold half their slaves in the West Indies and took on a cargo of molasses, After selling the rest of their slaves they went to New England where the molasses was made into rum. Then back to Africa. The profit on a trip was about \$40,000.

A schooner carried 250 slaves on # decks. Some of the big ships 500. They were allowed 16 inches of space and chained to benches. Those who died were thrown overboard. steach was frightful and a slave ship could be smelled miles away. Later efforts were made to fumigate and swab the decks and treat the drinking water as the insurance Companies refused to pay for slaves who died of disease.






