Neighboring Notes

Republicans are expected to wage a last ditch fight to keep their last stronghold in Michigan. The legislature special committee has been set up to concentrate on the swing Republican - Democrat districts where the vote was only 20 per cent apart. They will try to keep the 59 Republican seats they now have. The Democrats have 51.

Superimposed is the automatic vote in 1958 to hold a constitutional convention. They are afraid of this as it would upset the 1952 reapportionment which has kept them in control of the legislature. The Democrats are for it as it might give them control. The convention if called would be made up of 3 delegates from each senatorial district.

Universities and colleges are facing their biggest financial crisis. The legislature made them increase their fees 10 per cent last year and then killed a plan to use the money for bond issues. They are expected to clash head on with the Republican plans to hold the line on spending for another year until the tax study is completed.

Another attempt will be made to label Michigan products with the Seal of Quality.

Republicans are panning Gov. Williams for replacing John Reid on the labor board. Reid was a Republican who turned Democrat, and has served 8 years.

Current Comment

The status of President Eisenhower is still a matter of great doubt. He attended a cabinet meeting last week but only stayed an hour. He still has difficulty with his speech. It was announced he would be able to attend the NATO meeting in Paris this month but his Secretary, Hagerty denied this and blasted the president's group for making the announcement. Drew Pearson compares the president to a battered prize fighter who has been on the canvass several times but has been given first aid, has water thrown on him and is sent out to fight one more round. The president evidently considers himself expendable and so do his advisors. It is doubtful if the Paris conference will accomplish much without the president. Adlai Stevenson is not going either. He had a disagreement with Sec. Dulles. Stevenson wanted to make a trip around the world first to acquaint himself with the situation and Dulles who has been around the world more times than the sputnik without getting many results was against it. He gave Stevenson to understand he was going merely as a consultant and would only be expected to give advice if asked.

In the meantime another attempt to launch a satellite here has failed. One was set off in Florida last Friday but only went up 4 feet when it blew itself to pieces. This attempt to catch up with Russia in the satellite program is being rushed too fast and before we are ready. Some commentators blame the late Senator McCarthy and his followers for this. During witch hunts for communists scientists and college professors were the favorite targets and hundreds of them were forced out of the government service at a time when they were most needed. Most of them have been cleared of the charges levelled against them but the damage done to the guided missile and satellite program is irreparable.

We read with interest the account of the trial of Bob Lary star Detroit Lions football player for drunk driving. This happened some time ago but the case was postponed many times. He was arrested at 2:00 a. m. on a Detroit street, driving without lights and weaving from side to side. The police said his speech was thick. Lary admitted drinking in a tavern from 8 p. m. to 2 a. m. and said he had 6 or 7 drinks but was not drunk. Any thickness in his speech he attributed to his Texas drawl. The jury of 11 women and 1 men were only out 15 minutes and brought in a not guilty verdict. It was ever thus. When Ty Cobb was in his heyday as a player in Detroit he was arrested numerous times mostly on assault charges and always got off. A warrant was issued against him in Cleveland and he had to avoid that city for awhile.

Senator Jenner of Indiana the late Senator McCarthys first assistant in his witch hunts will not be a candidate for reelection and may even resign before his time is out. He was never an Eisenhower man except when he wanted the president's help to get elected. and in announcing his retirement he blasted the Republican administration. He said there is a lack of general support in the fight against Communism. They go out to destroy and ruin any man who raises his voice against it. He is also against internationalism and spending.

Four years as public address announcer for Pinckney high school won an athletic letter for Donald M. Winger, although he did not play in a single game. Winger, head of the school newspaper, was awarded the first that the school has ever given to a non-player. Winger is a pretty active student; he's president of the student council, keeps score in basketball, has a role in the Future Teachers of America and is the summer umpire in several baseball and soft ball leagues.

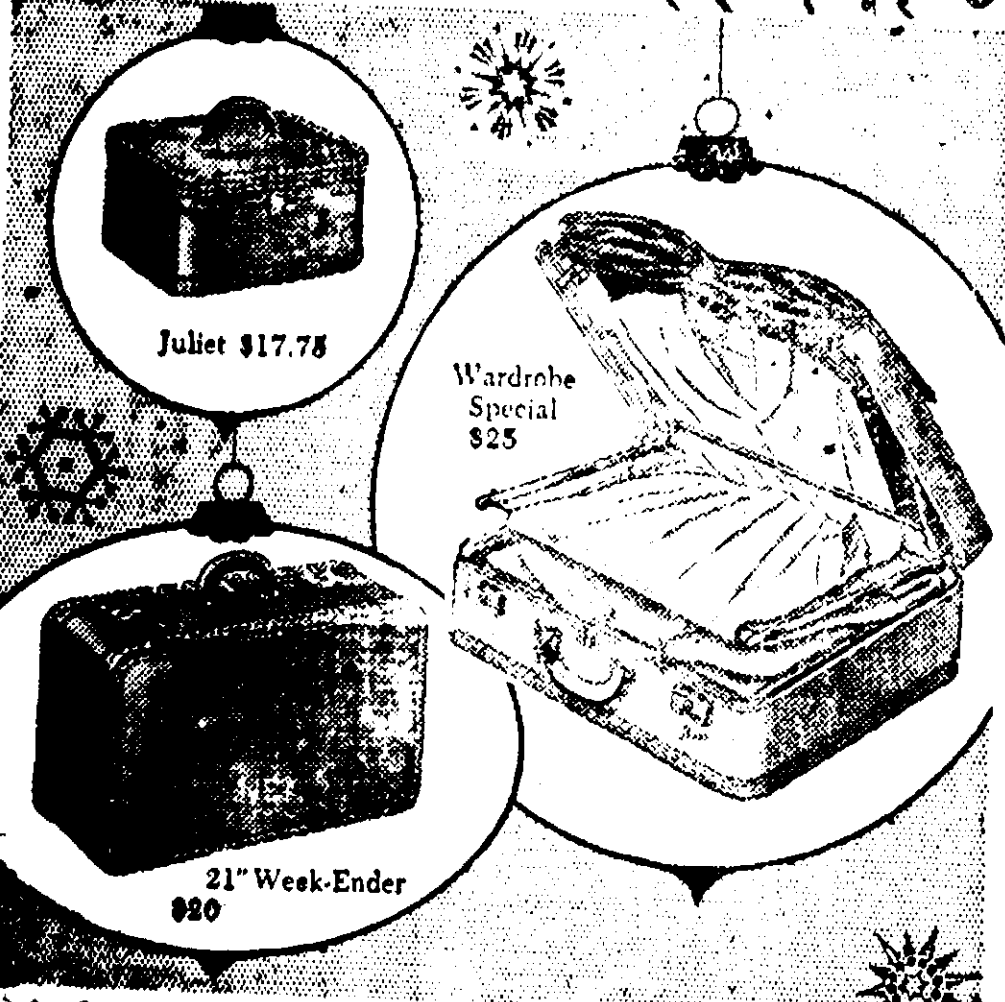
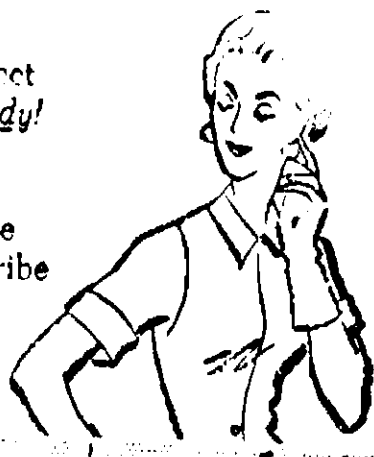
