Michigan's shortage of doctors, dentists and medical men is outlined in a report submitted to the governor by a 24 member committee appointed to look into the future. Wilbur Cohen of the University of Michigan social dept. is chairman. He says the state ranks 10th in wealth and personal income but is 35th in its supply of physicians. The national average is one physician to every 1782 residents. Michigan has one to every 2000. National average for nurses is 200. National average for nurses is 200. The solution is the graduation of more nurses and doctors. The committee would expand the facilities of Wayne University to accomplish this.

Alabama means more money for education. Republican legislators estimate that education will cost \$41 million more next year due chiefly to the spurt. There will be a \$1 million deficit in the school fund next year due to decreased sales tax collections. Another \$14 million is needed to take care of the 370,000 students enrolled and to replace the \$25 million raised by the liquor and cigarette tax. Legislators do not feel that this tax can be extended beyond the deadline which is June 30 next.

Demands have developed since the Sputnik for a greater study of science. Dr. Lynn Bartlett, supt. of public instruction says the Russians are concentrating on physics and mathematics. If this country wants to match them it will take more money for schools and instructors.

Speaker of the house VanPursem is still campaigning on cutting taxes and wages. He says Michigan taxes and wages are driving industry out of the state, principally southward where taxes and wages are lower. Also living conditions.
