SCIENTIFIC DISCUSSION

Scientists are finding answers to the Russian Sputnik. They concede their answers are late but say the nation was unexcited about academic achievements previous to the Sputnik. New sudden demands on the schools for raw science and mathematics have created new problems. Russia has concentrated in science and grad being thousands more scientists year year than we do.

Colleges went into action at once. Dr. Harland Hatcher of the University of Michigan appointed a special committee to advise him on curriculum. In addition he stepped up work on the Phoenix project which would convert the use of atomic energy to peace time purposes. Michigan State is planning a curriculum in the field of nuclear science. Supt. of Instruction has named a committee of educators and developed a special bulletin for teachers.

Republicans and Democrats are re-elected to a deficit the coming year of \$20 to \$30 million even without increasing services. This does not count school aid \$10 million deficit and \$14 million needed for increased enrollment. Both parties doubt that any new tax will be passed this year.

Senator Faulkner would force all unions to incorporate and become subject to corporation laws. He also has a right to work law without joining a union. He is known as a labor foe and neither bill is expected to pass at this session.

TAXES ARE HIGHER

Did you get your tax statement? If you did you noticed it was much higher than last year. The school tax is about two thirds of it. But what surprised us is the county tax which is usually very low. We called up Supervisor Hendee and he said the county needs more money. They bought the Citizens Mutual Auto Ins. Co. building on a lease purchase plan gave \$14000 towards the new armory and gave all the county officers a substantial raise. The end is not yet as a survey has shown that the Pinckney school facilities will have to be increased in a few years.

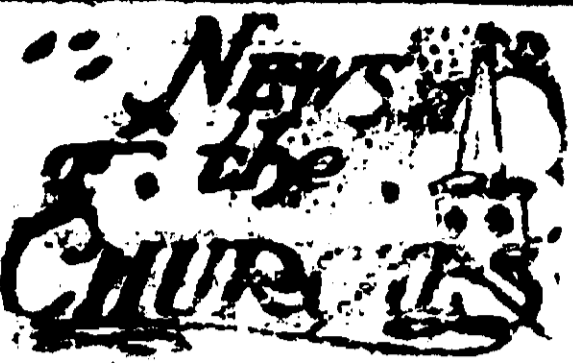
The tax rate here is about \$82 a thousand. In Dexter township it is \$60. They have a court house to pay for.

DIED OF INJURIES

When Don Swarthout prepared the body of the late Dr. Raymond Sigler he found a cut on the head and a bruise on the jaw. As he was a cousin of the deceased he told me. Also that the burial permit gave the cause of death as accidental cerebral injury. On advice of County Prosecutor Erwin I wrote the Oakland County prosecutor. In the reply I got from him he said his office had been unable to find out much. They did find out that Dr. Sigler was in the Red Lion Tavern, on the night of November 29 apparently in good health. The bar tender did not remember when he left or if any one went with him. Later that night he was taken to 485 South Blvd. East Pontiac by an unidentified man. The people there where he stayed thought he had too much liquor. He slept 2 days. When he did not awaken they had him taken to the hospital. He did not really enough to answer questions and died Dec. 15. The doctor was blind and drew \$125 a month social security check. On one occasion he was robbed by 2 men he met in a Lansing tavern who offered to take him home in their car. But the bartender had recognized the 2 men as ex-convicts and they were picked up by the police.

HEALTH CENTER DEDICATION

The new McPherson Community Health Center at Howell will be dedicated Saturday, Jan. 4 at 1:00 p. m. Open house will also be held Sunday. This is a \$1,400,000 project, the money being raised by subscription, federal grants, endowments and the sale of property.

The new hospital will have 38 beds, 4 four bed wards, 28 two bed rooms and 15 private rooms. Last year the old hospital took care of 1800 inpatients and 2000 outpatients. 600 babies were born there. The staff of the new hospital will number 120.

The old hospital which was the residence of the late E.G. McPherson will revert to the McPherson family. It is said a new bank will be built there.

Current Comment

The commentators are still talking the NATO meeting at Paris and none of them point the real picture of it that Secretary Dulles says. He did most of the talking in the report to the nation. The position read a typed statement which only took a few minutes. The truth of the matter is the people of the world are sick of this armament race and the heavy burden of taxation. They are ready to grasp at anything which might ease it. That is why they demand peace talks with Russia. They got Dulles to agree to it by refusing to give him missile bases until he did. However it may be some time before this comes to pass. Russia holds the upper hand now and Dulles has just rejected an 82 nation peace meeting suggested by them. He only wants the principal powers to take part. In the meantime the president will be kept in the harness despite disabilities. He is to be the speaker at a big fund raising dinner at Chicago on Jan. 29 at so much per plate.

Although Christmas is one of the big holidays but it was not until 1840 was made a national holiday. The Pilgrims and Puritans had no Christmas. They considered it a pagan rite and pertaining to the Druids who were shipped trees and the mistletoe. Washington's victory at Trenton was on Christmas eve. He attacked them because he knew the Hessian soldiers stationed there would be all drunk. In Europe the principal implements were the wassail bowl and the roast whole pig. Some countries celebrate a different date than Dec. 25, and the Jews, Moslems, Chinese, etc. do not celebrate it at all. Even in our youth not much attention was paid to Christmas. We never remember the business section being decorated. The church had a Christmas tree but very few homes. They were candle light and decorated with cotton and strung popcorn and considered a fire hazard. At the church tree, usually a tall one, a mistletoe nearby with a long hollow tube to blow out the candles when they burned low. Another feature was the saloons always had plenty of Tom and Jerry on hand at Christmas time.

We read that 125 men were set free from Michigan prisons at Christmas time. This is an old custom dating back to the time of Christ. Pilate wanted to release Christ but the mob demanded Barabbas, a robber. Years ago governors used to make it a practice to turn prisoners lose Christmas time now the parole board does it. The most famous pardon ever issued in Michigan was the one to Frank L. Andrews, the bank wrecker some 55 years ago. He was convicted after a lengthy trial and only served about a year. Aaron T. Bliss of Saginaw was the governor who pardoned him and by doing so dug his political grave.

L. Ewing Scott was convicted of the murder of his wife in California last week despite the fact her body was never found. She was an aged wealthy woman. Still we are glad to get a life sentence as there is a chance she is still alive. This would only happen in California where there have been 6 previous convictions although victims bodies were never found. Scott still maintains his innocence and has asked for a new trial.

Mayor Miriani of Detroit is stirring up a hornet's nest by changing the police and fire pension system in Detroit. He says they are pensioned at 55 years of service and many in the fire department are retired. Miriani says they have many more years of service left and most of them would get another job. He would like to see retirement age at 55. The police firemen oppose this. They say they have worked for 25 years after 21 years best part of their life.

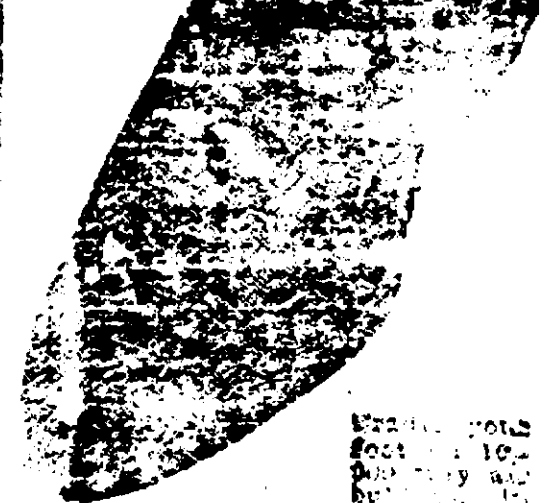

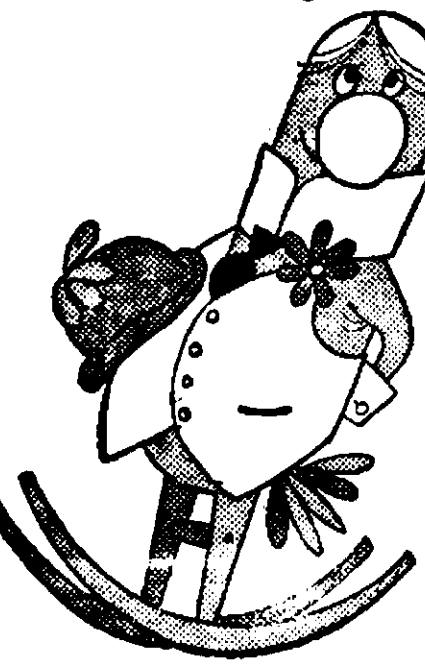

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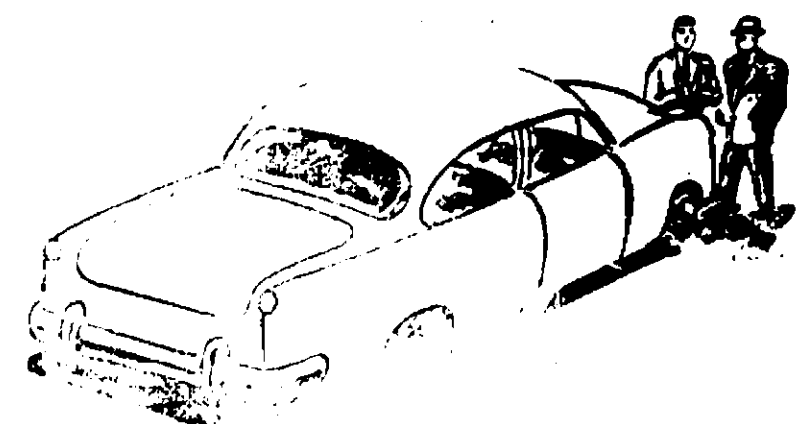

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MICHIGAN ROADS

Harry Ledue had an article in the Detroit News last week on roads. He says there are 3,400,000 miles of roads in the United States. Before 1000 B.C. there were no roads. The travel was on foot, by donkey or horse back and they were not need any. They had no horses until the Europeans brought them. There were no bridges between here and Detroit in 1835. Lumber was plentiful and some plank roads were built by individuals who were allowed to charge toll but these rotted out in a few years. The federal government laid out roads across the nation such as the Natchez trail, Chisolm, Oregon and Mormon trail but they

the world then. No roads were built in England until about 18th century. John McAdam was the first great road builder. His name is given now to certain type. There were no roads here when the pioneers came. The Indians travelled on foot and did not need any. They had no horses until the Europeans brought them. There were no bridges between here and Detroit in 1835. Lumber was plentiful and some plank roads were built by individuals who were allowed to charge toll but these rotted out in a few years. The farmers were allowed to work out their road tax on the township roads. Sometimes little or no work was done. Now the county and state have the roads to maintain and get their money from the auto and truck taxes
