MICHIGAN BUDGET

Michigan needs \$50,000,000 to avoid a red ink budget this year. The affair is complicated by the Eagerness of both parties to please in election year. Gov. Williams has asked state agencies to spend less and has chopped dozens choice items from his budget. He wants a long range bond issue for construction and a higher tax on intangibles. (stocks, bonds and securities.) before the voters go to the polls next fall. The Republicans are pledged to no new taxes until 2 investigations the state tax structure are completed.

Two Republican legislators first suggested the bond issue. George Sallade of Ann Arbor would use it to build college buildings. Rep. Bowerman of Lansing would let students borrow from it and sign notes.

Public safety in the age of atomic energy has become a major target. Labor unions protested the atomic plant at Monroe as unsafe. Atomic Energy Commission at Washington said it was safe. Gov. Williams appointed a committee. They came up with a plan for an atomic energy car which would use 6 present agencies to develop the energy. The Dept. of Agriculture would develop the energy on the farm. Processors, producers and transporters who come in contact with it will have to get a license. Local health units will also be considered. The Governor's Seal of Quality bill will also come up again. A number of organizations have endorsed it and it may pass. There is also a bill to fix milk prices.

OIL WELL PRODUCTION

446 oil wells were drilled in Michigan in 1957. 227 were successful and 219 were failures. Still the total oil production for the year did not exceed 10,200,000, a loss 500,000 barrels from 1956.

A field near Jonesville in Hillsdale county was the most sensational. 6 oil wells 1 gas wells and one dry hole were drilled.

26 oil well were drilled in Montcalm county 21, in Gladwin 10, in Allegan and 16 in Tuscola. Oil was found in 25 of Michigan's 83 counties.

ANNOUNCE WEDDING

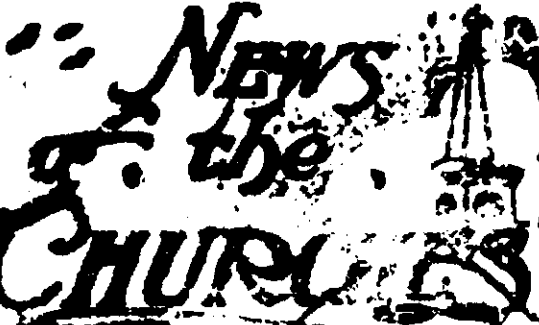

FARNUM BUILDING BURNS

The Farnum building on West Main St., the oldest building in town and the only remaining frame one caught fire at 3 a. m. Sunday and burned. Cause of fire unknown. The front part was occupied as living quarters by Leroy Lobdell and he, his wife and baby escaped only with the clothing they had on.

All 3 fire engines were used and it took until daylight to subdue the fire and save the Wakefield home next to it. The cistern on the square was pumped dry and water had to be pumped from the pond.

The building was erected by Patrick Farnum, a drover. He had the first meat market here in it. At his death his son, Edward, took it over. He bought poultry, eggs and butter and had several wagons on the road buying them. At holiday time he employed a number of people dressing hundreds of turkeys for the Detroit holiday trade.

Stuart Anderson got it after he died and converted the front into living quarters and the back into a warehouse. The White Lapping Co. was also there.

Max Russell is the present owner. He rented the front part. He also collects antique cars and had an ancient Packard, Whippet and DeSota, all in running order stored there which turned.

A purse has been started for the Lobdells who lost everything. They need clothing. Anyone having any can leave with Mrs. Roy Reason.

Current Comment

Now that 1957 has passed on we not say we are over sorry. It was a period of unrest. Charges and counter charges few of which materialized. The most important news item of the year was the Russian sputnik which knocked our balance the budget plans into a cocked hat. There was a disposition to make foreign secretary defense Charles Wilson the guest but in a press release last week he said the cuts in scientific research was made at the presidents own request because he considered the people wanted the budget balanced. On account of the sputnik we have lost face in Europe and in order to get anywhere had to agree to peace talks with Russia, at the Paris conference last month. The principal cause of our loss of face are the sputnik, failure of our own vanguard and the presidents indispositions. On the domestic front things are far from well. The auto industry is taking a licking and when that industry is down all the rest of them are too. The public considers the cars are priced too high. The makers say these prices are necessary to pay the high wages. Still the workingman does not have enough money to buy cars. Few can afford a \$100 month payment on a car.

President Eisenhower does not seem to have been lucky in his choice of cabinet officers. The criticism of Secretary of Defense Charles Wilson became so strong he resigned. Now Ezra Benson, the Missouri older who is secretary of agriculture is under fire for cutting milk and butterfat supports to 75% which means the farmers will get less for their milk. This has angered a lot of Republican senators who depend on farm votes to get elected and some have called on Benson to resign. Senator Potter of Michigan also blasted him. He says the price will not lower the price to 75% as he says. As they do not go into the matter 6 months he will offer a better system.

Did your New Years pass off with out any casualties? In Detroit a housewife got a quart of whiskey for the occasion. The family started sampling it and she hid it in the oven of the gas stove and forgot about it. She fired up the stove to make a cake, the whiskey exploded and set fire to the house and the fire dept. had to be called.

Years ago it was the custom by blacksmith shops to send the apprentice to for a left hand monkey wrench (sometimes it was a round square) but now if the office were sends the office boy to the bank for left handed check book he had better go as many banks are stocking such things for left handed people. His children had graduated. He had to admit that quite a few families with no children had had taxes to educate his children. It was a couple of years ago told me she considered it an imposition to make people who owned home pay taxes to educate those who did not and usually lived in trailers. I told her that trailer residents pay a hundred dollar taxes on food, clothing, etc. and she upkeep etc.

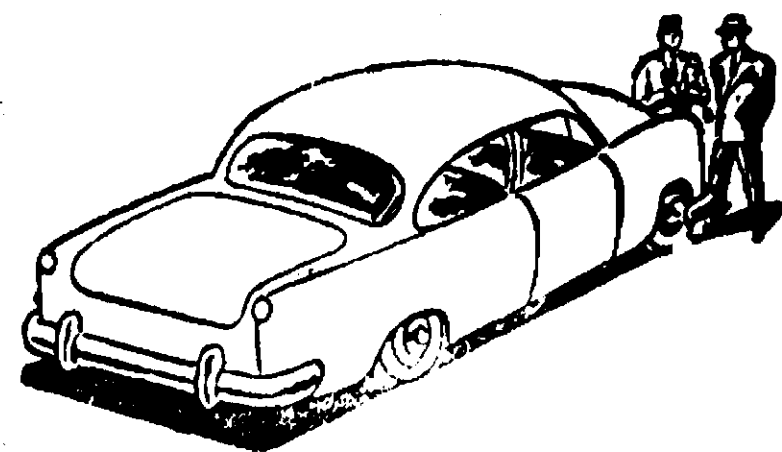
