MICHIGAN MIRROR

Government and industry are starting a joint campaign to sell Michigan to the world and each other. Dan Gerber, head of Gerber's Baby Food said there is "Michigan Means Business". About 100 leading business men and industrialists have agreed to hand together and drop the controversy over taxes and labor costs which have raged for 2 years. Whether the Republican campaign against high prices and high wages will get anywhere will not be known until after the 1958 election.

Gerber said 20 new industries located in Michigan in 1957. At the inauguration Jan. 5, Democrats took over 5 offices formerly held by Republicans. They are now aiming a control of the legislature.

Financial crises have a way of occurring every year for the state legislature. Gov. Williams who in other years wanted more taxes is for economy now. The Republicans have held off further taxes whenever possible.

Gov. Williams wants a doubling of the intangible tax. It was a republican measure passed last year to had off the governors corporations profits tax and a group of Republicans were going to propose its increase. This will only raise \$21,000,000, only half of what is needed to keep the state solvent.

CONSERVATION NOTES

The beaver trapping limits have been increased from 6 to 8 in the upper peninsula and 4 to 6 in the lower. More land will be added to forests 160 to 180 Lake Forest and 90 to AuSable. Also 40 acres of marsh to Fish Pointe Wild Life in Tuscola County.

Michigan will receive \$1,055,136 in matching funds from the Pittman-Dean tax on fire arms, ammunition. The oldest trapper to take out a license was Toby Gow, 86, of Stevensville and the youngest, Richard Ruest, 8, of DeWitt.

THE DEXTER LEADER SOLD

Frank Ames who sold the Belle Isle Enterprise 18 years ago and bought the Dexter Leader has now sold it to Walter Leonard, owner of the Chelsea Standard and has hired Carl Gower, former editor of the Lainsburg Press as editor.

The Leader is about 100 years old and was started around civil war by Col. McMillan a civil war veteran. He sold to E. Allen who owned it for a number of years. John O. Thompson was the next owner and with his sons published it for 60 years. Frank Ames bought it from the Thompson family.

MORE BREAKINS

State police arrested Earl Simonson and Larry King last week for the breakin of the Brillinger cottage at Rush Lake. Among the articles taken were 13 qts. of Canadian whisky, 4 qts. of Scotch, 4 bottles Creme de Menthe, a shotgun, watch, fishing tackle and a \$400 camera. Most of this was recovered. The two were taken before Justice Singer of Brighton Monday, waived examination and were bound over to circuit court. Charles Gatesman was appointed to defend them. Bail was set at \$1000 which was not furnished.

Monday state police picked up Mark White and William Rush on suspicion of breaking into a number of Lakeland cottages. They have since pled guilty.

ON DECK WITH THE PIRATES

The Pinckney Pirates holding 3rd period lead with 2 minutes to play of 13 points suddenly blew up and went down to defeat at the hands of the South Lyon Lions 43 to 44 in a League of Lakes game.

The Pirates started strong and held a 13 to 7 lead at the end of the first quarter. South Lyon outscored them 13 to 2 in the second quarter but Pinckney still led 25 to 40 at half.

In the second half the teams came out cold and no points were made for the first 2 minutes and 46 seconds. Then South Lyon got hot and cut the Pinckney lead to 37 to 31 at the end of the period.

Pinckney slowed up the last quarter and only scored 6 points on 2 field goals and 2 free throws.

With 2 minutes and 51 seconds left to play South Lyon took the lead the first time 40 to 39 when Dave Lechel sank the last of his 7 field goals. The Lions held this lead until the last 26 seconds when Dennis Clark got a field goal, putting Pinckney ahead again. With 9 seconds to go Lonnie Huhman fouled Lechel who made both free throws giving South Lyon the game. Pinckney made the most field goals but fell down on the free throw line.

This was the Pirates 3rd loss and their second against one victory in league play.

The Jr. varsity lost 42 to 26. The Boysville team plays here Friday night.

In other games Manchester swamped Dexter 72 to 29 and Boysville nosed Hartland 47 to 45. Howell and Brighton both won.

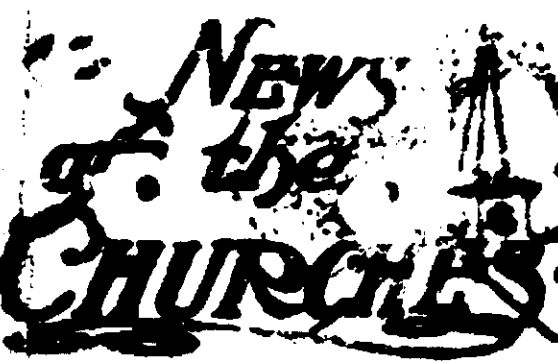

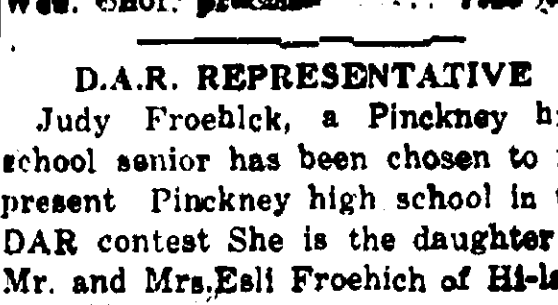

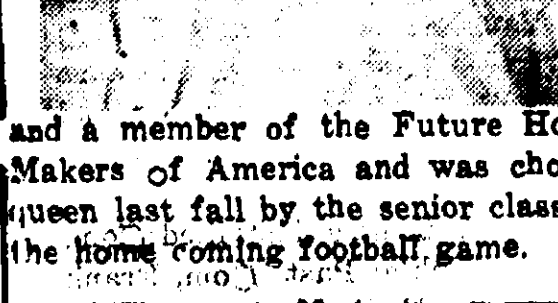


and a member of the Future Home Makers of America and was chosen queen last fall by the senior class at the home coming football game.

Current Comment

The high light of last week was the Presidents "State of the Union" message to congress. The document was drawn up to please everybody and a result pleased nobody but the the blind worshippers of the president who do not think for themselves. One writer wrote Congress met in what was a rubble heap of catch phrases and slogans. Last years watch words "Balanced Budget", "Tax Cuts" and "Economy" were strewn around like tin cans on a vacant he recommended. Most of the opposition to his missile program for which he asked \$1,270,000,000 but the joint chiefs of staff do not want any separate letter space dept as he recommended. The Taft wing as usual, is against his demand for increased foreign aid. Other Republicans are again at any lowering of the tariff which he recommended. Most of the opposition seems to be toward his attitude for peace talks with Russia. Most people feel there are only 2 courses that are open to us there. War and Peace. Many are beginning to think there'll be no peace talk as long as Foster Dulles is secretary of state. He has just turned down another offer of Russia for a peace talk. The London papers gave it 18 times as much space as the president's speech. The Detroit Free Press says: "this attitude may lose us all our allies. That if we keep on finding reasons to say no our allies will conclude it does not matter what we say and will do their own bargaining. It concludes that going along in pessimistic way with its impression we are just too tired to try means the rest of the speech was just so much wordage.

By far the most unique criticism comes from Cong. Clare Hoffman, the 84 year old Republican from Allegan, never an Eisenhower enthusiast. He said they must think they are God in their attempts to conquer outer space and should remember what happened to those who built the tower of Babel. If you are hazy on this consult your Bible. Hoffman still thinks along the same channel as he did back in days of William McKinley. He does not consider the satellite a defense measure but an act of impiety.

One thing is certain, Michigan is getting their share of defense jobs, especially missiles. Senator Potter and the Michigan Republican congressmen had a meeting last week to consider this. It was shown that California led with 208, New York had 167, the eastern states combined had 448. Ohio had 87, Mich. 58, Ill. 56, Indiana 21 and Wisconsin 17. Why did not these gentlemen get busy on this earlier? It is like locking the barn after the horse is stolen.

It now develops the president, quit smoking some years ago after his first illness. When asked by a reporter how he quit he said "I just quit." That is the only way I have known men who were hard drinkers until they were 60. Then they decided to quit and they did completely.

Another break occurred in the presidents official family when Major General Gavin head of the Research and Development Command resigned. In the recent congressional investigation he blasted the high command for procrastination in guided missile program. At first it was said his resignation was forced but efforts seem to have been made to get him to withdraw it. He was a 2 star general at the age of 37 and commanded the 82nd airborn in France in World War II.

The National Fiber Company of Rockingham, N. C. has come out with something new, a disposal paper something bag. It is wax treated to repel water and costs only a tenth as much as a deluxe sleeping bag. Its lightness and disposability will appeal to men who parachute in rugged terrain to fight forest fires.
