Neighboring Notes

While Michigan will require extra millions to keep the state from bankruptcy fringe benefits are cropping up.

One of these is a right to work bill designed to put unions out of business. It would force them to incorporate and make them subject to the same laws as business corporations and prohibit them from making political contributions. The Republicans claim the Democrats and unions have used each other to gain power in Michigan.

Democrats are working to get a minimum \$30 a week unemployment benefit for workers.

Speed limits is another issue. Many claim the 65 mile an hour an hour days and 55 miles an hour nights is too high for Mich. highway travel. They said it would be enforced but the accident rate has climbed each month on country roads.

Licensed plates is another issue. Sec. of State Hare wants a plate used 8 years with a tab affixed each year. He says it could save \$300,000.

For education Rep. Bowerman of Lansing wants \$1,000,000,000 bond issue. Rep. Sallade of Ann Arbor a \$250,000,000 and Senator Swasey a \$250,000 from which to loan students money to help them through college.

Other novel ways to get the state out of the red are proposed. Some would tap the 250,000,000 veterans fund. Only about a million a year is used. Rep. Rollin would pay liquor bills only every 90 days. This he says would release \$19,000,000 for other purposes. The liquor companies would have to agree to it through Rep. Stirling Eaton, Plymouth, would tax dues to any organization or society, club or lodge. A Boy Scout who pays 50c dues would pay 5c and one who pays \$25 00c dues \$2.50. He says this would release \$14,000,000. Rep. Eaton pays dues to 6 organizations himself.

CONSERVATION NOTES

The conservation commission has agreed to support legislation opening the deer season in the upper peninsula Nov. 10. For the last 3 seasons there have been heavy snows there during the deer season. An earlier opening in the lower peninsula would be harmful.

There will probably be some changes in the duck hunting season. One fault is the excessive number of blinds which limit the number of hunters and cause the fowl to leave Michigan much earlier than they would otherwise. One suggestion is to allow no blinds further out than 200 ft. from shore. Another to have all blinds removed from the lakes each night.

More than 3,106,000 fish were planted in Michigan in 1957 including 849,000 trout, 864,000 pike, 116,000 bass and 132,500 bluegills.

Current Comments

Far perhaps a century the nation's railroads enjoyed a preferred position as a public utility. They were given rights of way, hundreds of acres of public lands some of it covered with dense forest and on some valuable mineral deposits were discovered. Then for the past 50 years they have been operated as a regulated monopoly. The supreme court has just ruled in the Milwaukee case that a railroad operation to continue need not show a profit. That over-all operations and its revenue must be considered. So far the freight receipts have been able to pay the railroads loss in passenger service. The railroads have an investment of \$27,000,000,000 in buildings, land, trackage and rolling stock. They claim they are not getting a fair deal on taxes. 11 percent of their operating expenses are taxes the trucks only pay 6.5 and the state maintains the highways they run on and barges pay 4.5 percent. Incidentally in Michigan, there are 31 depots for sale as they no longer have passenger business. The largest is the 11 story New York Central terminal at Detroit. The Ypsilanti and Hastings depots. The Pinckney depot was sold and removed some years ago.

Governor Williams will meet with mayors of Ann Arbor Jackson and other cities to discuss bus operations, these cities were in danger of losing their busses a year ago when some smart man worked out a plan to save them. The cities leased the busses from the bus companies and hired the bus men to operate them for wages. This got them out of paying weight and gas tax and their license plates only cost them 50c a year. Attorney General has ruled this is illegal and that they are required to pay weight and gas taxes. They claim they can not operate if they do and this meeting is to iron this out.

Mayor Miranni of Detroit announced a big economy program but when he started to carry it out he found although everyone professes to be for economy, they want it to start with the other fellow. First he announced he would close the Detroit camp for underprivileged children at Brighton. This caused a howl of anguish by the groups who have been using it. Then he cut 57 off the fire dept. and forced many who had reached the retirement age to retire on half pay which they did not like. His next was to bar 65 Catholic basketball teams from using public school gyms. This caused such an uproar it was rescinded. Back in 1910 when Osborn was governor he got economy minded and vetoed every appropriation that came up whether needed or not. Woodbridge N. Ferris Democrat succeeded him and he oked all needed appropriations. Osborn tried several times to get reelected governor again but never made it.

Adrian deBoom of Owosso, state representative from this district who announced his retirement some time ago has now thrown his hat in the ring for state senator. He would succeed Donald Smith. Smith's election has always been questioned. He moved to California after he was elected new lives there.

The Ann Arbor Board of Education has passed a resolution opposing the bill introduced in the legislature providing for religious instruction in the schools. Their reason it violates separation of church and state.

Another attempt to revive the defunct KuKlux Klan seems to have flopped at at Lumerton, N. C. last week and their leader, Rev. James Cole has been arrested for inciting a riot. The Lumbee Indian reservation is located there and the Klan held a big bed sheet and pillow case meeting to prevent the Indians from moving into white residential districts. About 1000 Indians in war paint and regalia descended on the Klan and put them to ignominious flight. Rev. Cole says there will be another meeting but we think the Klan is breathing life into the Klan are known as trying to revive the dead.

Elector Unable To Make Personal Application, Procedure

SEC. 504. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the Township, City or Village in which his legal residence is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election or primary election by securing from the Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which is located his legal residence, duplicate registration cards and executing in duplicate the registration affidavit before a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

Unregistered Persons Not Entitled To Vote

SEC. 491. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 116, P. A. 1954)

Transfer of Registration; Application, Time

SEC. 505. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the City cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto, and the date from which he was last registered, or by applying to the Clerk for a transfer. Such transfers shall not be made within the 100 days next preceding any election or primary election.

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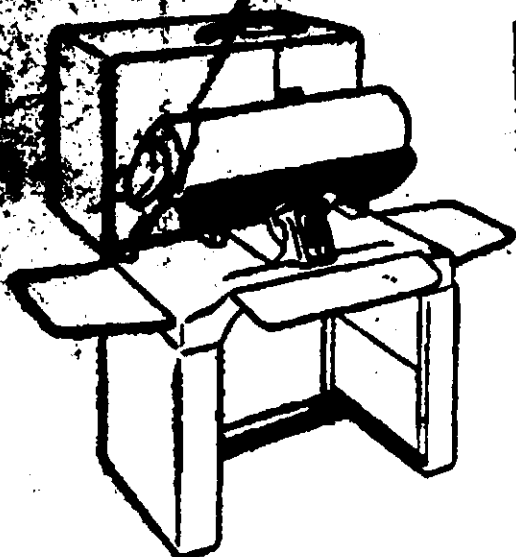
