AMERICAN MIRROR

Republicans started the legislative session by agreeing with the governor that the schools needed more money. That is about the only thing they did agree with him on. With a \$6,000,000 school deficit facing them, \$14,000,000 more needed to maintain the schedule of \$190 per scholar they had to get down to brass tacks. The governor wanted to raise the formula to \$197 per scholar. The senate killed this by 2 votes but the fight will be in the house. The Republicans plan to make up \$20,000,000 of the shortage from the general fund. If they hold to their slogan of no new taxes there is bound to be a \$6,000,000 shortage.

There are many remedies proposed. Gov. Williams would increase the tangible tax. This is now 40c on a \$1000 bank deposit. The banks have been paying it. He would increase it to \$1.40.

Rep. Conlin of Tipton would save \$18,000,000 by only paying the liquor bills every 90 days. The liquor and cigarette tax was also continued. Republicans are pushing their version, remembering school men have complained in the past they left the school financing until the last days of the session making it impossible for them to make up their budgets.

Attorney General Adams has ruled. Taxpayers Association can use tax money allocated to them. Each of them receives \$100,000 a year and conducts their own program. There are 4 groups.

CONSERVATION DEPT. NOTES

Bounty payments for wolves, foxes, coyotes and bobcats cost the people of Michigan \$211,000 in 1957. Only 5 wolves were taken, 27,997 foxes 2866 coyotes and 1004 bobcats.

Artificial lights may not be used if appearing through ice in January and February.

In general deer appear to be in good condition due to a light winter. 2 were found dead near Mio from unknown causes.

The state will add 175 acres to the Anable forest in Crawford county. Also 1000 ft. of frontage on the Kalamazoo river.

Sale of timber products from the state forests returned \$976,000 to the state treasury in 1957. Most of the sales were for pulpwood and logs. The bulk of this land came into the hands of the state by tax reversion. After being logged over and burned it was abandoned. Attempts at farming failed. Through reforestation and state management this land now produces valuable timber. In 1948 only 8 % of the pulpwood used in Michigan was produced in state forests. In 1956 this had increased to 19 %.

IN PLANE CRASH

Lt. John Hammel, son of the Everett Hammels of Pinckney was in a crash landing at the Pinecastle Air Base Florida last week. An outburst of landing gear tire blew out. The pilot radioed the air base who cleared the runway. The B-47 Stratofortress bounced off the runway, caught fire but Lt. Hammel and 3 other officers escaped injury.

Current Comment

This nation has at last launched a satellite. The army succeeded in putting their Jupiter satellite in the air where it is estimated it will remain 2 years or more. The guiding genius behind this was Dr. Werner von Braun, head of the army rocket dept. and former scientist for Hitler. In all 19 German scientists were employed in the dept. In the meantime the navy's second attempt to launch a vanguard missile failed as this one again blew to pieces like the first one. The strife between the army and navy as to who would be the first to put one in the air is said to have slowed up the experiments. Of course they are still in a primitive state and we will not be over the hump until a man is sent up in one and returns safely. That will be some years yet although a trip to the moon is prophesied in 10 years time. A high school rocket club at Battle Creek, has been criticized for sending up five nukes with their rockets. At another boy was injured when a rocket exploded.

President Eisenhower said in his last press interview he would favor a tax cut as a last emergency if the present recession got serious which probably means there will be none as congress would have to make adjustments all along the line and we do not think they are in the mood for it. There are all sorts of remedies suggested. Some want to cancel the income tax. Cong. Chamberlain of this district wants to repeal the excise tax on cars and trucks. His district, the 6th has more auto workers than any other district in the nation. The Flint office of Unemployment paid out \$119,007,702 in 1957, which is double what they paid out 1954. It is at least attempting to do something. Most content themselves with barking at the moon. George Van Fursen who intended to take on Gov. Williams toured the state but didn't find any sentiment for himself says Gov. Williams not President Eisenhower it is to blame for the depression in Michigan. He did not say who was to blame in the other 47 states.

The Humane Slaughtering bill passed the house by a voice vote last week but caused considerable merriment 84 year old Cong. Charles Hoffman of Allegan contributing most of it. He claimed the bill which reads live stock includes chickens too. He got out in the aisle and would up like a base ball pitcher and showed how he used to wring chickens necks when he was a boy on the farm. Rep. Bentley of Owosso said it would cost the Peet Packing Company who are in his district \$40,000 to install a carbon dioxide chamber to slaughter live stock. The bill provides that packers selling to government must use humane methods. As yet it does not take in the farmer who kills one beef or a few pigs a year.

Mayor Miranoff's economy move is off to a slow start. The move to abandon the recreation camp at Brighton has been abandoned. This handles 1500 underprivileged children. The fees will be raised to \$4 to make it self supporting. Now he is looking into another matter Aid for Dependent Children. This is money paid to support children of broken families. Most of whom it is claimed are illegitimate. Of the 600 to 800 prostitutes in Detroit over half draw aid checks. They get \$153 a month for one child and \$20 a month for each additional. One has 10 all by different fathers. The day they get their checks is known as Santa Claus day and part of the money is spent in the bars. The childrens Aid Bureau say these conditions are nothing new, that they have existed since time immemorial and that these dependent children must be cared for.

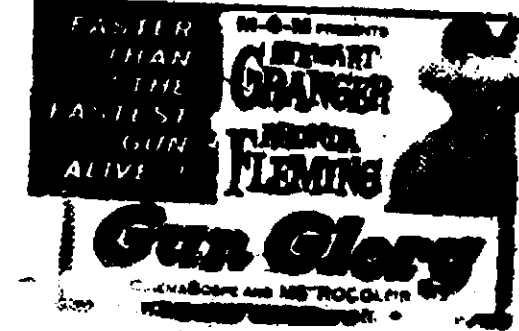

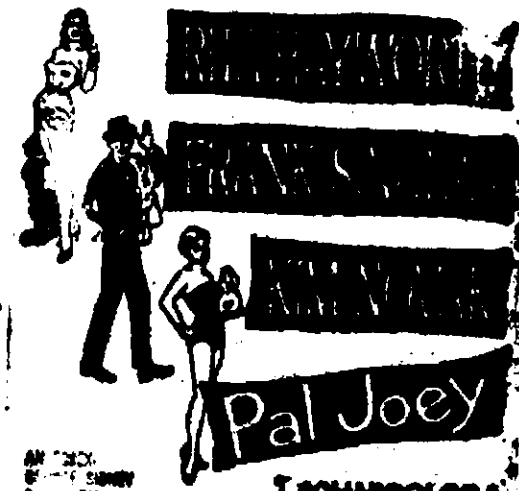

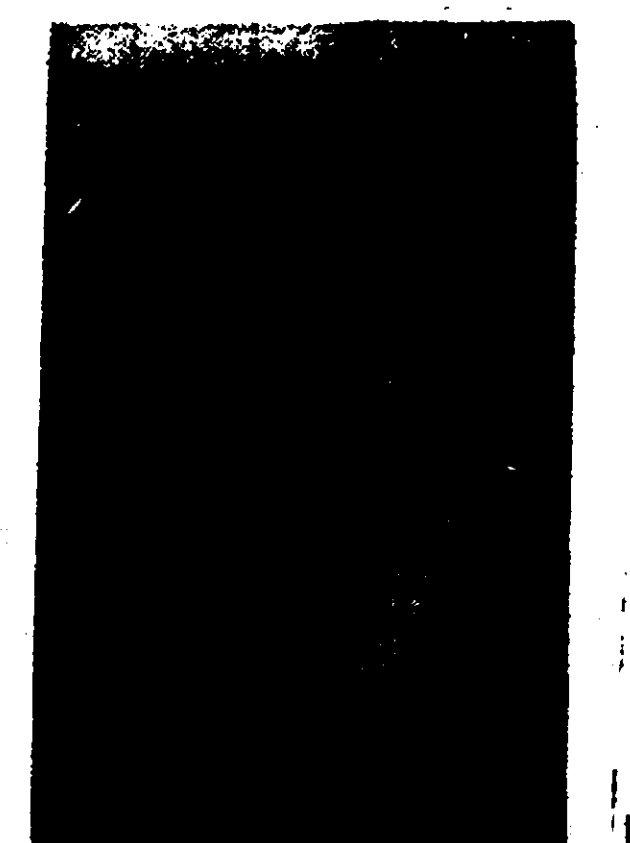
