AMERICAN MIRROR

Democrats in Michigan have given the umpire their batting order for the 1958 campaign but the Republicans are still looking for players to fill their lineup. The umpire in the battle for high stakes is the voter.

Governor Williams said some time Phil Hart would run for one office and for the other. Now Hart has announced for senator the governor is expected to announce for a 6th term. He thinks he would be a more attractive candidate for president as governor than a senator.

Rep. Russell Strange, 22, of Clare is the youngest legislator. He was not 21 when elected. 14 bills have been introduced by him. One is a bill allowing probate judges to give out names of juvenile offenders to provide for an assistant township treasurer. Improve county road commissions. A school aid bill. An attempt was made last week to draft Prof. Pau Bagwell of Michigan State as a Republican candidate for governor but he refused to pin himself down. Rep. Sallade of Ann Arbor and Senator Hutchinson of Fenwick are also receptive, but old guard says they are too young and besides they have liberal ideas. Rep. Sallade says he is not out of the picture yet.

Current Comment

Stung by Democrat charges that he was handing out much of Hoover's Prosperity is just Around Corner stuff President Eisenhower announced a pump priming program last week in the form of a public 2 billion dollar building program, mostly postoffices. However there is a joker to it as Postmaster General Summerfield got him to tie his 5c postage bill in with it. According to the plan Detroit will get 4 sub postoffices and Ann Arbor one at West Stadium Blvd. No others are mentioned in this section. Relief will not be immediate as congress has to ok the sites have to be selected plans drawn and bids advertised for. Whether this is the shot in the arm needed remains to be seen. The unemployed hit the 4,494,000 mark Feb. 1, the highest since 1950. Most of them are mechanics and how they will fit in a building program remains to be seen. After the president made this announcement the president left for Georgia to play golf, shoot quail and get over his cold. But Georgia has several inches of snow. The Detroit Free Press wonders if they are declaring some of the old postoffices obsolete because they have Jim leve's name on the cornerstone.

Some progress has been made on a summit peace conference as Secretary of State Dulles has backed down on his demand for foreign ministers conference first. Of course the East and West are miles apart but they are agreed that the present armistice race with its rising burden of taxation cannot continue without bankrupting the nations involved. A tax cut is impossible while it continues. There are many debatable questions to be ironed out such as unification of Germany, our withdrawal of troops from foreign bases.

Over 600 pupils were expelled New York City schools for hoodlums last week. In some cases there were stabbings. In Detroit Supt. Brown, III says 282 pupils expelled 1957. Here 2 out of 3 a year is about the number ousted. W.K. Kelsey in Detroit News says the false assumption that every boy and girl is entitled to a high school education is to blame for this. He says giving some pupils a beneficial high school education is impossible. They should be weeded out before they reach high school. This condition is growing worse since enrollments increased. Detroit schools cancelled all night athletic contests due to gang fights and stabbings. Dexter high school basket ball team played here recently with but one regular in the lineup. The rest were off the team disciplinary reasons. You cannot blame the teachers. They are swamped by the record enrollment.

We have received a copy of the history of the Detroit Edison Company by Raymond Miller, professor Wayne University. It gives a remarkable history of the company and the electric light bulb. Thomas Edison was not the discover of electricity but he invented first practical light bulb. He used a carbon filament inside a glass bulb. Previously thread, bamboo fiber and aluminum had been used unsuccessfully. This was in 1886. In 1878 a Belgian Charles VanDeposele invented the electric arc light. This was derived from 2 carbon pencils a half inch in diameter. The current leaping from one to the other made a blinding white light. But they made hissing sound and were unsuitable for interior lighting although they were used for street lights for many years. The company was established in Detroit in 1888. They first wired buildings for nothing. Expansion was slow, Dexter, South Lyon, Howell and other places put in their own plants. Private companies others. Glen Gardner put in the first Pinckney plant in 1909. Only lights were furnished as they did not operate during day time. Gasoline engines were first used but the light was unsteady and the exhaust from the engine could be heard a mile away. Water power was used in some places but the steam engine was found to be the most practical. This furnishes Detroit Edison power now.
