The Michigan Mirror

Michigan's economic stagnation is being tested by a business setback that both parties agree is gripping the nation either temporarily or on a long range basis. Republicans are faced with a need for economy against demands for expanded service in the fields of education and mental health. They announced their platform was to cut the budget and levy no new taxes. This started repercussions at once. The Democrats denounced it as a trial balloon. The Republicans say if the reaction against their program is big enough it would certainly mean the people want expanded service regardless and hence new taxes.

The principal deficit is the school fund which is \$19,000,000 short. Previously this was financed by 2c out of the 3c sales tax but this has fallen way off. The legislature got by last year by boosting the liquor and cigarette tax \$25,000.00 but this is \$6,000,000 short this year and does not take into account the 70,000 new pupils registered this year in Michigan schools. The Republicans say the deficit will be \$15,000,000 which can be managed by cutting state services 10%.

As Lt. Governor Phil Hart got free TV and Radio time but as a candidate for U. S. Senator he must pay for it or his opponent gets an equal amount of free time. This does not affect Governor Williams who will continue to get free time as governor.

Republicans are confused by the speed with which the 200 industrialists jumped at the chance to become Gov. Williams ambassadors of good will. Most of them are rated as Republicans. A Republican worker said "Gov. Williams has got us both over a barrel."

Current Comments

The schools became an object of censure in the legislature last week when a member demanded a law curbing the MEA or school lobby. He said they demand more money every year and usually get it and do not always make the best use of it. He demanded they return to the fundamentals of education and cut out the frills. Things were further enlivened by a hassle between Holland Christian a church school, and University of Michigan. The University recently threatened to drop the school from the accredited list because they did not teach certain required subjects. The school said they are a private school and do not have to include swimming, band or athletics in their program. Also they added being on the university list does not mean a thing.

Dean of Men Rea at the University of Michigan has suggested that a tap room be placed in the Michigan Union there. Now to drinking is allowed on university property. The result is the students do their drinking off university grounds. He said other universities, notably Wisconsin have tap rooms. He said in this way it would be possible to control drinking and abolish illegal drinking. It is doubtful if any action will be taken on it this year.

The legislature killed the bill to abolish Sunday Sales. This was sponsored by the Council of Churches and Catholic organizations. Small business was also for it as some supermarkets were keeping open Sunday forcing them to do likewise. The Michigan Grange and Farm Bureau were also for it but not 7 Day Adventists who keep Saturday instead of Sunday. The big argument against it was its unconstitutionality as it was claimed it violates the law providing for the free exercise of religion.

The senate has passed a postal raise. This would raise the rate to 5c for out of town postage and 4c for local postage. Then they passed another bill increasing wages for postal employees. As these wages increase come to \$5,000,000 more than the increased rates will bring. President is expected to veto it. However it will not get to the president until the house passes it. There is some confusion over zone boundaries. Some local zones extend 20 miles. In other cases two villages might not be over 4 miles apart. The postmaster general is expected to lay out the boundaries but the postal user will not know them.

Here is a pointer to you if you like to write letters to your congressman. Speaker Sam Rayburn, a veteran of 35 years in congress says he always opens letters addressed to him in pencil. He says if it is important enough to address in pencil it is important enough to read.

The Michigan legislature is exploring taxes for new taxes. A law to raise marriage licenses to \$5 last week. Now they have since come up with a new tax. Rep. Conlin of Tip-ton, rated a tax expert would levy a personal tax on autoes. There is an old saying about the straw that broke the camel's back. It would seem the auto is carrying about all the taxes it can carry. There is a weight tax sales tax, license plate tax and in a lesser degree the gas tax. We doubt Mr. Conlin can put his bill over although he claims it would raise \$18,000,000 and balance the budget.

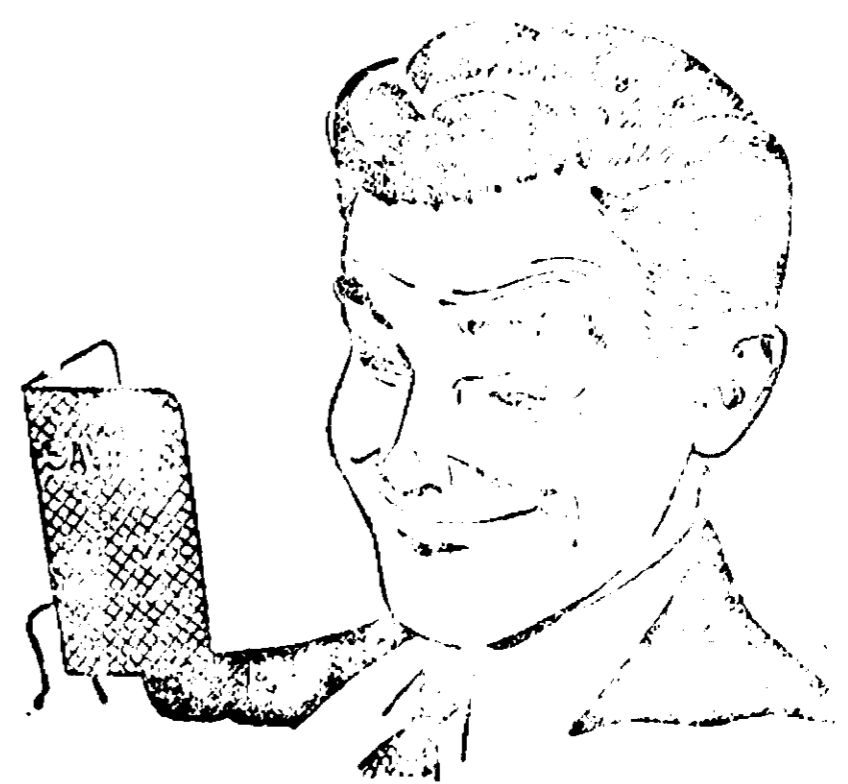

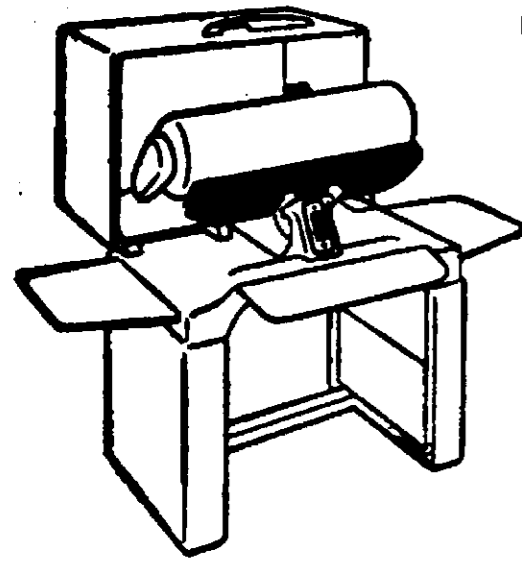
