The Michigan Mirror

Political campaigns have already started in Michigan although the Republican ticket is headless as they have not come up with a candidate for governor. Harry Moore, a Detroit auto dealer is willing to be the sacrifice against Gov. Williams but he is little known and is regarded as a self starter. Prof. Paul Bagwell of Michigan State, defeated for auditor general in 1956 will make a survey to find out if there is any sentiment for him but says if he runs he must be adequately financed.

The Republicans intend to picture Walter Reuther, head labor leader as their bogey man. Republican legislature recently refused to confirm 2 of Gov. Williams appointments because they were labor union men. So their campaign will be strictly anti labor union. They will also blame Gov. Williams for the tax es passed by the Republican controlled legislatures which industry out of the state. They say if the governor is elected he will spend most of his time campaigning for the presidential nomination.

The Democrats are expected to campaign on national issues. The failure of the Eisenhower administration to do anything has produced the present depression. If there is no upturn and widespread unemployment still prevails this fall this could be a winning issue.

Laws have been introduced to make school busses safer. Cars would have to halt when they meet a stopped bus and bus drivers would have to escort children across the street.

Three Lake Michigan islands, Hog, High and Garden will be used in experiments to establish grouse populations. Similar experiments on Beaver, Bois Blanc and Drummond Islands were successful.

Michigan's private shooting preserve program is underway with 16 established and 14 applications on file. All have requested permission to shoot pen reared pheasants and 4 to shoot pen reared ducks. Their hunting season will be 150 days.

Questionnaires have been mailed out to 27000 deer hunters asking their experience the past season.

Brown McClaren Closes Village Election Results

The papers are featuring an announcement by Morris Bond, president of the Brown-McClaren Company of Hamburg that the plant will close down March 31 and liquidate its assets. He admitted the plant grossed \$1,500,000 last year and made a profit but said the 500 stock holders can invest their money in other enterprises which will pay bigger dividends. The company has 125 employees. During the war they had double that number.

The plant located there 26 years ago, coming from Detroit on account of lower labor and living costs. There has never been unionized. There was never a McClaren at Hamburg. It was controlled by A. Brown, Harry Andrews. When these two gentlemen died the plant fell on evil days. Control changed frequently. Conditions have not been good for several years. Morris Bond, a Jewish gentleman and associates of Detroit got control. They also control a number of Detroit factories including Michigan Malleable.

The reasons for closing were given as high taxes and refusal of employees to get out production. The treasurer said the Hamburg property tax was only about \$6000. Of course there are state and federal taxes. The factory covers 8 acres. The Brighton chamber of commerce called a meeting to try to keep the factory operating. Howell chamber of commerce tried another angle. A Peoria, Ill. stamping company wants to come here and they wanted to know if the building would be available. It would employ twice as many people as the Hamburg factory.

There have been repercussions on the closing of the factory. The Republican county committee mailed out as campaign material a reprint of Morris Bond's charges that high taxes and wages and low production caused the closing of the plant. On the other hand a group of employees, all of whom had been there over 20 years in a signed statement denied Bonds charges and gave them the short and ugly word. This was in a signed statement in the Ann Arbor News. The signers, most of whom we know were Earl Fisher, Bill Bennett, Tom and Harold Mohman, Clinton Swatz, Gordon Forest, Tom Burris and L. Terry. They stated mismanagement was the cause of closing and that Bond was incompetent and had replaced all experienced supervisory employes with inexperienced ones. As to the highest wages women get \$1.75 an hour, men \$1.85 to \$2.50. They said the rumor was 2 years ago when Bond got control he intended to liquidate. They added the small stockholders have had nothing to say but they intend to put up a fight.

Current Comments

President Eisenhower's upturn for March 1 did not come to pass and now he says it will be some time in April. Instead the number of unemployed increased by 600,000 March 1. The total unemployed is 5,500,000, the highest since World War II. The president is still reluctant to do anything. He urges the people to keep a stiff upper lip and their courage up. The conditions are similar to those of 1929 when President Hoover handed out the same line of chatter, but that depression lasted 4 years. There have been no epidemic of bank crashes as happened then. But if unemployment continues it might again if the people are unable to make payments on the property they bought. There were foreclosures galore in 1929 and the value of property dropped to less than 50 percent of value. Riots developed at foreclosure sales and \$1 auctions became popular. The government finally declared a moratorium on foreclosures and tax title sales. This delaying relief measure from month to month might prove fatal now as it did in 1929.

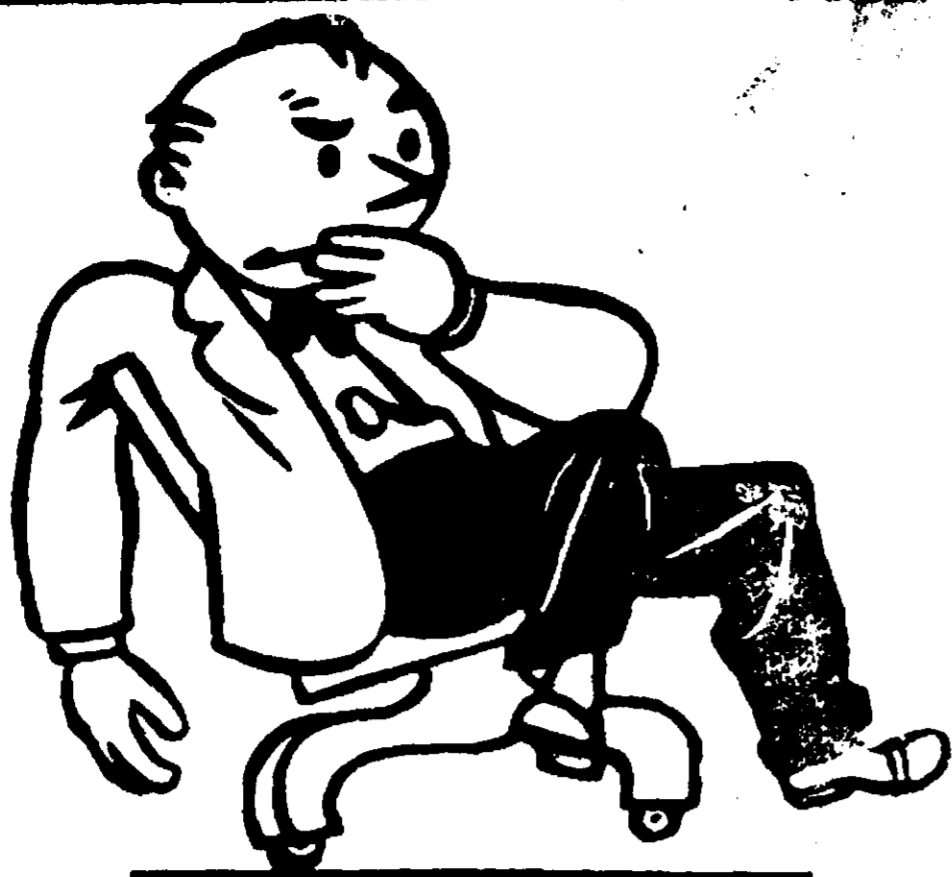
The legislature is inclined to play politics. They passed a bill last week putting all license plate sales in the hands of the county treasurers most of whom are Republicans. The county treasurers had it once but in the depression the Democrats won a lot of these offices and the law was changed giving the secretary of state power to appoint the dealer. By this means he could build a political machine. Now the Democrats hold the office of secretary of state. The governor is expected to veto the bill. A bill to raise the cost of drivers licenses 50c is expected to pass. This is to pay the cost of drivers schools which went \$750,000 in the red last year.

The insurance commission has approved an increase in auto insurance rates. These would range from \$1 a year in Detroit to \$18 outstate. Drivers under 25 would pay a higher rate. Broken down the increase would be \$2 to \$4 in Flint and Grand Rapids; \$4 to \$11 in Battle Creek, Kalamazoo, Jackson, Bay City and Saginaw and the rest of the state \$3 to \$18.

The small foreign cars continue to make inroads in the auto sales in Michigan. 915 were sold in February. The German Volkswagen led with 476 sales. The other cars were British, French and Italian. We still do not understand why American manufacturers do not make a car to compete with them.

The Air Force Secretary has just turned down the request of Gen. Billy Mitchell's son to declare the conviction of his father in World War I days null and void. He was convicted of insubordination and disrespect to his superiors when he branded the army and navy obsolete. Secretary Douglas of the air force said the charges were sustained. The general's son does not want to give up hope. Back in Civil War days Gen. Robert E. Lee, Stonewall Jackson and Jefferson Davis were accused of treason and warrants issued for them as traitors. The warrants were never served but the charges were allowed to stand until last year, nearly 90 years after when they were expunged from the records.

Some progress is being made on summit peace talks between this country and Russia. Premier Bulganin has agreed to Sec. Dulles foreign minister's conference but wants all the small nations invited. He also wants to name the subjects for discussion. This Dulles will not agree to. Still the pressure for peace talks is strong as the people want to end the armament race and the constant rising burden of war defense taxes. There will be more notes and some day a peace meeting will take place even though Mr. Dulles is only lukewarm toward it.

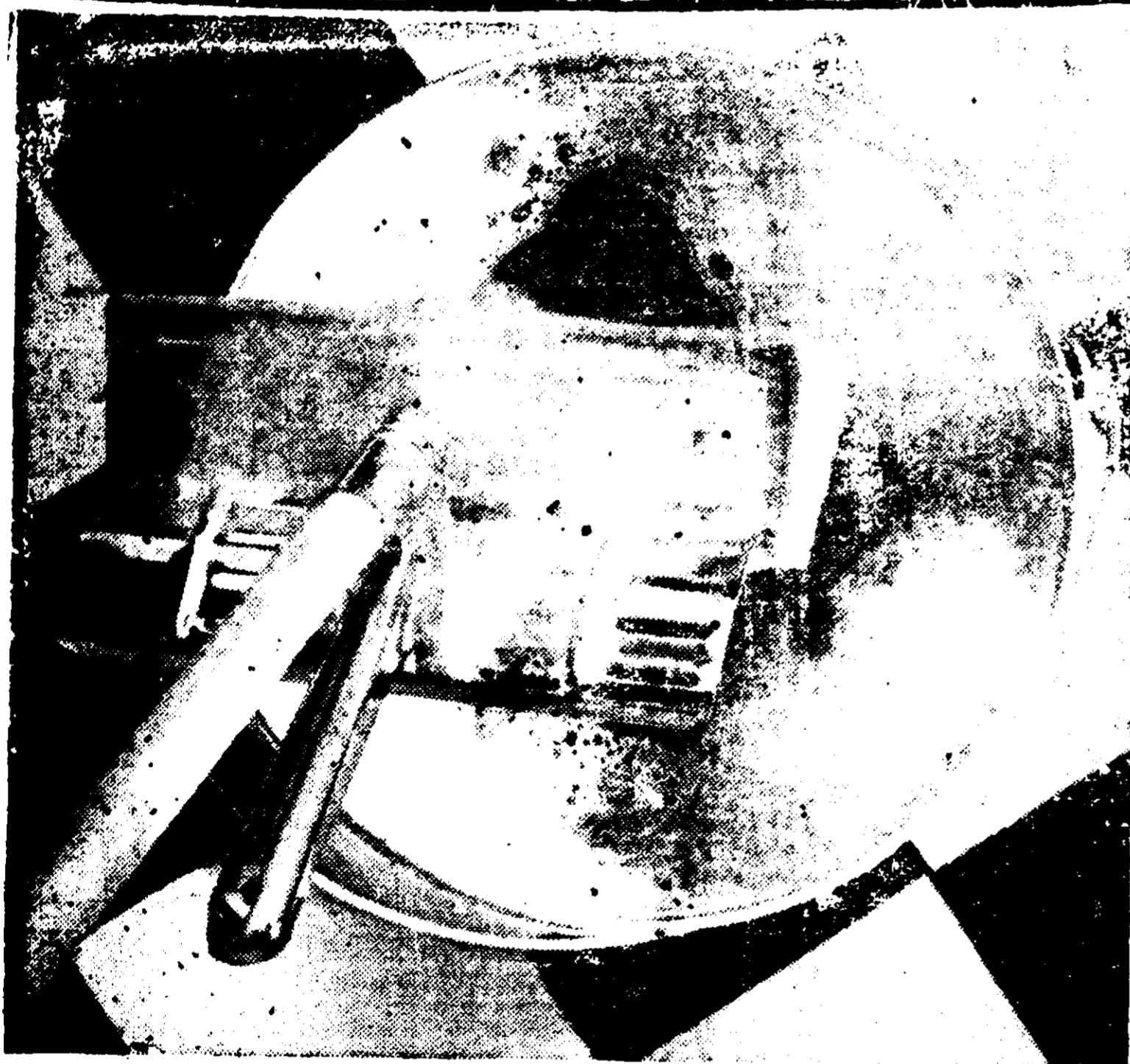

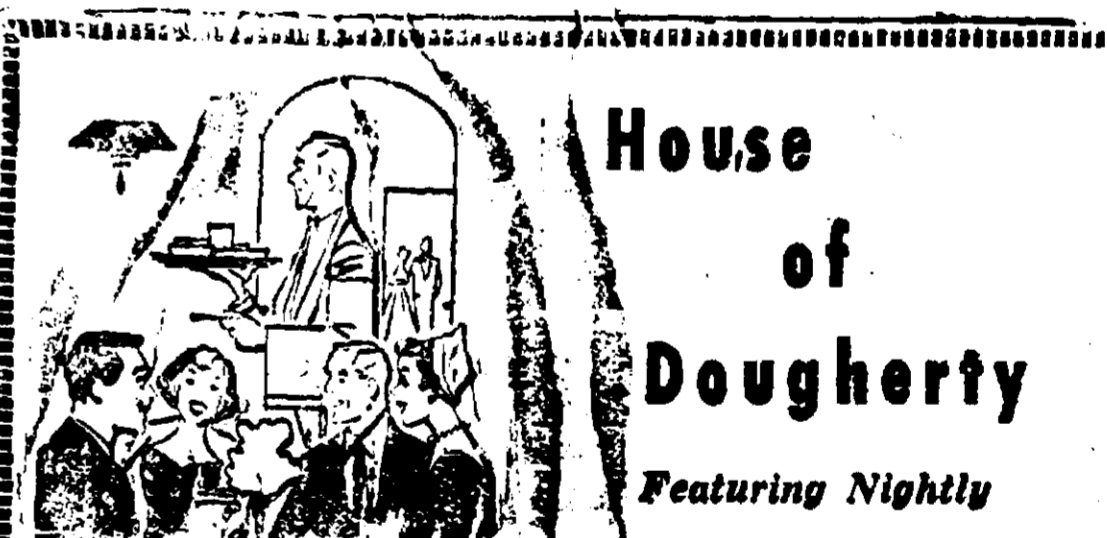

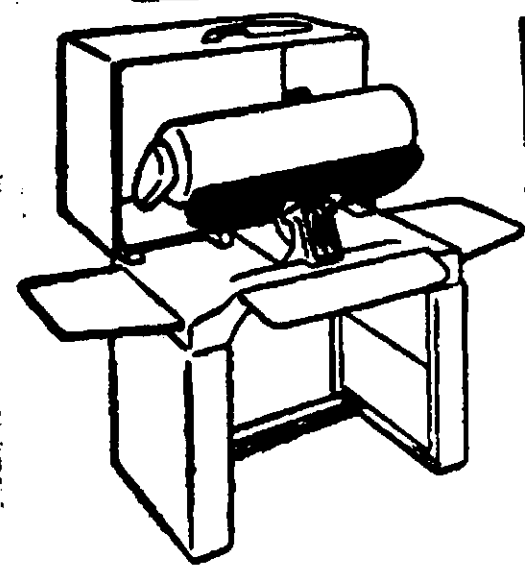
