Stormy winds of economic climates have toppled thrones and crushed empires. Historians say Herbert Hoover was a good president but a victim of circumstances.

Universities, colleges, schools, prisons and mental institutions all want more money. The only answer is increased taxes or lesser services. The Republicans are pledged to no new taxes, that means service cuts. The University of Michigan has already registered a kick about the one in store for them. Other institutions will probably do the same.

Another economy proposal is to cut the number of state employees.

Still many even some Republicans are certain the budget cannot be cut enough to balance it. There are important tax bills now awaiting action. The main proposal is the governors' intangible tax plan to raise \$20,000,000. The Governor says it will only hit the big depositors. The Republicans say it will hit the little ones.

It is now agreed the main Republican plan to delay liquor payments 90 days will not raise the required \$20,000,000. Action has been delayed too long. If not enacted before the last of May it will not raise over \$8,000,000.

Long ago John Fitzgerald was a member of the house. His son, Frank, became governor and died in office. Now his son, John, is a candidate for state senator from Shiawassee. Other candidates are Rep. Adrian deBooni and Jay Tarbur, president.

CONSERVATION NOTES

The mild winter cut down on deer starvation. Snow was 30 inches deep around Lake Superior and some starvation was reported in Baraga county. In upper part of the lower peninsula deer were beginning to use part of their summer range.

The season for taking carp, dog fish, suckers and gar pike with spears and bow and arrow starts May.

Pellet food for fish now saves the state some \$60,000 a year. The pellets were too big for newly hatched trout so old coffee grinders were used to make the pellets small enough. Frozen liver is used.

The Free Press is running a series of articles on the schools by a feature writer. Last week he charged that seniors are graduated because they have a record of 4 years high school attendance and their lack of proficiency academic studies is ignored. He adds few of them can pass a 7th grade examination. He also raps the schools for dropping the teaching of grammar. He says few of the pupils can talk correctly or conjugate a sentence. We have often wondered why so many of the subjects we had in our high school days have been dropped. We had Latin, German, zoology, botany, physiology, grammar, American and English history, rhetoric. We believe American history is still taught to some extent. Years ago all seniors had to go to Howell and take the 8th grade teacher examination. This was discontinued some time before World War 1.

Current Comment

The measures to relieve the depression are still in the talk state. The president announced that money will be released for highway and public building construction but much of this has already been started. To any works program or tax cut he is opposed. He would extend unemployment benefits 13 weeks. He wants to wait a couple of months before doing anything more drastic. Vice Pres. Nixon and Senator Knowland echo his words. In other words they do not think the depression is as bad as she is painted. The Detroit Free Press calls it the president's double chin up speech. It reminds me of an old chestnut John Berg used to tell. It seems a friend of his ate too much pig knuckles and sauer kraut one night and had a dream. He dreamed he went to Heaven. The streets were paved with gold and they were playing harps and singing but the tunes were strange. He did not feel at home. So he went up to St. Peter and said, "Peter I am new here. Will you help me up the rules before I pull a boner and get sent to the other place?" St. Peter said, "We have no rules. There are 2 things to bear in mind though. A cent is a million dollars and a minute a million years." The man said, "Lend me a cent St. Peter?" St. Peter said, "Sure, Waite a Minute."

The legislature voted down the attempt to abolish the any deer season. The conservation department was opposed to the attempt. The bill was backed by resort owners in the north who want the deer for tourist attraction. The thicker the deer the more tourists.

Autos are not as popular in Europe as here on account of low wages and taxes. Bicycles are popular and people who have visited Ireland, Germany, England and France say most everyone there rides a bicycle. Now motor cycles and motor scooters are becoming popular. Spain who had few now has 200,000 since American bikes were established there and American dollars put in the hands of the people. There is one to every 140 inhabitants there. Great Britain has one to every 27 and France one to every 19.

The Republicans have come up with a candidate for governor in the person of Prof. Paul Bagwell of Michigan State an original blunderbuss man and a liberal. Richard Moore, a Detroit auto dealer had already announced. Indications are he will not have the united support of his party. The 14th Republican District, Grosse Pointe where read President Eisenhower out of the party. They blasted him in a press release and said all he had done was to glorify socialism. This district is composed of millionaires and in the past has furnished most of the republican campaign funds. Fred Alger who was in Florida was on the board. He resigned after they issued their statement. Senator Smekens of Coldwater, a conservative doesn't like Bagwell. He says the latter is against a Right to Work Law and will not balance the budget. The Detroit Free Press calls him a supporter of lost cases such as a high tariff, alien and sedition laws, taxing the poor to support the rich and starving the public schools. It adds support of these measures by Northern Republicans and Southern Democrats only makes them look ridiculous.

Senator Potter made a speech in the senate last week blasting the war dept. for buying some \$21,000,000 worth of Japanese made trucks while American auto and truck makers were unemployed. The war dept. said this is part of the mutual assistance pact we signed with Japan where we agreed to buy a certain amount of Japanese made goods.


Ona Campbell and wife were called to St. Louis Friday by the death of Orel Kime. The funeral and burial were at Breckenridge Cemetery.



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
