Education is at the cross roads in Michigan.

Education posts are being weighed against the American principal of an education for all who can benefit from it and turn their talents to the betterment of the world.

The basic problem is the need for keeping America abreast of the world.

Students find it more difficult now to make ends meet with increased tuition and higher costs of living.

The legislature is the focal point. It is required by law to raise sufficient money to support the government. Their problem now is how to maintain this service when the tax burden is overpowering and the yield from existing tax levies are dropping.

For years the state sales tax more than covered the states school aid payments. Then two years ago these receipts dropped way off and the state took \$20,000,000 from the general fund to pay the school. Last year they raised \$20,000,000 to pay them by increasing the liquor and cigarette tax. This year they have 70,000 more pupils and find themselves \$16,000,000 short. If they maintain their formula of \$190 per pupil higher education is in the same fix. The legislature cut their budget to \$87,000,000 a 2.8 percent cut of \$3,500,000. Educators were shocked and said many important programs authorized by the legislature would have to be abandoned.

Some educators criticize the extension programs but educators say the federal government pays 40% of the cost of them.

The state needs more money to finish constructions of prisons already started for the Boys Vocational School and to expand mental health facilities.

Delaying liquor payments 90 days is expected to bring in \$9,000,000 by May and \$14,000,000 by June. Another \$60,000 may be borrowed from the Veterans Bonus fund. All this will continue until the last day of the legislative session.

CONSERVATION NOTES

17 people were killed and 261 were wounded last year during Michigan's small deer and game season. Deer license sales totalled 466,300 and small game hunters 687,000. There were 37,600 bow and arrow hunters. This is one death per 66,614 hunters. In 1956 the death average was one per 44,351 hunters.

Smelt spawning runs start late in March or early April. The best spots to get smelt are streams running into Lake Michigan. The second best are streams running into Saginaw Bay.

There is wide spread support for a bond issue of \$30,000,000 to improve Michigan state parks. Resort owners and sportsmen's organizations are for it and supporting strongly.

We saw a flock of geese flying northeast last week. We couldn't figure it out unless their navigator was off course.

This is the season of forest fires and up to March 23 fires had burned over 152,900 % of them were caused by people burning debris.

The trout season opens April 26. In addition to a \$2 license you must buy a 2 stamp.

Hungarian partridge released 4 years ago seem to be holding their own. 400 were counted in Chippewa county and 10 broods. They were obtained from Ontario in exchange for fox squirrels who got them from Europe.

The Gregory dept. went out but ran out of water and called on Blackney for help. The building, a brick one, was badly damaged but saved.

Current Events

For some time those opposed to Gov. C. Mennen Williams have been painting a rosy picture of the tax situation in Ohio. They said that is one state where industry is not taxed to death and gets a square deal.

Now we wonder just how much of this is bunk. We read that the S. S. Kresge Co. is suing the Ohio State Tax Commission to prevent a levy of \$396,579 on their stocks there. This is on items selling for 41c and under which they claim are exempt. The tax assessors checked sale in 36 of their 83 stores in Ohio and levied the tax accordingly on 2 years of sales and claim the company owes that much in unpaid sales tax.

There is a big battle on in congress as to whether our new federal super highways will be adorned with bill boards which many think disfigure the landscape and prevent motorists from enjoying the scenery. The bill boards companies are a billion dollar corporation and willing to spend money to get their bill through. This only adds to the federal roads. The states and counties have to regulate their own roads. We remember back in the horse and buggy days most roads were adorned with signs reading "So Many Miles to Mack & Schindler's or Jones & Brown's Store". These were usually inaccurate and a law was passed banning all directions except those put up by the state highway dept.

Nearby Schreiber, principal of Ann Arbor high school in a speech at Chicago last week before the North Central Assn. of Colleges and Secondary Schools warned teachers not to be panicked into changing the educational program. With Irving Kennedy, Edward Spears and daughter, Joan, Percy Swarthout and Friday Haines, ye editor was in Detroit 6 days as a witness in the case. Irvin Kennedy, then a cop was in charge of the investigation. Edward Spears and daughter heard the shots on the night of the murder firing the time. Friday found the body and Percy Swarthout embalmed body. Dr. Hollis Sigler, who with his father, Dr. Claude Sigler performed the postmortem was also witness. Harvill was in Pinckney several times during the investigation.
