## The Michigan Mirror

Political signs point to the voter as the man of the hour in Michigan this year. Both major parties have rebelled on their hands. A group headed by former Cong. Frank Hook and Homer Martin, once a union leader, who once ran on the Republican ticket and was active in the milk dumping strikes are putting up a ticket against Gov. Williams and his slate. They claimed they were not recognized or given their share of patronage.

Dissension among Republicans is on a different plane. Republicans of the 14th district have repudiated Eisenhower Republicanism, classing it as socialist and want to return to conservative Republicanism and the entrance of Prof Paul Bagwell of Michigan State as a candidate for governor a liberal Eisenhower man does not suit them at all. They want Sen. for Hutchinson of Fennville, an arch conservative. Besides these two there is Richard Moore a Wayne auto dealer. Bagwell is crippled from polio and walks with a cane.

Finances is also a problem. The deficit in Michigan could reach \$65,000,000. More than 415,000 workers are idle and more government services are need for an expanding population. Republicans want to cut spending and hold the line but are finding the job hard. 12 Republicans rebelled last week and gave the colleges some \$230,000 more funds.

## CONSERVATION NOTES

Michigan is experiencing one of the worst forest fire periods in history. Some 5000 acres of forest in the Grayling, Roscommon and Grand Traverse areas have been destroyed. Forests are tinder dry and it takes little to start a blaze. Sun shining on broken glass will do it.

235,000 fishermen are expected to take to the trout streams April 26. Michigan's 59 state parks and areas are being readied for the summer season.

A mile long stretch on Black Mall and River in Presque Isle county was treated with a chemical spray last week to study its effect on lampreys. Many dead lampreys, 4 inches long were found after 2 p. m. 500 trout were planted there on whom it had no ill effects.

## NEW DRIVERS LICENSE LAW

The legislature increased the cost of drivers licenses 50c to cover the cost of the driver's training courses taught in the schools. This does not go in effect until August. The law also provides the driver's picture must be on the license. This will not start August 1 as the machinery for doing it will not be ready then. Starting 1959 your license plates will last 3 years. Each year you will receive a tag to affix to it.

## COMMUNICATION

In years gone by the Detroit Edison Company has always recommended an assessment to local assessors in the various Municipalities, to which we have generally gone along with. In Putnam township we have had a substantial increase each year, depending on amount of work done in our township. In 1957 the Detroit Edison recommended an assessment of \$165,100 for our township to which the Board of Review and myself agreed to accept.

In January of this year the Tax Division of company contacted me and said they were paying more than their share of local taxes, percentage-wise in accordance with our State Equalized Valuation. After considerable and lengthy discussion they recommended that their assessment be lowered to \$101,800,000 or a decrease of \$63,300.00 to their 1957 figures. This really amounted to more of a decrease than this, because they had \$16,330,000 of New Work completed in our township in 1957.

All Municipalities were getting this cut --some, more, some less. This got our attention and an avalanche of protests from the various townships and city governments in South-eastern Michigan where taxes were collected. After the smoke cleared the Tax Department head at Edison met with the County Board of Supervisors at their February session and it was his contention that this was brought upon us too fast and they recommended that we each come halfway, in other words, instead of a \$63,300 decrease a \$31,650 decrease for 1958. Some assessors agreed to this but I was reluctant to go along with it until the board of review met. In March a representative of the Edison Co. met with us and offered us a still better figure, instead of cutting us one half they would go along with one third decrease of the \$63,300.00 figure. To this the Board of Review and myself refused and stated that we would stand pat on the 1957 valuation but would not just in assessing the new that was added in 1957. We felt that a Utility Company's assessment should not be compared with individual assessments because their taxes and general overhead are all budgeted and passed on to the consumer anyway. The second thought was the school debt that has been voted here locally for the construction of the school and extra class rooms.

We felt that the Edison Company was a very important part of us in paying for this debt which they as well as you and I voted to accept at that time.

Brighton City and Putnam Township are the only 2 in Livingston county that have not agreed with their recommendation. Throughout the Edison District, there are 81 that have refused to go along. Their next step is to appeal to the State Tax Commission which will be accepted or rejected. This comes up in July or early August. We believe we have taken the right stand, and this outcome will be interesting as well as important to follow.

## Current Comment

The actions of the Daughters of the American Revolution has always puzzled us. A few years back they got unbecomingly publicity when they refused to let Marian Anderson, the great negro singer sing in their hall at Washington D. C. Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt resigned last week they again hit the clouds when they asked that this nation withdraw from the United Nations, make them leave this country, end foreign aid and stop mixed marriages among the races. None of these resolutions are likely to be adopted. The U.N. is the only organization for World Peace in existence. Just how could you stop mixed marriages with American soldiers of occupation in about every country in the world. They also want to withdraw recognition of Russia and her satellites and condemn the National Conference of Churches of Christ as socialist.

We read that the Gayety Theatre in Detroit has closed its doors after 36 years of existence. The Gayety and Astor were started by the late Edward Stair, one time owner of the Howell paper at the turn of the century and they made him a million dollars. They were called log shows then. Log shows, a French word was after wards used. During world war I there were two other such shows in Detroit, the Filly and Cadillac. The Filly and Avenue were torn down, the Cadillac converted to other purposes and the Gayety was the only survivor. Night clubs took over much of the staff and their strip tease shows, once considered naughty became commonplace.

We were told by a member of the Pinckney school board that the population of the Pinckney school will double in the next 10 years. It is around 1000. There are at least 4 more who want to come into or are considering coming into the Pinckney school system. Ann Arbor, Brighton, Howell, Dexter will not take any more pupils outside of their school. Pinckney does but has considered putting an embargo on it. The school board in charge the Pinckney school is Mrs. C. W. Wilson. Hamilton and St. Joe are liable to be merged into the school system of a township at Howell really a man from the state of Michigan in a few years one county school board would operate all the schools in the county. That 73 per cent of the money used to operate the schools comes from the state now. This does not necessarily mean that the money must start another school or that a program as the Hamburg and Ypsilanti schools can be used and Pinckney's making their high school pupils anyway. All this is a far cry from the days of the little one room school heated by a wood burning stove which the teacher who got \$20 a month and boarded around, had to take to school in those days.

A patient at the Goldwater home for the mentally retarded was beaten recently. This is probably nothing new except that his brother was a member of the legislature and he has started a far reaching investigation in which the institutions heads of the institution were given a severe talking. Some interesting facts were brought out. It was revealed that in the last 14 years 27 attendants had been discharged for brutality to patients. Some mental punishment has always been used and is probably necessary at times. There have been instances of attendants killed by patients, and they should be allowed to defend themselves. A friend of ours visited such an institution once to see a friend, said friend was sporting a black eye. He gave the patient some advice the substance of which was to obey orders and he would not get hurt. The advice was followed and the patient was later discharged as cured.

The senate of the legislature again blocked the building of a new Boys Vocational home in Green Oak by adding an amendment that it could not be built in Green Oak unless the Livingston county board of supervisors approves it. The board went on record a year ago as against it. Senator Younger of this district who lives in Lansing did not vote on the amendment. It was offered by Senator Christman of Ann Arbor. This will delay the project for a year or more as there is no other site in view. It seems queer that although the site in Livingston county the opposition to it being built comes from Washtenaw county.

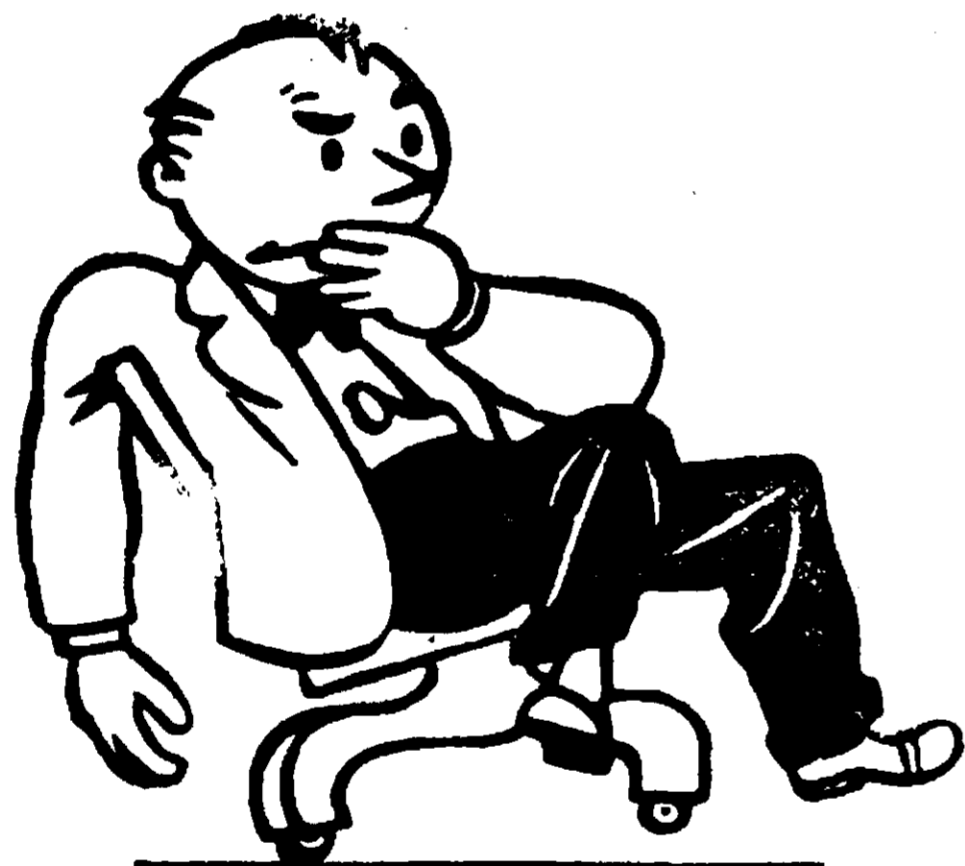

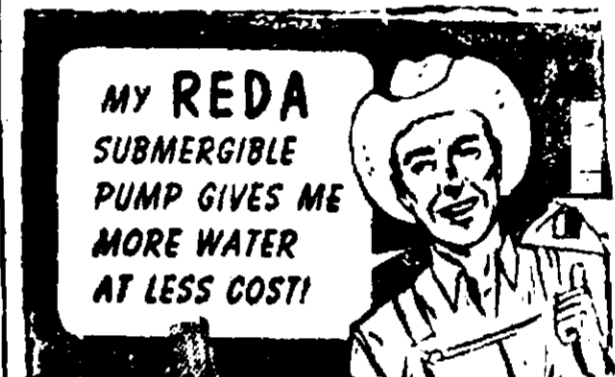
