The Michigan Mirror

The legislature recessed this last week, leaving most of the problems that faced them last January unsolved. They will return May 15 at which time 6 budget bills will get final action. Warnings that a slump in revenues and resistance to new taxes would mean cutbacks was borne out.

Higher education was the worst hit. Michigan State was cut \$1,011,000 under current expenditures, University of Michigan \$900,000 and smaller colleges less. More problems will result from this as the colleges expect a tidal wave of increased enrollment this fall. They will have to postpone purchases, slow down programs, maintain present pay rates and cut personal and maintenance.

The Traffic Center and Labor Management Institute at Michigan State got no funds. Neither did the Human Relations Institute at the University of Michigan.

The new Ionia prison is half done and needs 4,000,000 more to finish it. This got no funds.

Budget cuts were from 25% to 10%. They say "Wait until Next Year." They base this on the forecast the slump will be over by mid-summer.

At present the intangible tax is the only relief measure in sight. It would raise \$20,000,000 but it is bottled up in committee.

The cost of drivers licenses was raised from \$2.50 to \$3.00 to pay the cost of drivers education in the schools. This will raise \$700,000. They also voted to put drivers pictures on licenses but did not appropriate any money to do it so this also goes over to 1959.

Two labor measures will come up May 15. One increases unemployment benefits 14 weeks. The other provides for audit of financial reports of unions.

CONSERVATION NOTES

The dept. bought 37 acres on the Rogue River in Kent county and accepted gifts of 29 in Livingston county and 46 in Leelanau and approved the sale of \$46,862 worth of timber in 7 state forests.

36 pair of Canadian geese were released recently in Lapeer, Benzie and Ogemaw counties. They were hatched at the Mason game farm. Shipment of young trees to Michigan land owners is underway. 14,000 will be sent out.

Monroe duck hunter was given 45 days in jail for assaulting a game warden. He had a previous conviction of 30 days in jail and \$500 fine.

Michigan's heaviest fire loss this year was April 14-20. 3344 acres. The seasons total is 5374 acres.

IS AWARDED SCHOLARSHIP - Lee Hollingsworth has been granted a graduate school scholarship to study at the Institute of Paper Chemistry, Appleton, Wis., upon graduation from Alma College June.

Lee is majoring in chemistry and mathematics and is minoring in physics. During his freshman and sophomore years, he was a Scottish Bag piper with the Alma College Kiltie Band. He is active in intramural sports and a member of Delta Gamma Tau Fraternity and the Chemistry Club.

Lee's Institute of Paper Chemistry scholarship carries with it

\$2,000 for each of the first two years and \$2100 for each of the third and fourth years and leads to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy.

To achieve its educational purposes, the Institute of Paper Chemistry awards a limited number of scholarships and chooses students by a rigidly selective system based upon undergraduate accomplishment and a written examination. Lee is to be commended for his success in being one of the few selected from the hundreds who were invited to compete from the nations universities and colleges.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Carson Hollingsworth. Mr. Hollingsworth is president of the Pinckney Community School Board, and he points to Lee's selection as one more example of the high quality of scholarship of the Pinckney High School and of the outstanding professional ability of Mr. Wesley Roeder, superintendent and Mrs. Germaine Stackable, Principal.

Current Comments

Cong. Chamberlain of this district has joined critics of President Eisenhower. In a press release last week he called on the president to get off the fence and take a stand either for or against the cut in auto and truck excise taxes. If this went through it would cut the prices of cars from \$150 to \$300 per car. Chamberlain says the uncertainty is hurting the auto business as purchasers are waiting for the cut before they buy. The bill was given but little chance a month ago and got but 14 votes in the senate on a test vote but there is said to have been a change of sentiment and prominent Democrats are predicting that at least a 10% cut will go through. The auto business is in hard way. In Oklahoma 600 of 1400 auto dealers have quit since 1954. There is strong demand that the auto dealers put the price on the windshield of every car they have for sale. This was discontinued 10 years ago. Most prices today are a mystery. It is charged some dealers mark the cars up and then give a bigger allowance on trade-ins. Used car dealers buy new cars in job lots and resell them at a lower markup. The president in a press interview last week turned the question a minor emergency. This is being compared to Herbert Hoover's remark in 1932 that "Prosperity was just Around the Corner."

Congress in a surprise move cut the 5c postal increase bill to 4c last week and there are indications it will be adopted. Postmaster Summerfield was very angry and accused congress of kowtowing to big business who get the lower mailing rates. Now the bill was not to put the postage out of the red but to give postal employees wage increase. This will only allow a 2 1/2% increase. The 5c increase postage would have meant a 40% pay boost.

Way back when your editor read a controversy raged as to whether William Shakespeare wrote the Shakespeare Plays. One school of thought maintained he did not but never could find anything to back it up. A portion they said Shakespeare was a man of little education and incapable of writing the plays. As we remember most of the plays had been written years before by others and were revised and adapted by Shakespeare. There used to be an old movie on the subject. One Canadian says, "When I Go to Heaven I am going to ask Mr. Shakespeare if He Wrote All Those Plays." The other man says "What If He is not There?" The answer is "You Can Ask Him Then." Now a Bacon devotee wants to open Shakespeare's grave. He claims proof will be found that Bacon wrote the plays. The vicar of the church where Shakespeare is buried has denied the request.

Israel is celebrating her 10th year of existence and is receiving congratulations on her phenomenal achievement in building a nation under almost unsurmountable difficulties. Outnumbered 10 to 1 by the Arab nations who surrounded her she had to fight to survive and to the world's great surprise gave Egypt, her main enemy a terrible beating and would have captured Cairo if the UN had not intervened. Premier Nasser of Egypt is now trying to form a coalition of Arab nations to form a coalition of Arab nations. They're like our Indians here. There is not much cooperation among them and they usually are disagreeing among themselves. The main ace in the hole for the Arabs are the big oil deposits discovered in her deserts. She now produces 72 percent of the world's oil. American oil companies have big investments. That is why in some places here there is a disposition to favor the Arabs over Israel. Israel when first formed was not self sustaining but was supported by the dollars sent there by American Jews. She has made great progress in the past 10 years and made the desert bloom like the rose. Many factories are operating and valuable minerals discovered. The Arabs were helpless. Did nothing to develop the country and let what was there go into ruins.

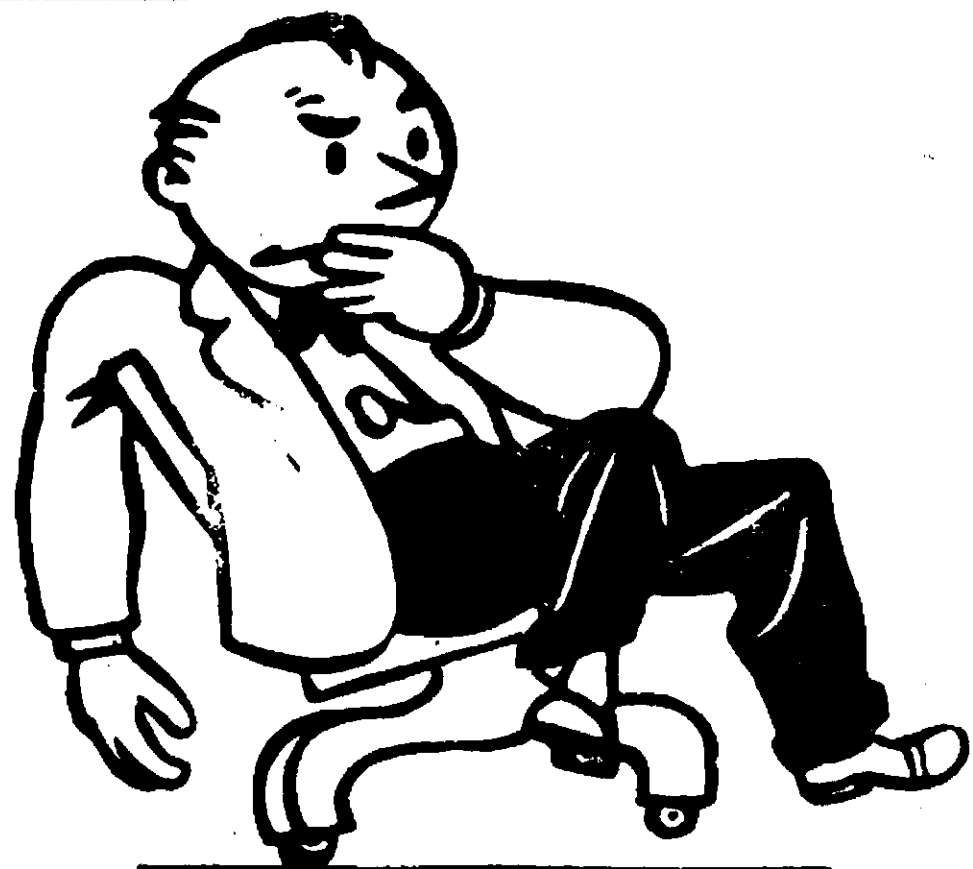
