## The Michigan Mirror

Republicans in Michigan will steer the 1958 campaign on a program supporting President Eisenhower and his policies. The revolt among them over Eisenhower Republicanism appears to have been quelled for the present, the pressure to go conservative having eased off.

In Michigan most of the opposition to the president centered in the senate where Senator Smekens urged a return to conservatism and a right to work law. It is no secret that many Republicans favored Gov. Williams increased tax on intangibles bill but did not have the votes to pass it. They did pass the reorganization bill which gave the governor increased power.

The one rebellious district is the 14th in Wayne county which repudiated Eisenhowerism. Paul Bagwell is expected to be the nominee for governor because he has the organization behind him. Whether he can beat Gov. Williams is questionable.

The hearing into brutality in the state mental hospitals has ended. The hospital system has been generally cleared but may questions are unanswered. It was started by Rep. Carroll Newton who claimed his brother-in-law was beaten in the Coldwater hospital. Senator Harry Phillips of Port Huron, a leader in mental health legislation was chairman of the committee. Their finding will not be read until the next session of the legislature.

One of the legislature economy moves was to cut the State Police budget \$1,000,000. This means about 1,000 men there will have to be laid off.

## McPHERSON BANK

The contract for the new McPherson State Bank Building at Howell is expected on the site of the former McPherson Memorial Hospital has been awarded to the Nordstrom Myer Company of Lansing. The contract estimates that raising of the present building will commence within 10 days and that construction of the new building will be completed in 180 days.

The new bank was designed by Douglas D. Loree, Ann Arbor architect and will incorporate 2 drive-in windows and a 24 car parking area for customers use as well as the most up to date interior facilities. The entire ground floor will be devoted to customer service and the full basement bank operations and employee facilities.

William McPherson III, president in making this announcement said the building has been designed to handle over twice the present volume of business and was a tangible expression of the confidence of the banks stockholders and directors in the future of Howell and Livingston counties.

The razing of the former hospital building will mark the passing of one of Howells oldest landmarks. The building was built as a home by E. G. McPherson in 1873 and was one of the first brick residences in the city. In 1923 the building was donated to the city by Isabel McPherson for use as a municipal hospital and was used as such until January 15th of this year when patients were transferred to the new McPherson Health Center.

Stella won 4 books published by the Digest. Her entry was a summary of articles on transportation which have been published in the Readers Digest over the past 7 years.

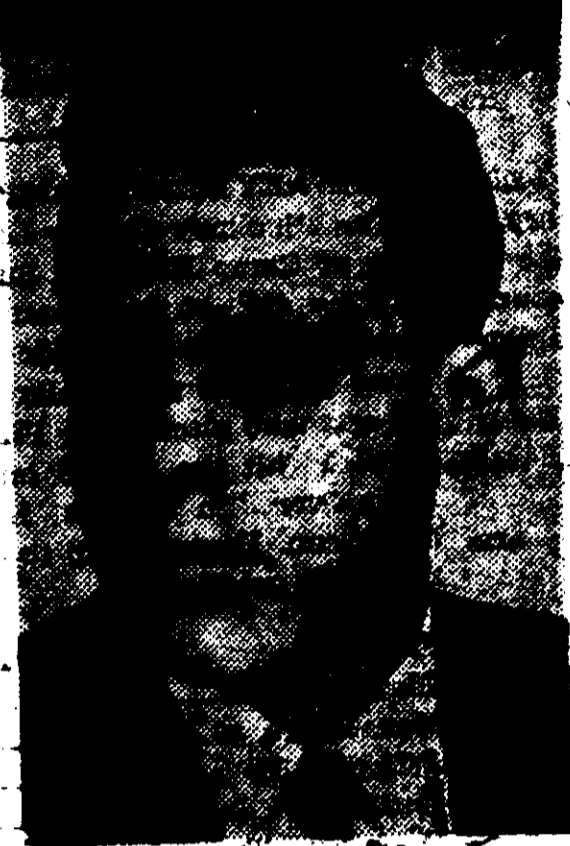

## Current Comment

There has been much discussion for a number of years as to why the Detroit Tigers never had a negro player on their team. Every other team has had them. As Detroit has a large negro population there has been much pressure for them to get one. Always the negro fans were given the old runaround. As soon as they got one of big league caliber they would put him or the team. Other teams have no trouble finding them. But Detroit has never had one in the spring training camp. Last week a del. creation of negro fans headed by Rev. George Hill, head of the United Techology Seminary, Detroit called on president Harvey Hansen of the Tigers and delivered an ultimatum. They said if Detroit did not put a negro player on the team they would boycott the park and put a picket line around it starting June 1. Mr. Hansen turned them down. He said the Tigers had 17 negroes on their minor league teams. As soon as one showed big league caliber he would be brought up. We doubt Detroit wants any negro players. They had several chances to get Larry Doby, a .300 hit, in 1947.

The directors of the Brown McClaren Co. at Hamburg have reconsidered and will keep the factory operating. They had announced they would close down April 1. To this end we are told they have gotten back 90% of the contracts they cancelled. This company has had a stormy time since the founder A. W. Brown died. During World War II they had 500 employees. Now they have around 125. Lincoln Schmidt, the secretary would not say whether the factory was still for sale. This move rather pulls the rug out from under George VanPurseum, Republican spokesman who said Gov. Williams was to blame for closing the plant. Said closing never happened. The National Labor Relations Board has ordered an election there to see if the employees want to be represented by the U. A. W.

There was a hearing at Washington last week to consider the problem of the uninsured driver. Sec. of State Hart spoke in favor of compulsory insurance. He was hit last year by one and hospitalized for a long time. The insurance companies spokesman was against it. He said it would raise the insurance rates for all drivers. Secretary Hart also favored another fund. The Uninsured Drivers Fund. Insured Drivers pay \$1.00 into this and uninsured drivers \$2. Some states he said had both. The insurance man was also against this. He said for \$3 or \$4 more a year an insured driver can get policy to protect himself from the uninsured driver. He said less than 10% of the drivers are uninsured.

Vice President Nixon was sent to South America on a trouble shooting trip to smooth out some rough spots. Communism has grown steadily in South America as we have neglected it. He is going to be in Asia and Europe. Nixon was booed in Argentina. Their chief gripe is we have eroded a tariff against their goods and won't let them be shipped into this country. If we remember right Harry Truman when president made a trip to South America. Eisenhower usually takes these jobs over so others don't get it. He is going to Canada with Sec. Dulles to iron out some trouble spots.

The Kookers drawn for a battle over the merits of American and European sandwiches. It all started when the Kookers as an economy measure decided to abolish meat and serve sandwiches on their flights. The American air lines served turkey, beef and tuna on thick slices of bread, but the European lines served ham, lobster, tongue, cheese, garnished with tomatoes, olives, eggs and mushrooms on very thin slices of bread. One served fresh peaches topped with walnuts. The American Airlines complained to the International Transport Ass'n. and they ruled the principal part of a sandwich must consist of bread. Any airline who does not abide by that will be fined \$2500. The sandwich is said to have been invented in England in the 18th century by the Earl of Sandwich. He was an inventor and a gambler and would not stop playing cards long enough to eat. He had meat placed between two slices of bread and brought to him.

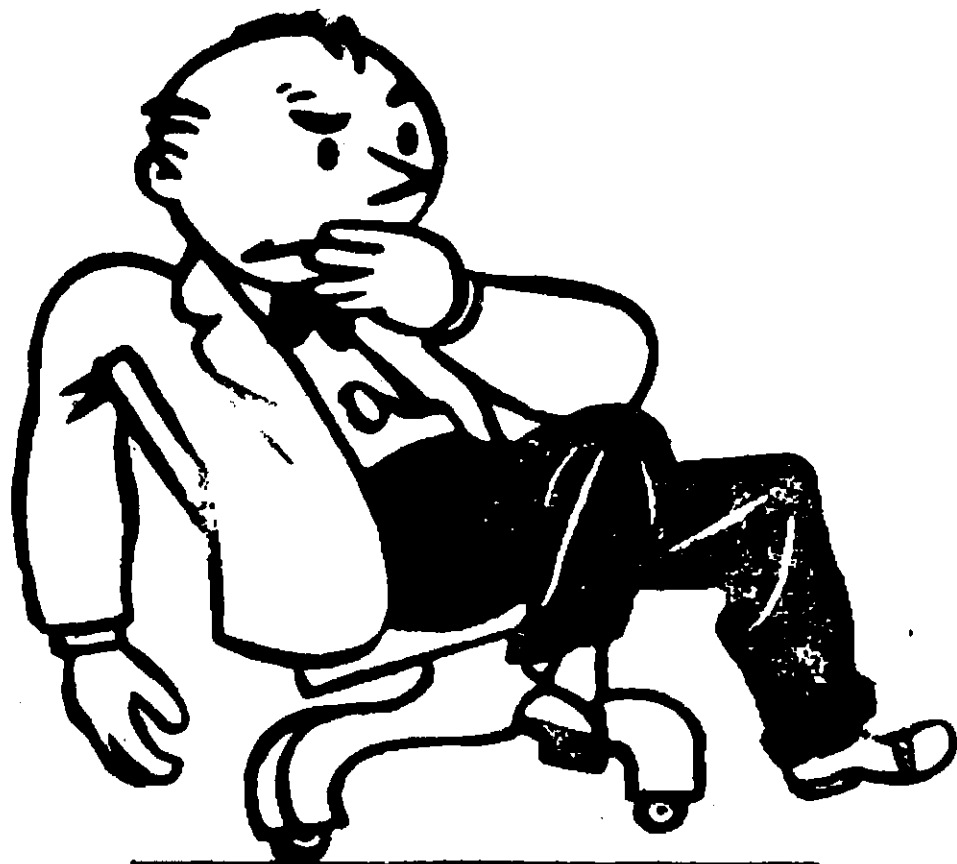

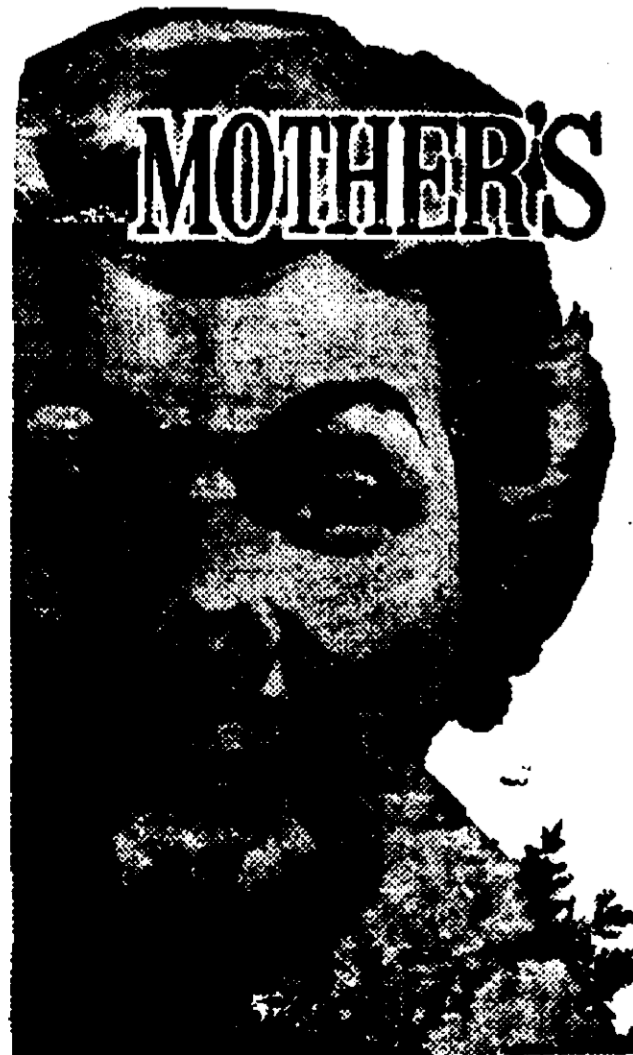
