## The Michigan Mirror

Government economy has lost a few skirmishes but in the main has won most of its battles. This will make necessary big cuts in most state operations.

From John Hancock of Mich. State, which was cut about \$1,000,000 said the going would be tough and they will be unable to prepare for the increased loads expected this fall. The least important services and those not basic will be dropped.

Dr. Albert Heustis of the state board of health whose dept. was heavily cut said many small programs will have to be cut such as the one to eradicate swimmer's itch.

Gov. Williams has announced for a 6th term Lt. Gov. Hart for the US senate and Senator Swanson for Lt. Gov. The Republicans say after 10 years the state is broke, due to declining revenues, mostly the sales tax, the governor is absent most of the time on nation wide tours and their campaign issue will be the empty chair. This trend is entirely negative as they do not say what they would do if they got power.

Senate committee investigating the mistreatment in the state mental hospitals made a surprise trip to the Northville hospital and found 50 empty beds. The authorities said they had no money to staff this unit. Rep. Harry Phillips of the committee said other surprise visits to the states hospitals.

## Current Comments

How many kinds of apples can name? Probably not over a dozen. Yet there are over 7000 varieties. This need not worry you as the growers who supply the supermarkets and stores seldom grow over 3 or 4 different kinds. The others are rarely garden club and others as food experiment. We know one big grower who raises 20,000 bushels a year and specializes mostly in Jonathan and Delicious.

We read much of the deprecation of lampreys. The lamprey, a fish that lives up into the lakes via a sucker, eats out the trout population there. It is equipped with suckers to fasten itself to large fish and suck their blood. They are seldom seen in inland streams. No effective means of combating them has been found. Wire meshes are used to prevent the ascending streams but poison is the main thing. Congress was asked appropriate \$914,000 lamprey control which caused a congressman to remark it cost \$750 to kill one lamprey.

The county seat paper carried an article in which Paul Kempf, an Arbor banker was quoted extensively against the location of the Boys V. Vocational School in Green Oak. Nothing new was added. His article was for the purpose of whipping the Livingston county board of supervisors back into line. A year ago they passed a resolution against its being located in Green Oak. There are reports they are working on this. Also Senator Christmas on the appropriation to build the school, that it could be built in a county unless the board of supervisors of the county approved so it is necessary to keep the Livingston county board in line. In the meantime there seems to have been a change of sentiment in regard to it around Whitmore Lake. 600 there have signed petitions in favor of its being built there. Some are the same ones who signed petitions against its location there. These petitions will be taken to Lansing and presented to Senate. Eddie chairman of the committee.

The opposition to the Whitmore of Green Oak location all comes from Washenaw. Not a single Livingston county man of prominence has come out against it. When the vote was taken on Senator Christmas amendment Senator Younger of this district did not vote.

Vice President Nixon continues to have a stormy time in South America. In Argentina he was jeered and booed and in Peru, stoned by a mob of 200 students when he tried to visit San Marco University. A stone hit him in the neck. He is regarded as a capitalist and responsible for the tariff which prevent South America trading with this country. Communism has have a stormy time in South America. While we admire Nixon's courage we doubt that his mission can be considered a success.

For the past 23 months Michigan traffic deaths have decreased. For the first four months of 1958 they numbered 360 compared to 453 for the first four months of 1957. Many blast the high school drivers courses as extravagance and waste of money but they seem to be getting results.

Most of the Republican congressmen this fall do not expect to run on President Eisenhower's platform of increased foreign aid, military preparedness and federal aid to schools. Gwenn of New York Republican says that platform will be to fight expanding socialism and added that the Eisenhower administration has done more to expand socialism than either the Roosevelt or Truman administrations.

We knew it was bound to happen. The same thing cropped up in the old sparrow bounty days. Town clerks are now being taken for a ride on the fox bounty payments. Foxes trapped in non-bounty states and even bounty areas are being turned in and bounties when the ears were not checked they have been taken to the clerks who say they can't see if possible to examine them.

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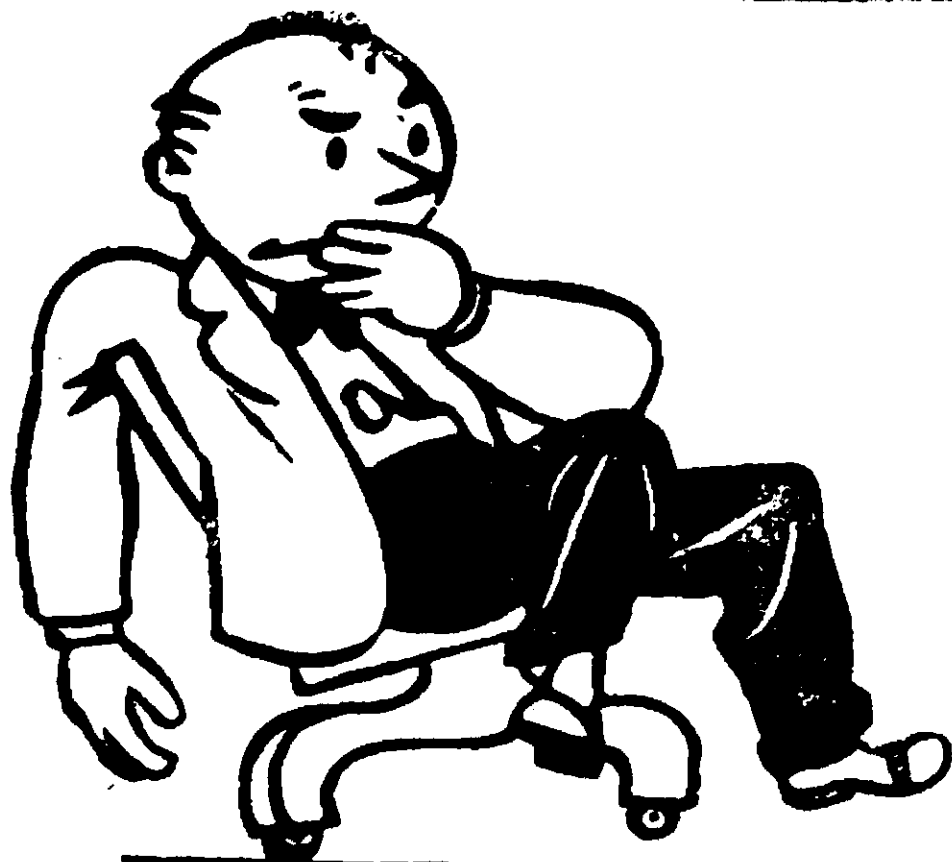


