A state income tax is being pushed by economists and government leaders. This is expected to be the key point in the search for money during the 1959 session of the legislature. Tax experts say now the heaviest tax burden falls on the low income group. On the other hand the low income group benefit most from state service particularly welfare and unemployment. The way around that they claim is to levy a uniform tax rate and provide a tax exemption like the federal government of \$600 or one of \$1000 like some states do.

Some years ago an income tax proposal came before the legislature. It gave \$10,000 exemption, reductions of the sales tax on food. It failed to get out of committee. Senator Andrews of Hillman has for years advocated an income tax.

There will be no mass layoffs in the state government to economize. Vacancies that occur when employees die or retire they will not be replaced but no discharge of employees will occur. This is made possible by the new budget which lets them transfer funds from one dept. to another. In other years some depts. ran short while others had a surplus.

Consumers Power Company is seeking a \$15,300,000 rate increase, the first since 1950 to affect 800,000 customers in 61 counties. They claim their costs jumped 18% since 1950.

The legislature met Thursday and recessed for 30 days leaving unemployment, state police, mental health, prisons and many other questions unsolved. However both house and senate voted overwhelmingly to start construction of the Boys Vocational School at Whitmore Lake. So this issue which has been a political football for 50 years is probably settled.

Current Comment

The siding of Vice President Nixon to South America was the worst blotter in American history. It beats Braddocks total defeat of some 200 years ago when that general walked into an ambush near what is now Pittsburg and he and his command were wiped out by the Indians. Nixon instead of spreading good will stirred up hatred. His tour was a failure from its start in Argentina and grew worse as he progressed through Peru and other countries reaching its intensity in Venezuela when his life was endangered. He was hit with a stone by a screaming mob, the windows in his cars smashed and his wife struck and cut in the face at 6 of his party were wounded. He was forced to end his tour and retreat to the American embassy from where he returned to this country. His guards were of little protection as they had orders on to not to fire on Venezuelans. Anti American riots were also occurring at the same time at Lebanon, Tripoli and Paris. Just why our ambassadors in South America did not know of conditions there is a puzzle. That is their business. The ill feeling goes way back to the Monroe Doctrine which told other nations to keep out of South America that it was our own back yard. It has been necessary to enter this with troops occasionally, notably in Teddy Roosevelt's time. This is only one of their grievances. There are getting the least foreign aid of any other country and at the urgent of American business we have enacted a tariff to keep their goods out. They are a raw material country their exports being copper, zinc, tin and beef. If we don't want their goods let's not see why we object to their trading with Communist countries. In the past we have always supported the dictators who rose to power. And we have been so heavily engrossed in Europe and Asia in recent years we have neglected them.

When the long drawn out battle that lasted about 50 years is over, and the Boys Vocational School will be built at Whitmore Lake. The Legislature voted overwhelmingly for it last year. The school will be built on the 86 acre tract also donated the same year. The board of supervisors in which county it is built must approve it and pay for it. \$55,000 with no strings attached to start construction at once. The main reason for this school change is that Senators Beadle and Andrews after the petitions with 90 signatures of Whitmore Lake favoring it to the state, there were received went to Whitmore Lake, talked to the citizens and business men there and they found a great many of them in favor of it. There was many something about the one petition to it. Many who signed the petitions against it 2 years ago now admit they were wrong and signed the one in favor of it. The 2 leaders of the opposition were Rev. White, a reformed Methodist minister and Paul Kempf, Ann Arbor banker. Both of whom have palatial homes there. Rev. White did not get the arguments he used against it out of the Bible.

We now have the spectacle of a circuit judge delaying the state supreme court judge. Judge Elmer Huff of Saginaw got away behind on his docket. Acting on complaint of our county lawyer, the supreme court sent him to leave county for a month and sent Judge Quinn of Cairo there to clean up his docket. He refused to go and was found guilty of contempt of court and fined \$250. He has announced an appeal to the U. S. supreme court. He contends that as he was elected in Saginaw county he can only serve there. We doubt this will stand up. For years judges have been sent to other counties where a judge was ill or for some reason could not function.

Congress has passed and sent to the president a bill raising pensions for veterans of the Spanish and earlier wars. Confederates get \$101.50 a month. There are only 2 and no union veterans. Their widows get \$75 if married while veterans was in service. Otherwise \$65. This also covers 34,000 Spanish war widows, 4000 civil war widows, 1000 Confederate widows, 1000 Indian war widows and the 4 remaining Mexican war widows. A racket existed at one time when young girls married veterans to get the widows pension. The Mexican war was fought over 100 years ago.
