The Michigan Mirror

Michigan's 1958 legislature will return June 12-13 in confusion over the record it will write on an election year. Two of the things it has to clear up are the State Police Budget and the Length of Unemployment Benefits. Strangely the fight on these issues is between Republicans with Democrats waiting on the sidelines to see if any issues develop.

The most delicate is the State Police. The senate wants to slash their budget equally with other agencies. The house is against any slash as they say it will mean discharge of 100 troopers. The state police work 9 hours a day and have made an enviable record on reduction of deaths and accidents on the highways. In 1956 there was a reduction of 256 in highway deaths. In 1957 a reduction of 209 over 1956. Still the senate - house are \$2,600,000 apart on the State Police budget.

Unemployment Compensation is the second issue. The Republicans have held off waiting for congress to act. Congress is undecided whether to send a lump sum to the states or to distribute it themselves. They favor a 2 weeks extension with 75 % of the present benefits. Another bill has been introduced to extend 100% benefits 13 weeks.

The legislature cut out the entire budget of \$250,000 for the State Safety Commission.

Other economy victims were a new radio system for state police, and a \$150,000 airplane. Also appropriation for state highway maps so no more will be printed after June 30.

Fatal Auto Accident

HOWARD READ

Howard Read, Pinckney contractor and home builder and one of the officers of the First Savings & Loan Ass'n. of Howell lost his life shortly after 10:30 p.m. when his car crashed 2 miles east of Fowlerville last Wednesday night. During the past few years he built homes at Howell, Fowlerville, Brighton, Dexter, Chelsea, Saline and also Pinckney and has been constantly on the road. He left here Wednesday morning in his pickup. This he left at Howell, borrowing a new car from the Chevrolet garage here. He was driving this when he crashed. Fred Read and son, Robert went to the scene of the accident at 11:30 to identify the body. It was brought to the Swarthout Funeral Home.

Howard was the son of Ross and Sadie Burchell Read and was born in Pinckney July 14, 1920. He graduated from Pinckney high school. In World War II he enlisted in the Marines. He served in the South Pacific where he was wounded. When discharged he had reached the rank of lieutenant. He was wounded at both Guadalcanal and New Britain. He attended Albion College.

He was associated with the Thomas Read Sons Building Supplies firm for a time but left here to go in the building game. He served on the village council a number of years and has been active in veterans affairs.

In 1939 he married Mary Ellen Wild of Ann Arbor. There are 2 daughters, Ann Marie and Mary Susan, and a son, Thomas. Besides his parents there is brother, Russell, in Pittsburg, Pa.

The funeral was at the Pinckney Cong'l. church Saturday at 2 p.m. Rev. Winger officiating. Burial was in Pinckney Cemetery. The American Legion, V. F. W. and National Guard had charge of the graveside services.

BEE LINE TAVERN ROBBED

The Bee Line Tavern at Chubb's Corner, formerly Jugs Inn was robbed at 1:30 a.m. last Thursday. James Axtier, the bartender, was preparing to close and had driven his car up in front of the tavern when the bandit who was in the parking ground pointed his gun at him and ordered him inside the tavern. Mr. and Mrs. Will-Goreline, the owners were there and also Larry Griggs and wife. He herded them into the wash room and put money about \$40 in a paper bag and left in his car. Griggs followed him in his own car. He caught up with him on Brighton road and was shot at twice but managed to crash the bandit's car and put it in the ditch. The robber fled on foot. The state police identified the car as belonging to Eugene Kelly, 32, of Ann Arbor who came there from Presque Isle. He once worked for the Madison Electric but is now unemployed. The state police set up a road block on all roads which was not lifted until 11 a.m. Thursday. In the meantime 60 police combed the woods and swamps in Genoa. A East Lansing police squad captured him hiding in a garage on Latson Rd., Chilson. He is also thought to be the bandit who held up Walter Nowicki and wife and Peter Kurakowski and wife at 9 p.m. Wednesday night at the former's cottage at Pardee Lake. He only got \$1.15 here.

Current Comment

The press and the Republican administration hailed the increase in the peoples income in April as an indication the recession was receding. This was despite the fact unemployment increased, unemployment payments increased and more factories closed. A little investigating revealed it was due to government pump priming, in the form of increased social security benefits, more unemployment benefits and a special dividend to war veterans holding government life insurance. All these payments totalled over one billion dollars. This increase dwarfed the decline in wages and salaries and rents, dividends, interest and the life showed little change, the total personal income climbed. This would have been impossible a few years ago as there would have been no such cash flows to offset decline of industry. Now they do offset a slump somewhat.

The postal rate increase bill passed both houses and is expected to be signed by the president. He is not pleased with it as he wanted 5c letter postage and it only provides 4c. It raises the wages of 300,000 employees 10% and he did not favor a raise now. The price of post cards is raised to 3 cents and air mail to 7 cents. It goes into effect August 1. News papers and magazines are raised 2% but this does not take effect until Jan. 1 next. This will not take the postoffice out of the red where it has been since it was instituted. The deficit is now \$700,000.

Secretary of Defense McElroy and Chief of Staff Maxwell addressed the governors conference at Miami, Florida last week and stirred up a hornets nest when they said a cut of some \$40,000 was contemplated in the national guard. The governors were utterly opposed. They said they had always had the guard and it was the first line of defense. The secretary and general were firm in their determination to cut and the governors will have to rely on their congressmen and senators to block it. In Michigan the guard has been aiding the state police on highway traffic on holidays. This with the proposed 100 man cut in the state police will seriously cripple the guard.

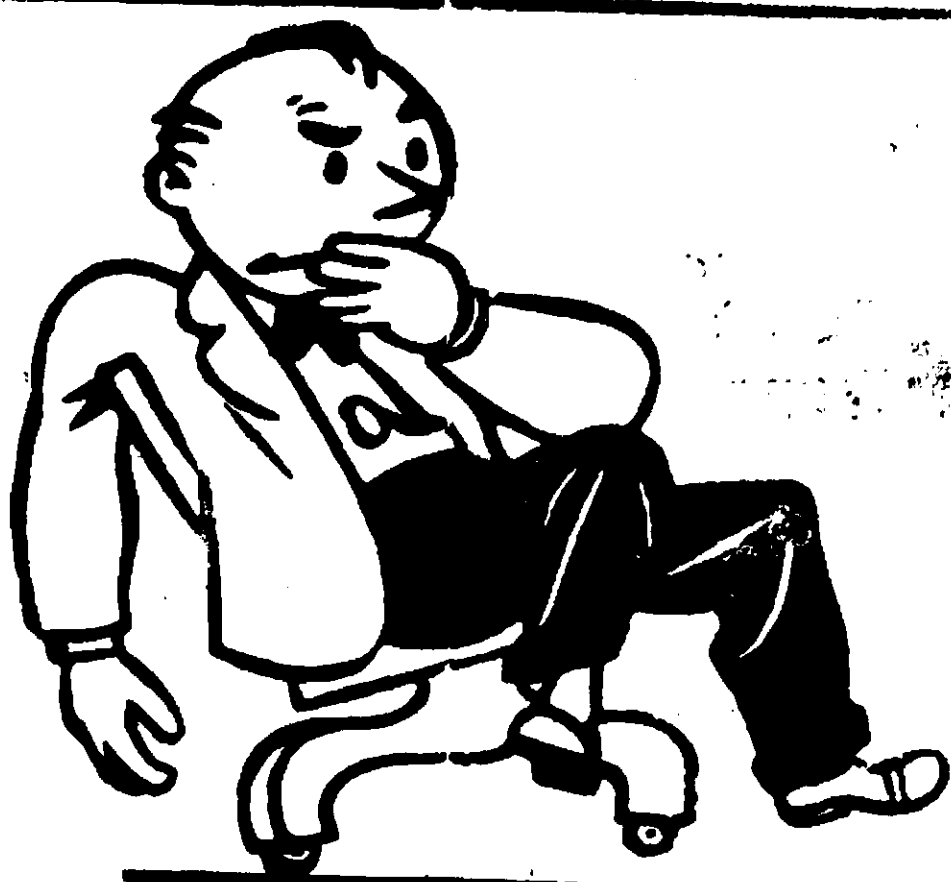

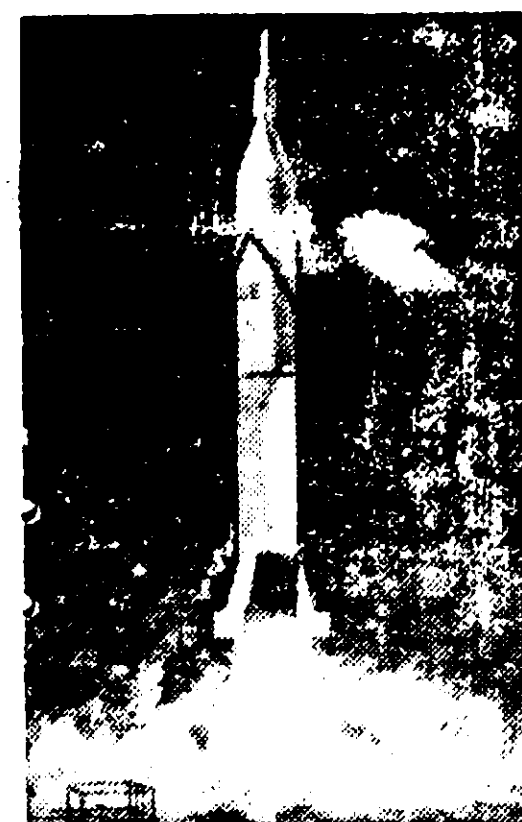

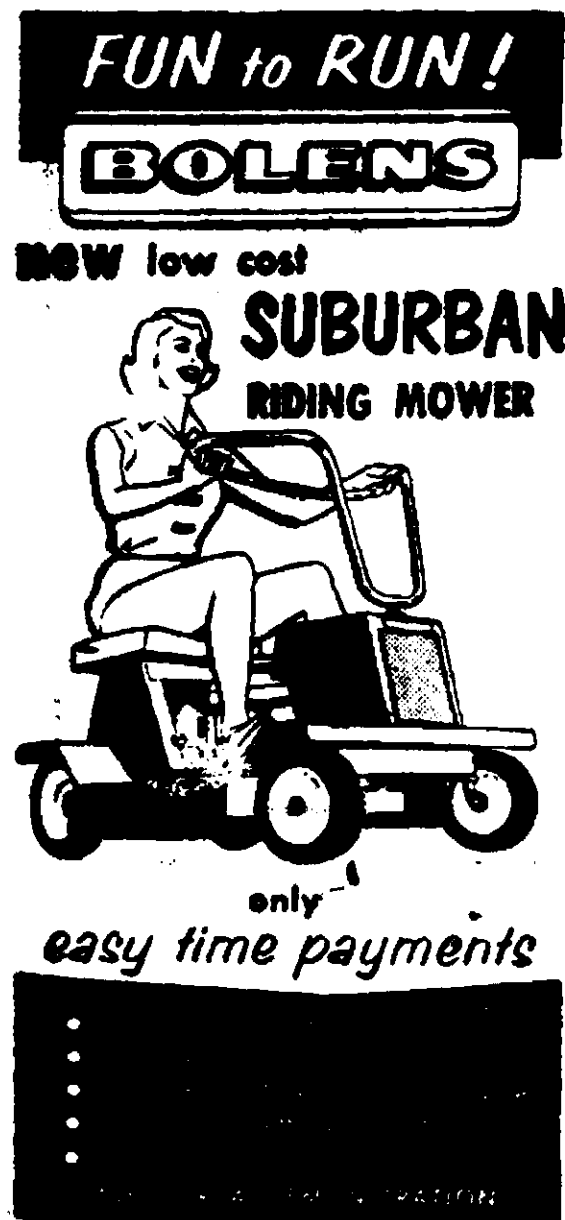
