School Board Meeting

Special Meeting May 15, 1958
Meeting called to order by Pres. Hollingsworth. Present: Hollingsworth, Bonner, Russell, McAfee, Basydio. Absent: None.

Winans Lake Board of Education was present at this meeting. Subject matter: Annexation between Winans Lake and Pinckney school systems. Winans Lake board toured the high school.

Mr. T. B. Brown spoke in behalf of their school system and outlined the following:

1. Winans has no debt.
2. E. Valuation set at \$2,604,663.
3. Census 120
4. Valuation per child approx. \$20,000
5. Approx. 70 children in first 6 grades
6. Approx 45 pupils between 7th and 12th grades.

Requested the following information:

1. Maintenance of Winans school if annexed.
2. Educational facilities available at the annexing school.
3. 1958-59 budget provisions as to the debts and operating funds.
4. Future of the school system if Winans Lake does not desire to become annexed to Pinckney.

Each member of the school board expressed his willingness to have Winans Lake a part of our school system. Pinckney school board then was invited to attend their PTA meeting on May 20 at 8 p. m. to discuss annexing problems.

Motion by Bonner, 2nd by McAfee to adjourn. Carried.
