The Michigan Mirror

Michigan's treasury solvent as the 1957-58 season end is a temporary respite through and due to the ability of Chairman Rollo Tipton of the tax committee to juggle funds. It is mostly due to his plan to pay for the liquor purchases in 90 days where the custom has been 30. This is not the only cause. Governor William passed the word for all depts. to cut corners wherever possible. The state highway dept. is said to have saved over a million dollars by not filling vacancies and curbing travel.

Progress has its problems. While building expressways to save human lives the businesses along the old routes were left stranded. State Highway Com. Mack is trying to protect them by allowing them restricted advertising along the expressways. No others can compete. The expressway is a 5 year project costing \$250,000,000.

Michigan will take cognizance of its greatest engineering feat June 28-29 when the \$98,000,000 Mackinac Bridge linking the 2 peninsulas is dedicated. Travel over the bridge is constantly increasing over what it was a year ago on the ferries.

Rev. Edward White, leader of the hosts he says are against location of the Boys Vocational School in Green Oak himself is pinning his last hope on Governor Williams. He claims to have 500 more petition signers in addition to those he got 2 years ago. The governor turned down his request for a meeting and referred him to Com. Maxey in whom he said the legislature had vested sole power. As Com. Maxey is not popular with Rev. White. He did not like this. The governor did say he would see Rev. if he could prove improper acts by Maxey so we imagine his reverence is looking for improper acts.

THE MICHIGAN CO. TAX

The Michigan Bell Telephone Co. announced its payment to the state primary school fund in 1957 was the largest in the company's history. Amounting to \$11,051,000, the payment places Michigan Bell as the top contributor to the fund.

Russell Englehart, company mgr. said that \$14,194 of the total tax payment was allocated to the public school system of Howell. Schools throughout Livingston county include a Howell received a total of \$48,746 from the Michigan Bell payment.

The payments were based on a school census of 2,448 in Howell and 8,399 in the county.

The tax payment amounted to \$5.78 for each of the 1,910,522 youngsters in state between ages of 5 and 19 who are on the census rolls.

Michigan Bell in common with rail road, Pullman, railway telegraph and other telephone companies pay a tax earmarked for the primary fund in lieu of other taxes.

Current Comments

The first negro in the history of the school was graduated at Little Rock, Arkansas last week but a National guard escort was necessary. The guard there are now disbanded but will be back next fall when the school reopens. The Little Rock incident did little to solve segregation and was not intended to. Gov. Faubus tried to defy a supreme court decision and it was necessary to enforce the decision. There will probably continue to be some segregation to a limited extent but it will be many years before the schools of the South are all desegregated. At the annual Methodist conference at Flint last week 2 negro churches, Grace of Detroit and River Rouge were admitted to membership, the first negro churches ever to be admitted. Marian Klein of the upper peninsula was ordained a minister the first to be ever ordained in Michigan. She preached in Wisconsin 10 years and holds a masters degree. The Detroit Tigers have called up a negro ball player from their Charlotte farm club, Ossie Virgil. Some time ago a delegation of negro leaders served notice on the Detroit Case Fall Company they would pick up the park if a negro was not placed on the team. We wonder if these 2 incidents are connected. Detroit has 21 negro players on their minor league teams.

W. J. Maxey, state social welfare director announced that bids will be open July 17 on the first unit of the Boys Vocational School in Green Oak. It is caused a flurry of activity on the part of Rev. White and his Whitmore Lake adherents who announced they were taking petitions with 1500 names to Lansing of those who were against the Whitmore Lake location. 2 yrs. ago and it is claimed part of these signers have since signed petitions favoring its location there. The governor refused to see them and referred them to Mr. Maxey in whom he said the legislature had vested sole authority. He added if the referendum show improper or wrong action by Mr. Maxey he might see them so we suppose they are looking for proper action. They do not like Mr. Maxey with whom they have tangled a number of times. Senator Younger of this district was in the office Monday. He did not vote on the location but voted yes on the appropriation to build it. He does not understand the Whitmore Lake opposition. He says the school has a million dollar a year payroll.

In California where it is customary for candidates to run on both tickets, Alvin Brown, the Democrat candidate for governor got 500,000 more votes than Senator Knowland, the Republican candidate. Knowland is quitting the senate to run for governor as a stepping stone to the presidency in 1960. Few senators become president in many governors have. Vice President Nixon, also a candidate for president in 1960 gave Knowland a mild dressing but Knowland's defeat is being laid to the fact the Nixon men did for some time else or did not vote at all. Knowland has taken over the Taft wing of the Republican party while Nixon is a liberal.

Building permits were issued in Livingston county covering construction worth \$559,720.00 and 5 commercial permits worth \$23,900.00.

Unemployment declined in May from 460,000 to 357,000 in Michigan but the decline showed up only in outstate districts. In the Detroit area it held steady with 275,000 unemployed. At the same time the unemployment payment increased from \$35,000 in April to \$73,000 in May. The unemployment funds reserve has been cut from \$219 million to \$190 million. Many have exhausted their unemployment benefits and the legislature is considering an emergency measure.

New car sales are way down and secretary of states office states Michigan people are buying lower priced cars. Secretary Hare says the sales tax on cars in the 1958 period averaged \$47.95 a car, this year it was down to \$45.55 per car. This indicates people are spending an average of \$81 less per car now than in 1955. Gross sales tax collections of items sold in 1957 were \$23,070,212. In the same period in 1958 they were \$13,928,190.

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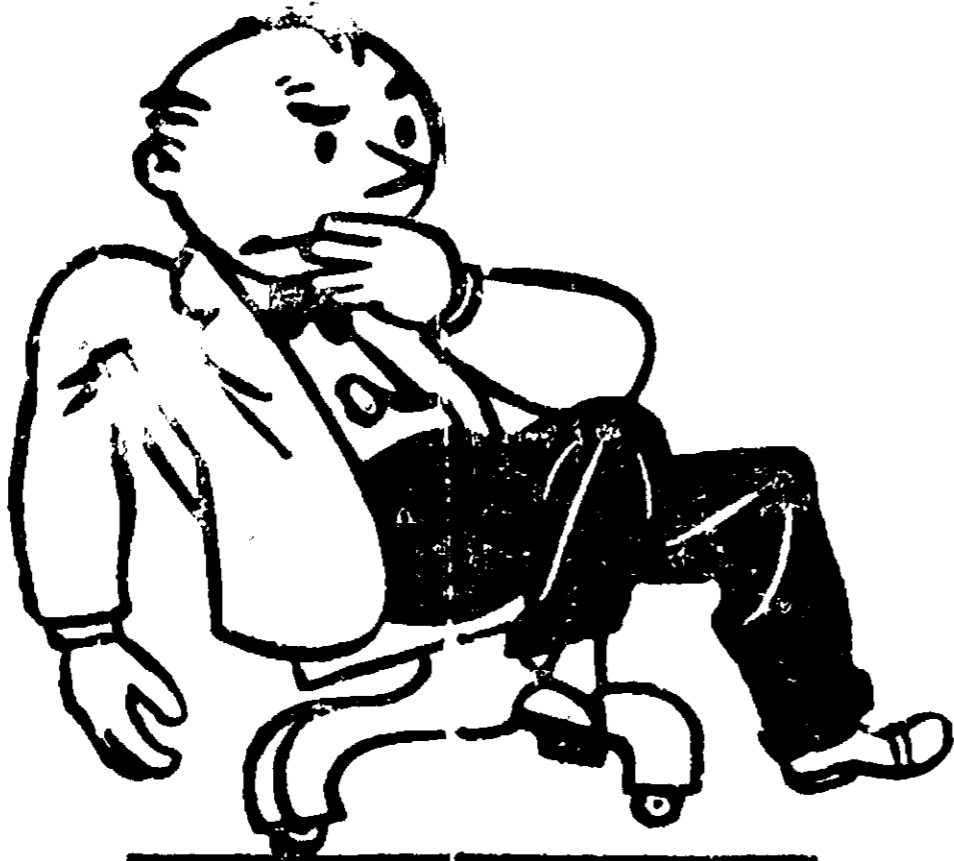
