The Michigan Mirror

Michigan is running out of land. This has developed in Southeastern Michigan which has grown from one large city, Detroit, into a massed metropolitan district. Michigan State University and the state government are studying the problem.

Agriculture wins when a new industry or subdivision takes a rich chunk of land out of agriculture. State officials fear industry will create problems by using lands that should be devoted to agriculture. Development of the St. Lawrence Waterway may tend to crowd out recreation and farm areas.

The major problem the next 5 years will be the land required for 900 million network of superhighways.

Highway officials negotiated for years over the right of way for the Edsel Ford Highway from Detroit to Port Huron. State Highway Comm. Mackie says small neighborhoods should not be allowed to overpower thousands of voiceless motorists waiting for more efficient highways.

Property owners along the expressways say they are forced to sell their lands and the expressways are bypassing them take trade away. It also takes the land off local tax rolls.

Circuit courts can now place offenders on probation under strict rule of probation officers. It is now suggested probate judges be given the same right. Now they can send juvenile offenders to the Boys Vocational School, put them in foster homes or waive jurisdiction and allow them to be tried in circuit court.

Thousands are expected to wend their way to the Mackinac Bridge Dedication June 26-28. Every phase of Michigan life will be represented by a giant display of their contributions. Queens from the states 43 counties will be there and food and drink will be sold from stand in the middle of the 5 mile bridge. The Republicans say they started it but Gov. Murray VanWagoner, a Democrat built the bridge approaches 20 years ago.

CONSERVATION NOTES

Up to June 1 last 2,617,761 persons visited Michigan's state parks in an increase of 19% over last year. Camping permits numbered 5946 an increase of 7% over last year. Camping permits average 4 people each.

400 acres of pine lands are being sprayed with heavy DDT to kill pest moths.

The number of archery deer hunters declined last year from 42,369 in 1956 to 37,440 in 1957. They bagged 1760 which is fewer than 5%. In 1956 they bagged 2439 which is 6%.

A new publication "Michigan State Forest Campground" is available by dropping a card to the Mich. Conservation Dept., Forestry Division, Lansing, Mich. 26. It is 16 pages and has pictures and writeups of the 23 Michigan state forests.

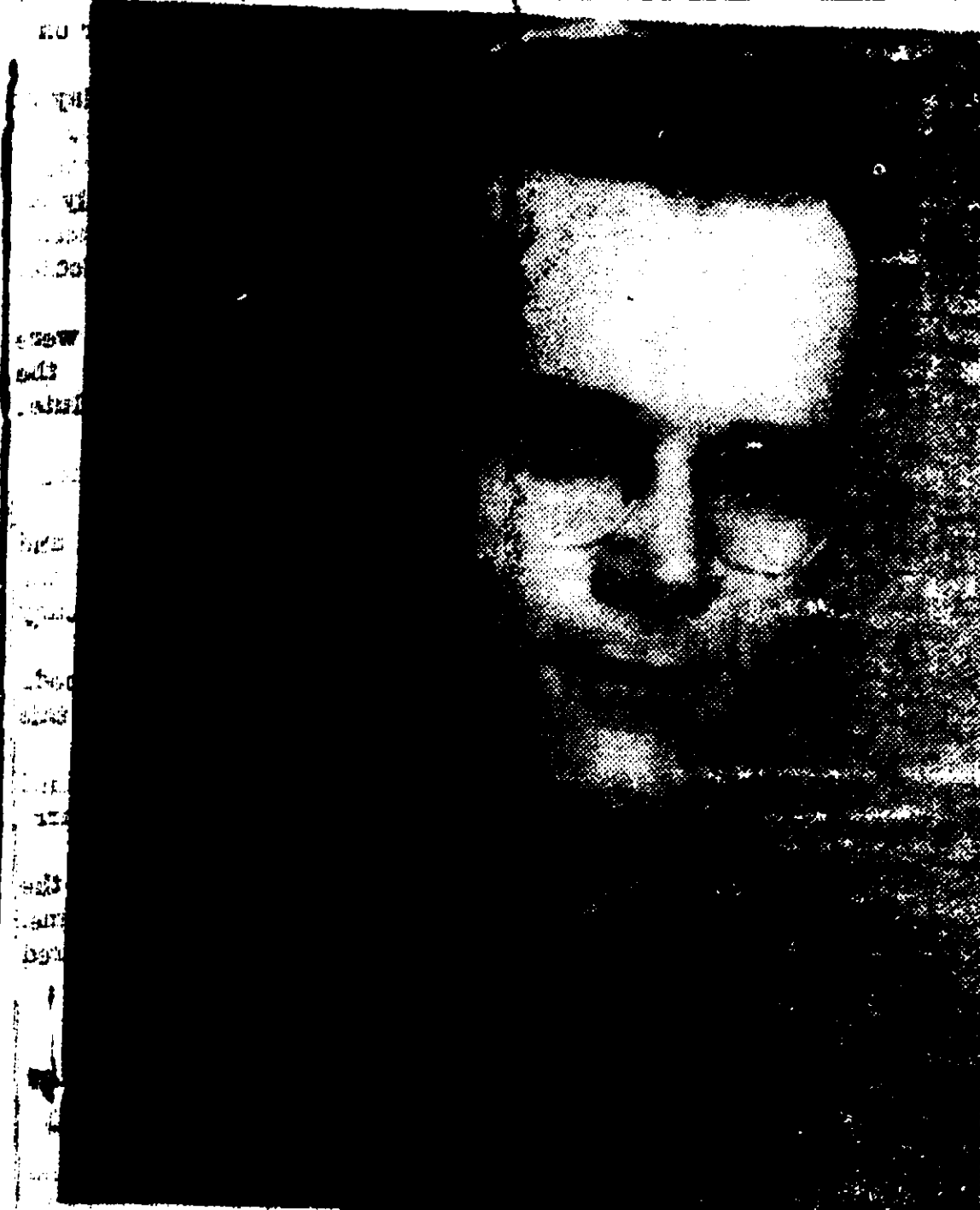

REV. ALBERT SCHMITT LEAVES PINCKNEY

REV. ALBERT SCHMITT OF ST. MARY'S CHURCH PINCKNEY IS TRANSFERRED TO HOLY TRINITY PARISH AT FOWLER. REV. GEORGE HORKAN OF ST. BASIL'S PARISH, SOUTH HAVEN COMES TO PINCKNEY JUNE 25.

In the assignments announced by Bishop Abers last week 6 priests were transferred to new parishes. Among them was Rev. Albert Schmitt of Pinckney who goes to the Holy Trinity Parish at Fowler. His new parish has 400 families, a school with 380 children, 6 nuns and 3 lay teachers. It is near St. Johns. Rev. George Esper who has been there 35 years retired. Rev. George Horkan of St. Basil's parish, South Haven comes to Pinckney. Rev. Burger of Decatur goes to South Haven; Rev. John Weber and Rev. Frank Murray go to new parishes to be formed at Lansing and Kalamazoo. Rev. Gilbert Rautig formerly of Howell becomes pastor at Decatur and Rev. Keith Ledwidge is transferred from St. John's, Davison to St. Joseph's at Jackson.

Rev. Albert Schmitt was born at Westphalia February 10 1910. He graduated at St. Mary's school there he served at St. Mary's church at Lansing, St. Agnes church, Flint and administrator at St. Joseph's church, St. Johns. Then he was pastor of Immaculate Conception Church at Hartland, coming from there to Pinckney 10 years ago.

Current Comments

A huge crowd is expected at the dedication of the Mackinac Bridge on June 26-28. We read one controversy has been ironed out by Gov. Williams. The bridge committee invited the boys and girls from the Interlocken Music Camp to play. Mr. Maddy and his musicians union objected because they were not unionized. Quite a controversy arose. The governor called a conference and it was agreed that both organizations will play. The Republicans claim they started the bridge but Governor Williams finished it. If we remember right former Governor Murray D. VanWagoner built the bridge approaches, each about a mile long round 1938.

The state is in hassle over the unadorned beautiful Porcupine Mts. state Park in the upper peninsula. Copper has been found there and the copper companies want mining rights. Conservationists do not like this as it would leave unsightly piles of refuse and slag. The companies have agreed to dump all refuse in Lake Superior. The industrial interests and others are for it as it would bring in an income of \$6,000,000 to the upper peninsula.

The population of the Pinckney school may be doubled in the space of few years if the present plans are completed. They are to annex Winans Lake, Hamburg, Stone and Younglove schools to Pinckney. It has already been decided to hold the Winans Lake election on annexing to Pinckney. Pinckney has always taken most of the high school pupils although Hamburg sent part of theirs to Ann Arbor. Ann Arbor will no longer take pupils outside of their consolidation. All these schools but Younglove have suitable buildings which could be used. So annexation would mean no immediate building program.

We often wondered why no efforts are made to revive the Pinckney High School Alumni Ass'n. This group held big reunions for years until about World War II. After the war they were resumed and 2 successful ones were held with Ross Read as chairman of one and Gerald Reason the other. It has been 10 or 12 years since there has been one. There is too much of a let George do it attitude. The last bunch of officers named resigned in a body. Back in the old days Percy Swarthout, Lucius Wilson, Ross Read, Norman Reason, C. W. Hooker and Neddie Gahner were strong boosters for it and had many successful reunions. One at Winans Lake drew 500 people.

The legislature last week passed an extension of the unemployment bill by whipping big majorities. The house 91 to 5 and the senate 27 to 5. The opposition to it melted like a snowball in the rays of the sun. All the votes against it were Republican. It extends unemployment benefits 13 weeks and the benefits range from \$24 to \$55 depending on dependents and wage levels. Federal funds are available for this but state must match them.

Senator Potter and Cong. Cham. berrin failed to cut the 10% excise tax on autos over the president's opposition. This tax yields \$1.3 billion a year. Cong. Chamberlain said this would be offset by increased tax income by manufacturers, dealers and workers and decreased unemployment payments but the president could not see it and refused to take a chance. Cong. Chamberlain claims that 79 o/o of the people to whom he sent questionnaires favored and 78 percent extension of the unemployment benefits.
