## The Michigan Mirror

The Republicans lost a chance for a big bow on the public stage election year as the Democrats stole the show on extending unemployment benefits from them to the unemployed workers will be getting their checks beyond the 26 week period this summer.

It started when the Republicans started a program of benefit extensions but held back to await federal action. The Democrats said it was not enough. The congress man \$30,000 available to Michigan. Still the Republicans held back but finally went for federal program under Democrat pressure. Gov. Williams had his picture taken signing the bill and gave each member of the Democrat delegation one of the pens. The Democrats expect their action to be a vote getter.

The new farmer can get a federal loan through the Farmers Home Administration. All he has to do is to apply to his county committee.

Despite the attitude of American car makers to belittle small foreign cars their number is increasing. There are 2 reasons: 1 The urge for sporty continental cars by modern generation. 2 The high price of American made cars. The big auto companies say they have models of small cars on their drafting boards but no definite plans to make them.

Secretary of State Hare says according to sales tax records, sales of new cars are down but those of used cars and foreign cars are up.

The refusal of the Legislature to appropriate enough money for state police made a special session necessary which cost \$6000. The police needed \$117,000 more. Without it they would have to have laid off 100 men. The state police made a fine record last year when they reduced traffic fatalities by 567. In the special session they again refused to appropriate the full amount but gave Com. Childs of state police permission to exceed budget to prevent layoffs. The legislature then asked the state police to submit budget so they could compare the operating cost per man with those of the county sheriffs. We do not think such a comparison would mean anything. The sheriffs operate inside the county, the state police statewide and answer most of the traffic accident calls. Many times have we called the sheriff's office on an accident only to be told the state police handled it. Senator Diggs, negro, complained because there are no negroes on the state police and charged discrimination. Senator O'Brien said few applied and one who was accepted disqualified himself.

**DEMOCRAT COUNTY CONVENTION**

When the late Governor Frank Fitzgerald ran for governor in order to get farm vote he had pictures of himself pitching hay in a field. This is not ordinary iv used in haying & is known as a dung fork.

The freeloading activities of Sheriff Adams presidential assistant together with the current unemployment may be bonanza for Democrats in the campaign this fall together with the stubbornness of President Eisenhower who like Pontius Pilate finds no wrong in this man Adams is a minister without portfolio, a presidential assistant for which the constitution does not provide. Fred Rogers, the engineer has often been asked by this paper for a news story on county road commission plans but says he can't take the time and on a previous occasion said if such plans were announced people in other areas object because they think they have equal priorities for any improvements. Yet the road commission is responsible for one of the biggest expenditures of public money. The newspapers are not necessarily whipping boy for disgruntled citizens nor can they correct mistakes to which the people can object. However for the record we can list the names of people who have responsibility for county road matters: The County Road Commission: Fred Berry, ch, Norman Topping and Delbert Smith and the supervisors road committee: Burr Clark, John Seim and Lyle Glover.

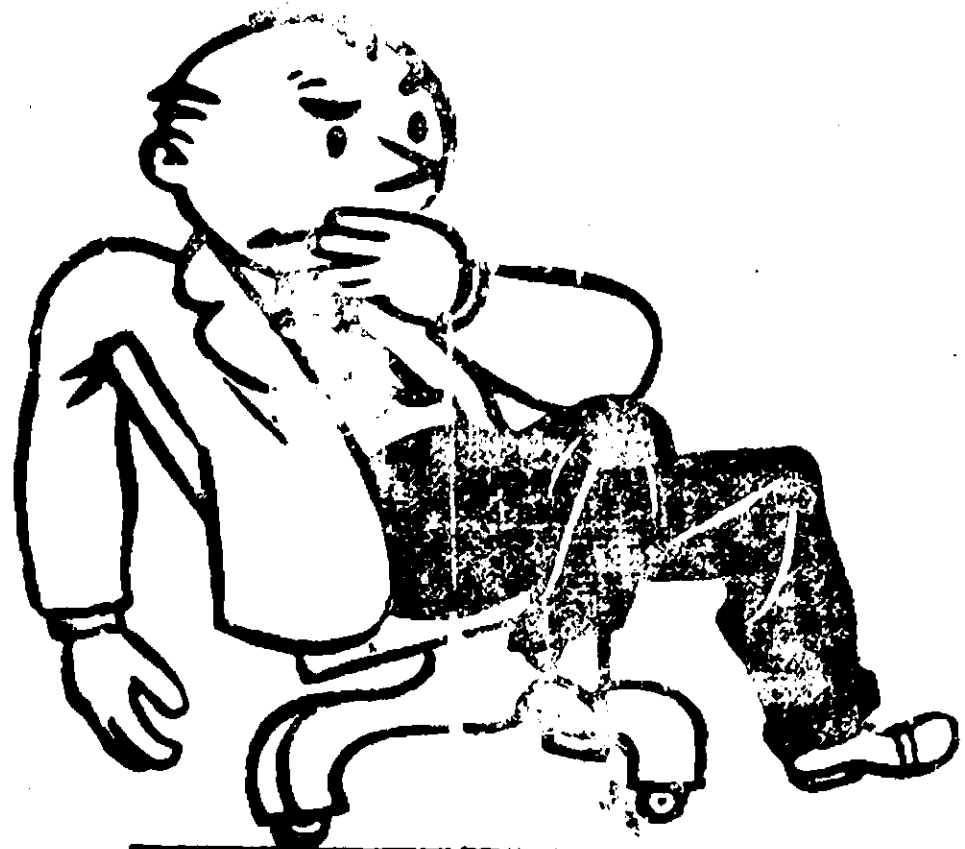

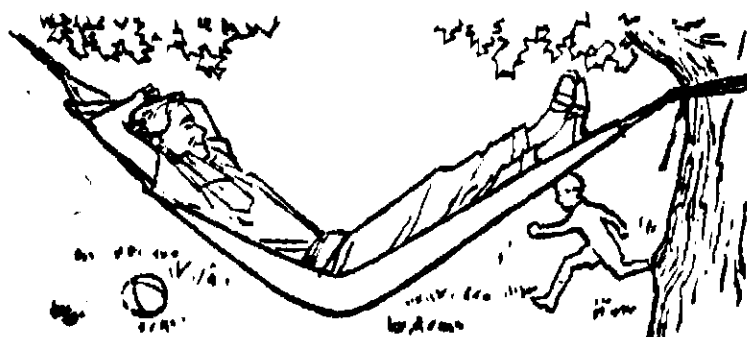
