A coalition of Democrat and Republican representatives forced an increase in the budget for the state police by \$400,000, but Com. Childs of the state police lost friends on both sides because he refused to take sides on the issue.

Republicans on account of a barren treasury cut the appropriations for all state agencies. There were objections from all state agencies: corrections, mental health, public safety, defense etc. but they were all ironed out but the state police budget. The house insisted on \$11,816,000 but the senate would only vote for \$11,300,000. So the governor called a special session so the activities of the state police, famous for their highway safety work would not be curtailed. Liberal Republicans backed Democrats and the \$400,000 increase was voted. As the session ended Com. Childs was authorized to exceed his budget if necessary to avoid laying off men. The legislature also authorized an investigation of waste in all state depts. They saved \$20,000 by abolishing the janitors at state police stations despite the cry troopers would have to be removed from patrol duty to do it.

Manufacturers can now be sued as well as merchants according to a supreme court decision. It involved cement blocks that were faulty.

Benefits from industrial leadership are apparent when business is booming. The Detroit area, Wayne, Oakland and Macomb, leads the nation production of motor vehicles, metal foundries, chemicals, 2nd in tires and foundries, chemicals, 2nd in tires and tubes, medicine and 3rd in metal stamping, coating and fabricated wire products.

CONSERVATION NOTES

At its June meeting the Conservation Commission postponed action on granting a license to the Bear Creek Mining Co. to mine in the Porcupine State Park. Representatives from botanical audobon and conservation clubs were there to oppose it and the Bear Creek Mining Co., American Metal and Ontongon village and county officials spoke in favor of it.

Late frosts spoiled much greenery this year especially the oak trees in northern Michigan whose acorns are the chief food of the deer.

Fox hunters set a new record in May when they killed 7838 foxes, 212 coons and 32 bobcats. They collected \$13,065 in bounty money.

14 fires were reported last week 21 acres burned over.

Current Comments

The decision of Federal Judge Lemley suspending the Little Rock supreme court integration decision for 2 1/2 years is ridiculous. We doubt it will stand up. He did not base his decision on the law but on harmony, or possibility of enforcement etc. The idea that lower court can reverse a supreme court decision does not make sense. Especially after the president of the United States had called out the army to enforce it! As the Detroit Free Press remarked the segregationists did not change horses in mid stream, they changed judges. The president met with 48 negro leaders on the matter last week but refused to make a statement. The NACP appealed the Lemley decision to the supreme court who are not likely to lack down on their own decision. This decision rather glorifies Gov. Faubus and his nullification efforts.

Rain and an 80 a mile wind put a damper on the activities of the first 2 days ceremony of the Mackinac Bridge dedication. At Cheboygan the tents housing the exhibits of industry were blown down. The parade from Stignace was held up but final ly got underway but the 83 queens were a wet lot. Fair weather prevailed Friday and Saturday. The fair was badly overplayed. Hotels and motels reported 65% vacancies. So far the bridge has only paid expenses 2 months. Last November due to the influx of deer hunters last May. The interest costs per month are \$31,000. Last November it yielded \$35,136. Yet it is carrying 30% more traffic than the ferries did. The passenger car traffic is up 55% but the truck traffic only 16. A 74% increase was expected. The state has agreed to pay \$417,000 a month toward the upkeep of the bridge but the expenses are running around \$700,000 a month.

Paul Farwell, Republican candidate went to the Mackinac Bridge dedication in 1906. Olds he borrowed and as a result did not get there until Friday noon after Postmaster General Sumnerfield, congressmen and senators had left. In his speeches he is coming out strong for a constitutional convention which will not endanger him to the Republican legislature who are against it. Under the present setup they are able to control the legislature. At the meeting in Marion last week of the Decker Hill Farm Bureau they came out against a constitutional convention and in favor of the amendment method of amending the constitution.

The Snerman Adams investigation still front page news, Adams admits receiving the vicious coat and paid up hotel bills from Goldfine but denies that Goldfine has financed him over the years or made him a present of a house to live in as testified by Richard K. Fox, Boston publisher.

Addressing the justice or peace convention at Escanaba last week, Supreme Court Justice Eugent Black denounced the Michigan legislature for obstructionism, buck passing and so on. It was dominated by surly old dogs in the manager whose chief product was paralysis of indecision. Justice Black the stormy petrel of Michigan. Elected attorney general on the republican ticket, he switched to the Democrats, was appointed to the supreme court and later elected to the office. Wilbur Brucker once sued him for slander but the case was never tried being withdrawn.

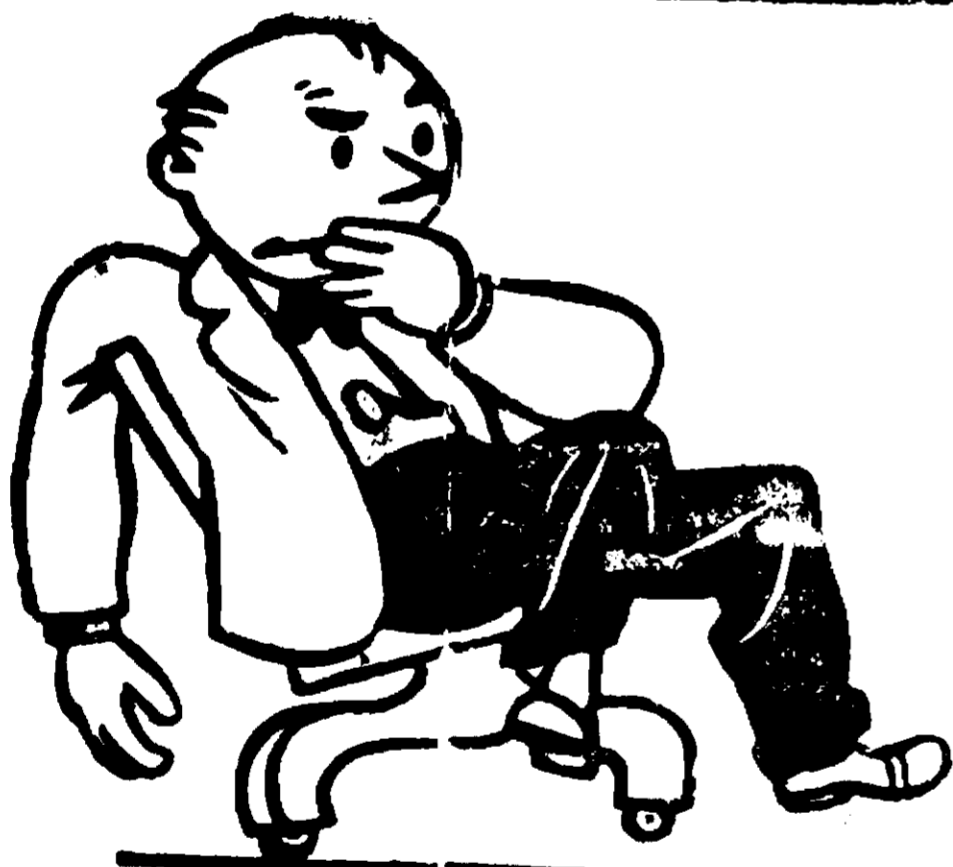

The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

Unregistered Persons Not Entitled To Vote

SEC. 491. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 116, P. A. 1954)
