The Michigan Mirror

Prisoners are people in trouble. They spend part or perhaps most of their lives behind the bars because they have violated a law that society passed to govern itself.

Michigan has 10,500 prisoners in 3 major institutions: Jackson, Marquette, Ionia, Cassidy Lake Training School, Detroit House of Correction and 12 training camps.

Because parole has become a scarce prisoner is no longer lashed or starved. Prison officials have fought for years to eliminate the inequities in Michigan's penal code. At one time a man in possession of burglary tools got as long a sentence as to a man who used them.

There are 21 offenses in Michigan for which the life penalty may be imposed. There are stiff sentences for offenses against property and lighter for offenses against people.

The sentence of 10 years for forgery and embezzlement was forced on the books by the banking interests for their protection. Michigan laws still contain a penalty for inciting Indians to riot and allow probate judges to turn a 17 year old over to circuit court for trial. The Jackson prison riots of 1932 were caused by these inequities and caused some reforms to be made.

A program of help to prisoners and inmates of camps has been adopted. Within the prisons there are alcoholics anonymous units, veteran organizations, public speaking groups, academic programs and rehabilitation.

The Red Cross depends on prisoners for blood donations. At Jackson the prisoners raised enough by stage shows, boxing matches etc to build a chapel. All prisons publish newspapers. It costs the people of Michigan \$15,000,000 to operate their prisons and camps.

CONSERVATION NOTES

The commission is studying special deer seasons for 24 northern Michigan areas and 12 upper peninsula. They will study crop damages and food shortage. It is desired 15000 deer be taken last year only 13,800.

63 ruffed grouse will be released on Hog Island this month where efforts will be made to establish the birds. The island is in Lake Sturgeon.

AS WE HEARD IT

HEARING IS SET FOR JULY 16 The State Highway Dept. will hold a public hearing at the Livingston county building, Howell July 16, starting at 9:00 a.m. on the proposed route of the 187 mile long superway highway from Detroit to Muskegon through Livingston county. It has already been completed from Farmington to Brighton.

Starting at the Farmington-Brighton expressway the proposed route runs south of the existing Grand River highway around the southeast corner of Howell then northwesterly by passing Fowerville to the south and ending at the Livingston-Ingomar line a mile south of the existing highway. Total distance is 20 1/2 miles.

Bridges will be built at Crooked Lake, Lorr Chilson, Pinckney Burkhart, Mason, Millett, Fowlerville Nichol and Wallace Roads at Lake Chemung Interchange. C & O Railroad, Ann Arbor Railroad, Shiawassee and Cedar-River.

There will be interchanges along the road at Brighton, Lake Chemung, Pinckney Road south of Howell and at Millett Road for connecting with M 59. Also 10 service roads. All other roads will be closed.

It will be 300 ft. wide with fenced right of way. The public hearing is on the economic effects of the road and will be conducted by Russell Wilbur state dept. engineer and Duane Russell, public hearing representative.

It will be financed by 90% matching federal fund.

Current Comment

The House investigating committee gave Benard Goldfine, textile tycoon, an uneasy 4ime on the witness stand last week and at the end he had lost much of his complacency as a penniless Russian emigrant boy who came to this country and made good again at heavy odds. The most damaging testimony against him was that he charged off his payment of hotel bills and gifts to Sherman Adams and others as business expenses on his income tax. When asked what he was buying with them refused to answer. Further testimony showed for years he had been giving certified checks, ranging from \$25 to \$150 to government employees, mostly clerks and secretaries in responsible positions. He seems to have collected government employees like a collector does stamps. It was also brought out that a million of these certified checks were still uncashed. This he did not explain or deny that they might have been used as collateral for loans. It is all right for a billionair to play Lady Bountiful if he desires but these were all to responsible government employees and were charged off as business expenditures.

The state will hold a public hearing on July 16 on the US Expressway from Brighton to the Livingston-Ingomar county line. There will be plenty of objections as it by passes the present US-16 completely and will make deserted villages of the oil stations and going places along US-16 from Brighton to Fowlerville by taking the main road truck traffic away from their door. Their objections will not avail unless as it part of the 187 mile super highway from Detroit which has stretched as far as Brighton.

Our foreign relations seem to be going from bad to worse. In Cuba American eyes forced down are held prisoners and the same thing happened in East Germany held by Russia. In Lubanour our embassy was fired on and its attaches mobbed. The cause seems to be as the racetrack tout remarked we backed the wrong horses. Dictators are in power in these places and it is our custom to back them with arms and money. Also congress has just cut a \$887,000 from the president's foreign aid budget. Madam Chiang Kai Shek who is here for another year from the University says we should stop aiding neutral nations who are all secret allies of Russia.

A long overdue act took place last week when Alaska was admitted to statehood. All it needs now is the president's signature and ratification by Alaska both of which are expected to materialize. Admission ends years of effort by Alaska to be admitted to the union. They have been kept out by a coalition of southern and western senators who by combining have been to block all legislation they did not want. This coalition was finally broken up. Now efforts will be made to admit Hawaii but this is not expected to happen until next year. Hawaii has a mixed population and for this reason the south has always opposed its admission.

Les Matritt, Livingston County Press comments on trip of Prof. Paul Bagwell to the Mackinac Bridge dedicated in an ancient 1908 Olds car. Bagwell is a strong advocate of a new constitution and 1908 car was to remind the people that 1908 was the last time constitution had been rewritten. Les says the principal objection to a constitutional convention is it would give control of the house of representatives to a populous small section and the distribution of state money benefits.

Now rural people, although fewer in numbers, control the legislature. So the farm organizations are against any constitutional convention which would deprive them of control. Les loses sight of one important fact. This nation is founded on the rule of majority. That's what the elections are for. The bulk of the tax money comes from these populous counties who are deprived of the legal representation in the legislature they are entitled to.

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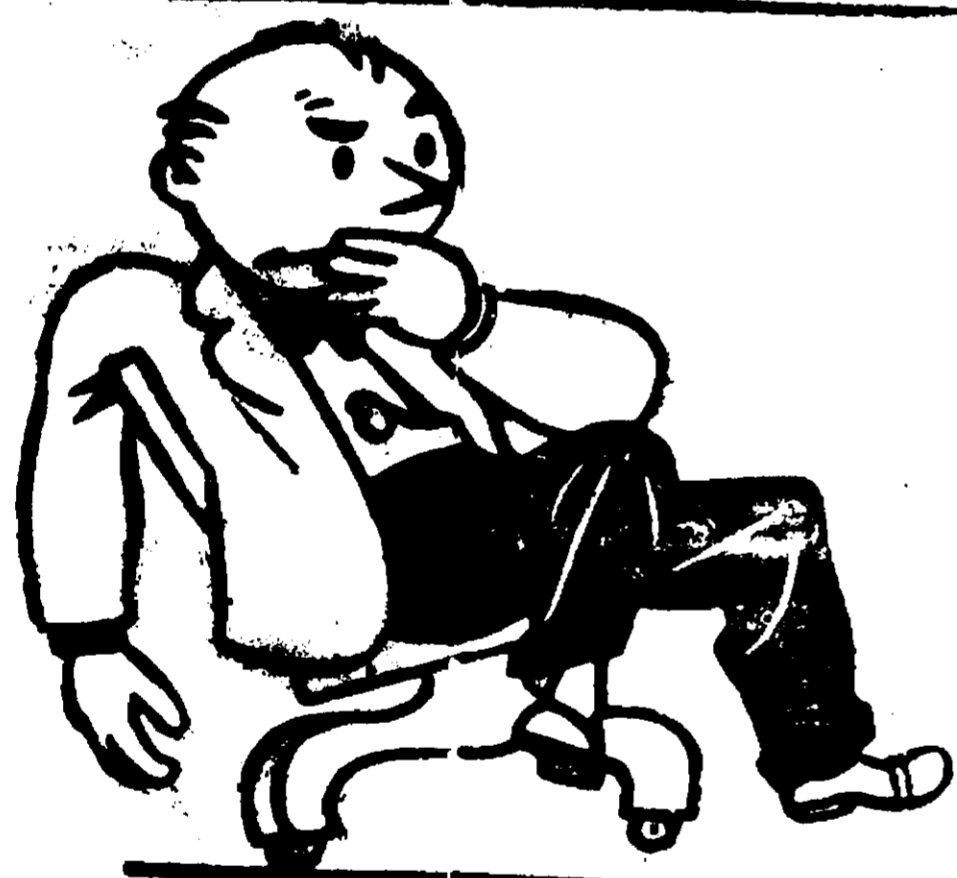
