For the first time since 1948 Gov. Williams and his ticket have opposition in the primaries. Mr. Johnson of Ironwood was once a Democrat candidate for state treasurer, Frank Hoel, once a congressman and Homer Martin, once a UAW head and a milk strike leader. Other are Michael Mphardt and Ted Fry, little known. As the Republican state candidates have no opposition in the primaries there is some talk the Republicans will vote the Democrat rump ticket in the primaries. It is even said they are financing it. If they are they are doing so sparingly as the rumps have little money or organization. They lost their suit in the supreme court to get Gov. Williams pictures off the ballot where it appears at the head of the ticket with Franklin D. Roosevelt.

The Gov. Williams ticket has on the other hand organized the state down to precinct and block level and provided recognition for those who ring door bells.

Gov. Williams is not worried as he leaves this week for Liberia where he is the chief speaker at the Independence Celebration Judge Cree, the only justice judge in Michigan whom he appointed goes with him. The rump's chief attack is on Walter Reuther and the labor unions whom they charge has taken over control of the party.

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Current Comments

Another rocket was launched last week with a live mouse in the cone but it failed to go into orbit, falling in the sea. The rocket was recovered but not the cone with the mouse in it. This caused a protest from humane societies but they were assured there were enough food capsules in the cone to sustain the mouse a week. Whether any important point was proved is not stated.

The attorney general has ruled that members of the legislature can not serve on school boards if they do not draw pay as legislators or have their office designation before their name if they run for reelection. There are many legislators on school boards. This opinion was handed down in the case of Rep. Wurzel. There were 3 other candidates for the office and they objected to him being designated as incumbent.

The University of Michigan has dropped the Napoleon school from the accredited list of schools because it has refused to build a new school. It has been on the accredited list for 33 years, the last 2 years on condition they build a new school. Supt. Gordon Hinton says architects are working on plans and a vote on a new school and bond issue and may be held in September.

The Bethany Tabernacle Church of God near Mt. Clemens has been cited in court for keeping the neighborhood awake. 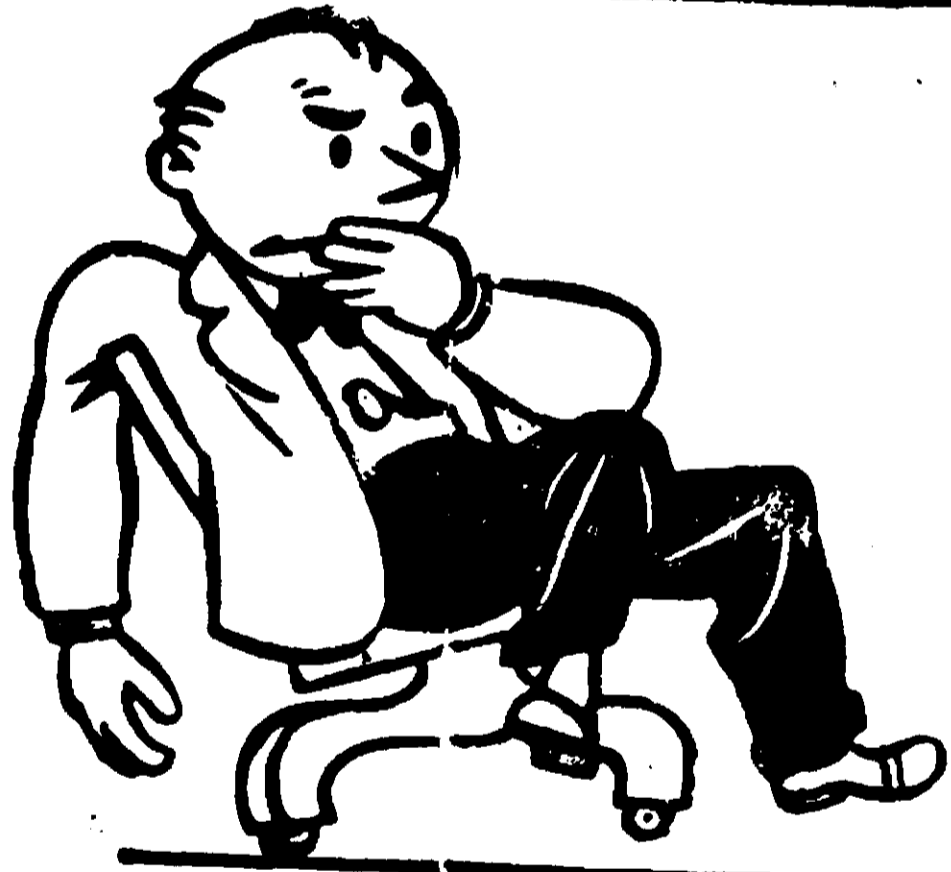

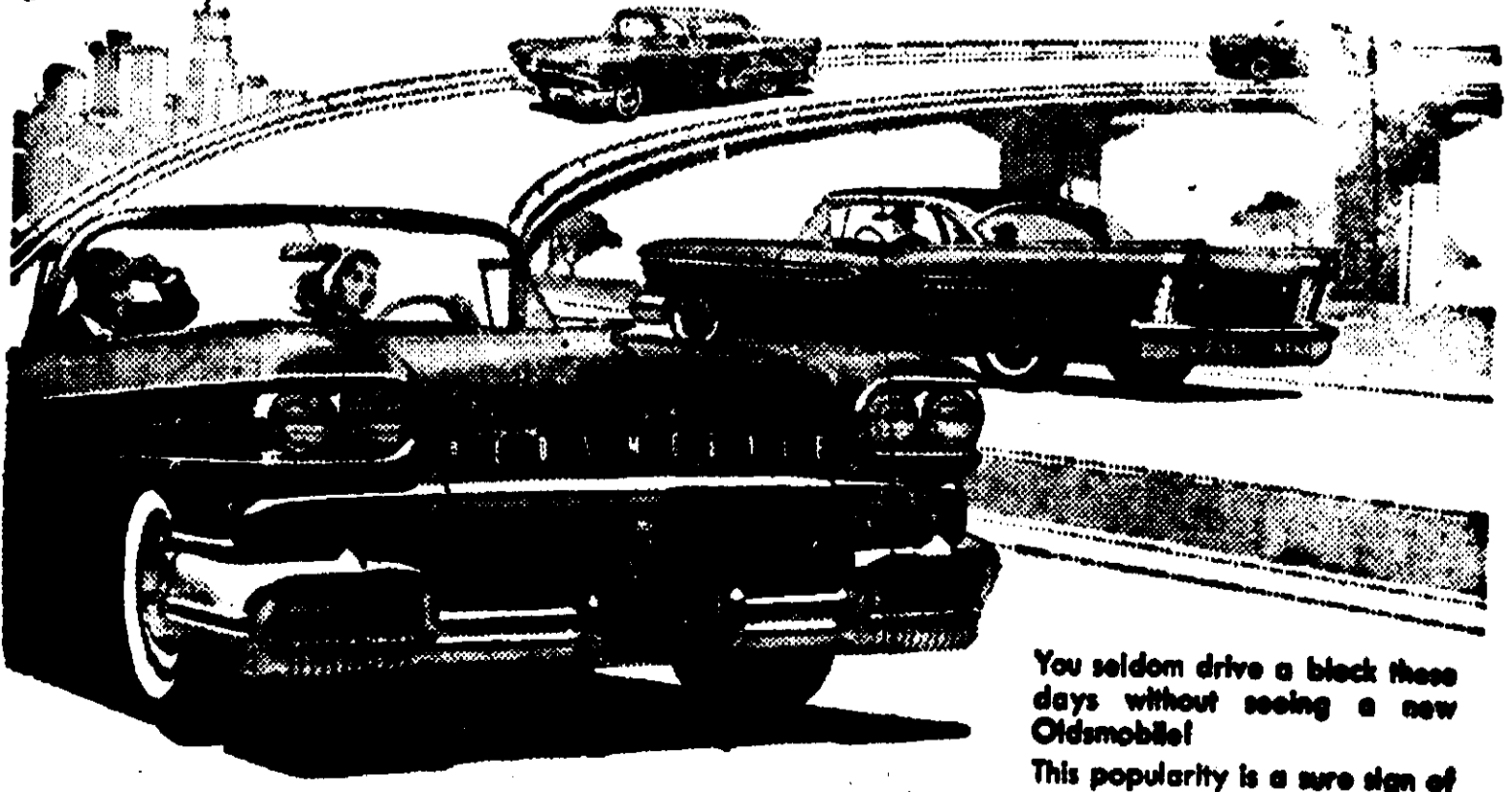


Mr. J. Buck and Son, Jack, with their 12 year old Oxen "Buck" and "Dime" wt. 3010 lbs. Picture taken in 1942
