Paul Bagwell, Republican candidate for governor has been conducting a unique campaign. He paid \$1700 for 1908 model Olds sedan and toured the state in it. This was to publicize the Michigan constitution which was last revised in 1803. Many Republicans are not in favor of a constitutional convention. Under the present constitution, although outnumbered by the Democrats they can control the legislature. Bagwell is for such a convention 100%. He has lived the quiet life of college professor and is crippled by polio. With no organization he has been visiting legislators and getting their advice. By this way he hopes to avoid the schisms which have wrecked the party for 10 years.

Gov. Williams on the other hand has the state organized down to the last precinct or ward. This is the work of Nell Stabler, state chairman. He has had coffee hours style shows and contests and no one who has ever worked for the party has been for gott.

Another device are his promotion appointments. Whenever a vacancy occurs he promotes some one in the dept. This gives him 2 appointments to make instead of one.

Gov. Williams has chosen his appointments well. Few have fallen short of the demands for the job. In addition he is popular and has the state government behind him.

The state primary election is August 5 from 7 a. m. to 8 p. m. Usually the vote is not too heavy. There are not many contests this year.

On the national ticket, Charles Potter, Republican is unopposed for U. S. senator. Phil Hart, Democrat has only token opposition in Homer. Martin, milk strike leader.

For congress Charles Chamberlain, Republican has no opposition. The 2 Democrat candidates are Don Hayworth of East Lansing and George Stevens of Flint.

For state senator Paul Younger, Republican has no opposition. The Democrats failed to put up a candidate.

For the legislature Jay Terbush of Ofwosso and Russel Buck of Perry and Peter Sater of Brighton are the Republican candidates. On the Democrat ticket are Wm. Groomes of Whitmore Lake, Joe Kurka of Elsie and Clyde Corbin, Brighton.

There are few contests on the Republican county ticket. John Hagman, clerk, Dorothea Greer treas, William Haak, register Floyd Munesil, drain com are unopposed.

On the Republican ticket Wilfred Erwin and Charles Gatesman are candidates for prosecutor. For Sheriff Lawrence Gehringer and Frank Zeigler. For coroner Harold Borden, Carl Dibble Dr. Wilkinson. Dr. Nils Clark.

Current Comments

We have often wondered if blood given by donors was segregated according to race and just how many types of blood there were? For instance at the recent blood bank at Brighton 48 pints of blood were given by the boys at Camp Brighton who are mostly all negroes. The prisons of the state also donate a large amount of blood. Apparently blood is not segregated in Michigan. In Louisiana last week Gov. Long signed a bill providing that all blood used for transfusion must be race labeled. Exceptions are made for disaster areas or where a doctor declares an emergency exists.

The new US-27 expressway causing opposition along old route which will be bypassed. Protest meetings have been held at Mt. Pleasant and Clare. The merchants along the present road claim by taking the traffic away from their door they will lose trade. A survey showed that 40% of the cars travelling US-27 stop up before they start and do not stop at all. A Clear oil station proprietor said 25% of his business over the July 4 week end was tourist trade. We were surprised there was not more objection registered here at the meeting on the US-16 expressway. Not that it would have availed anything as the routes are laid out and the money allocated, a great part of it being federal funds.

We read that the University of Michigan Fresh Air Camp at Patter-son Lake has just received \$25,000 in gifts \$18,603 from the Rackham Foundation Detroit and the rest from from students organizations at the university. Contrary to the belief of many people the camp does not receive any tax money at all. It is entirely supported by public subscription. Enough money was raised after World War I to buy the land of Sanford Reason. It was once a Hartzoff farm. A struggle took place to raise enough money at first to put up the buildings but eventually they were built. Many of the cottages there have bronze plaques with the names of the person who donated the money to build them. The main building is 2 story and has a dining room that will seat 300 a modern equipped kitchen and stage. It costs so much a week to send a boy there. This usually is paid by organizations. One year the J.B. Ford Co. of Wyandotte sent 300 boys there. The Ford Motor Co. has also aided.

This country and Great Britain are trying to work out plans where they can withdraw their troops from Lebanon and Jordan without losing face. In Lebanon the armed forces of President Chamoun and the rebels are still fighting with the American troops as onlookers. Most of the people here want the American troops withdrawn before another Korea develops but that is easier said than done. This country wants an election in Lebanon to choose a president to succeed Chamoun who cannot succeed himself. The rebels will not agree to an election until all American troops are withdrawn and will accept no president hand picked by the Americans. Premier Khrushchev of Russia wants a summit meeting. As he got the jump by suggesting it is disposed to dictate terms. He is willing to come here but Premier DeGaulle of France is not. Khrushchev wants India and all the Arab nations invited. Senator Knowand does not. The big difference between this country and the far east is this country has always ignored nationalism and supported the unpopular dictators. We still have fond hopes of putting Chang Kai Chak back in power in China although this possibility grows more remote every day. Then we sponsored Israel who is regarded as an interloper by the Arabs. Back after World War I we sent an army to put the Czar of Russia back in power. We got a lot of American boys killed and the movement collapsed when the Czar and his whole family were murdered and his army commander, Kohlschak who was slain by his own troops who mutinied.

Soil Care Pays Off For New Corn Prince

DAVID LUX, 16, of Shelbyville, Indiana, the new Corn Prince, maintained an old family tradition when he won top honors at the recent International Grain and Hay Show in Chicago.

David is a third-generation champion in the family. His grandfather, Peter J. Lux, started it all back in the 1920's when he won the Corn King title our times. David's father Maurice, was Corn Prince twice and



David Lux, the new Corn Prince his Uncle Frank, also a former Corn Prince, was named reserve grand champion corn grower at the 1956 international show.

The Lux family attribute their corn growing success to careful seed selection, good management and soil fertility.

This year, David's prize winning corn was grown on a 5-acre field he had entered in the 1956 Indiana 5-acre corn growing contest. The seed was an Indiana Certified Hybrid, No. 8-1-7.

Altogether, the Luxes had 115 acres in hybrid seed corn last season on the family's 400-acre farm in Shelby County, Ind. On most fields, the yields averaged better than 120 bushels per acre.

Over the years the soil fertility level has been built up and maintained by adding manure, crop residues and plenty of mixed fertilizer.

Last season, the fertility program included 400 pounds per acre of 4-15-15 spread down before corn planting, plus 200 pounds applied in rows at planting. In addition, 200 pounds per acre of 16-16-16 nitrogen fertilizer was applied for the corn crop.

Enriched Fertilizer

Boosts Corn Yields

25 Bu. per Acre

BALANCED fertilization has boosted corn yields as much as 55 bushels per acre, wheat 10 bushels and hay more than a ton per acre, reports E. C. Doll, University of Kentucky agronomist.

In tests at Campbellsville, Kentucky, plots that got lime, nitrogen, phosphate and potash fertilizer yielded 66 bushels of corn per acre, compared to only 11 bushels on plots that received lime alone, says Doll in a statement summarized here by the Midwest division of the National Plant Food Institute.

Wheat yields averaged 25 bushels per acre on the balanced fertilization plots, compared to seven-tenths of a bushel on plots received lime alone; hay yields were 1.7 tons per acre, as against four-tenths of a ton per acre.


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
