The Michigan Mirror

Michigan will fight to the last drop to prevent Chicago from diverting more water from Lake Michigan for sewage and waste disposal use. Chicago wants to increase their diversion 1000 cubic feet a second. The lake is now low and Atty Gen. Paul Adams, who's leading the fight against it says other communities will try it. This water instead of being returned to Lake Michigan would be diverted to the Illinois Waterway.

Several Ohio communities are reported considering digging canals to Lake Erie to divert the water to their own use. Ohio officials assured Michigan they will not consent to it.

The state has another problem along the Huron River between Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti. They want to stop the pollution of the river caused by dumping sewage and waste in it. With the great population increases few sewer systems are providing adequate.

The state must soon make a decision as to whether to allow copper mining in the Porcupine State Park. There are arguments both pro and con. Sportsmen and tourists are opposed to it while merchants and residents there are for it as it would bring more wealth there.

CONSERVATION DEPT. NOTES

The hearing on the Tawas-Great Lakes dredging operation was held in the house of Representatives July 30. Tawas wants to build a 1000 foot dock and dredge a channel to it to expedite the loading of gypsum. The state law forbids changing of channels or bottom lands.

The dept. has bought 417 acres of hunting lands and 3 water front in Deerpark, Sitawassa, Flat River, Platte River and Davis Lake.

By the will of Mrs. Carrie Sears the state is left 64 acres of land at Pinckney and 27 in Golden township, Genesee County.

PRIMARY ELECTION

The primary Tuesday had a Democratic edge. They not only carried Wayne county but out state as well. Gov. Williams beat his opponent 6 to 1. Lt. Gov. Phil Hart, John Swanson for U.S. Senator and Lt. Gov. also won easily. Livingston county cast 28 Democrat primary vote, highest ever. Lack of ballot cut the Republican vote down. Upadilla turned in a Democratic majority 94 to 54. 40 Republicans voting for Williams opponent, Wm. Johnson.

In the county Don Hayworth was leading George Stevens for congress. Jay Tebbush won the legislative nomination. Joseph Kurka is the Democrat nominee. Paul Younger for state senator had no opposition. Lyle Stone Democrat ran on stickers.

In the county Prosecutor Erwin won over Sheriff Gatesman by 41 votes. Sheriff Gehring got a majority of about a thousand votes over Frank Ziegler. Ervin Snyder is the Democrat nominee. There was an upset in the race for coroner incumbents being defeated by 2 Brighton doctors. The vote was Dr. Wilkinson 1264 Dr. Clark 1130, Harold Borden 988, Vern Dibble 890, Reed Fletcher and Glen Yelland won the circuit court nomination. The other candidates had no opposition.

In Washtenaw county George Peterson won over Sheriff Lillie. Peterson a 15 year veteran in the dept. was passed over when Sheriff Klugland died and Lillie, a newcomer appointed.

In Putnam only 226 votes were cast. It was Democratic 2 to 1. For governor Williams had 115, Johnson 10, Bagwell 66. Lt. Gov. Swanson 96, Mohardt 19, Brown 61. U. S. senator Hart 14, Potter 70, Martin 11. Congress, Stevens 93, Hayworth 30, Chamberlain 68 State senate, Younger 48, Stone 111. Legislature Kurka 95, Grooms 18, Corbin 7, Buck 38, Tebbush 17. Current Comments

Things in Lebanon and the far East seem to be working out soon for the withdrawal of our troops from there since we have adopted the slogan "If you can't lick them join them." We have now recognized the Communist regime at Iraq on the assurance they will not shut off the oil supplies of the far east and agreed to accept the new regime in Lebanon where a president has been elected who is acceptable to the Communists. There are things to be ironed out yet. The Communist want President Chamberlain to resign at once and the immediate withdrawal of the American troops. We are not quite ready for this but will be soon as we want to get out of there as bad as the Lebanese want us to. As far as Russia, China, Egypt, Iraq, and the rest of the Arab nations are concerned we will have to learn to live with them as the Detroit Free Press recently stated. We are not strong enough to overthrow the Communist governments of the world and restore unpopular governments they put out of power.

Gov. Orval Faubus and his "Bloody Shirt" policy won a sweeping victory in Arkansas last week when he won an unprecedented third term as governor on his platform of nullification of supreme court decisions. His victory is meaningless as the supreme court will stand long after he is forgotten. The result is not surprising to those who know the race attitude in the deep south. The people there think the president exceeded his authority when he sent troops into the south to enforce the supreme court integration. They likened it to the old reconstruction days after civil war when the white people of the south were disfranchised, the negroes placed in control of the government and soldiers sent there to sustain them.

The exodus to the suburbs continues in the cities. We read that a new \$5,000,000,000 Arborland shopping center will be established at Washtenaw and Pittsfield Center, south of Ann Arbor. They also want to build one near the football stadium but this has been blocked by court action. The main reason for this exodus is parking space. Finding a parking place in the center of the city is a problem people will not walk 5 or 6 blocks to a shopping place from their parked car. The big super markets have all kinds of parking space available within feet of their doors. People like to drive up to their shopping center and load up. For some time we have harped on the theme that Pinckney should buy a parking lot while some are still available.

One thing about the far east war scare was it enabled the president to get about what he wanted in defense funds. Last week by a vote of 71 to 0 the senate voted him the unprecedented sum of \$40,042,181,000 for defense. The draft has been stepped, up alerts ordered and no longer is there talk of cutting down the size of the national guard.

Some 40 years ago the Detroit Tigers had a pitcher named Jack Rowan. He was no wonder but managed to stick in the big leagues 8 years, playing with Cincinnati and the Chicago Cubs after leaving Detroit. Some years ago a man showed up in Detroit and claimed to be Jack Rowan. He was penniless and stayed at a cheap hotel. He applied and received a pension from the ball players pension fund. Steve O'Neil, mgr. of the Tigers then and the parish priest signed his pension application. Neither knew Jack Rowan. He died last week and the papers broadcasted the fact. This caused the real Jack Rowan a retired Dayton, Ohio, mail carrier, to come forward. Investigation proved he was the real McCoy. The base ball records show Rowan was 20 years old when he broke into the big leagues. That would have been the Dayton man's age while the Detroit Rowan would have been 30.

He played with the North Lake, a crack team of this area 50 years ago. 


