The Michigan Mirror

For the first time in the history of the state the Democrats outvoted the Republicans in the state primary last Tuesday. Gov. Williams vote was double that of his two opponents, Prof. Bagwell and William combined.

The school problem is the greatest facing Michigan at the present time. Michigan will have to stop putting off the problem from year to year and passing temporary measures. The schools and colleges are bulging to overflowing and need more class rooms and facilities. These take years to build up. Instead the Republican legislature cut the educational appropriation this year and this means a moratorium on school building and increases in pay for the teachers this year. The result is teacher turnover will be big and the high school students, a number of them may not be able to attend college.

The pressure is still at grade level. A million and a half are enrolled now and 70,000 new pupils are expected to enroll in September.

11,000 more class rooms are needed despite the 4,130 built last fall. By 1964, 29,000 more will be needed. 3,000 more teachers will be needed this fall. This makes a total of 61,000 teacher. \$825,000,000 will be spent in education this coming year.

Many outstate people come to Michigan during the tourist season. Many of them are manufacturers. One told Bill Turner, the Morley banker he would like to build a plant in northern Michigan. Bill went to see him and the result is plant at Morley employing 40 people.

Farmers in Michigan in the fruit line are doing all right. The strawberry and raspberry crop was bigger than last year and so was the grape crop. Apples are down but 3,000,000 bushels of peaches will be harvested.

Current Comments

The Summit Conference has broken off just as it appeared we were about to have one. Communist China is blamed for this. She persuaded Russia not to set in if Chang Kai Chek of Nationalist China was in it. Also Premier DeGaulle of France want it held in Europe. Now we doubt if the first one would accomplish much but it would be a start followed by others and eventually something constructive would result. The big problem is that President Eisenhower has so far failed to come up with any foreign policy. As the Detroit Free Press remarked last week there are only 2 alternatives to peace, active aggression and indirect aggression. We tried active aggression in Lebanon which has produced no results so far as we have had 19 men killed and have agreed to accept the Communist regime there. At indirect aggression we have been a failure as we have lost the friendship of most foreign countries.

Congress has passed the humane slaughtering bill and it is expected to be signed by the president but it is termed a gold brick by many as it has no penalties. It provides packers must first render an animal unconscious before they kill it. As they do mass killing they are expected to use cyanide chambers. It does not apply to farmers and small dealers who only kill a few animals but it might the extended to them in the years to come.

Just how screwy can one get? 30,000 or 40,000 attended the convention of Jehovah's Witnesses at the Yankee Stadium, New York, 137 from the South Lyon area went. They stated their creed which is no war, no military preparedness, no United Nations and no government of any kind whatever. In fact they are against everything. They are 100 % idealistic and want a world which has never existed and never will. It is akin to the vision of the late Dick Reason of Pinckney who saw the Lion and Lamb lying down together in perfect harmony. This has never come to pass although thousands of lambs have been gobbled up trying to make it happen.

The primary is over and the solutions of both parties are scanning the tea leaves as usual. About the only thing apparent is that many people were too lazy to vote. Of course both see in the results just what they want to. The Democrats says the huge Democrat votes make the Republicans the under dog and presents and unmountable hurdle for Prof. Bagwell their candidate for governor in November. Republican State Chairman of Lindemere of Stock says the drop in Gov. Williams total vote over 2 years ago shows a split in the Democrat party and Williams defeat in November. Carrying this argument out the big drop in the Republican vote for governor could forecast Bagwell in November. About all sections of the state showed a Democrat surge. Two years ago Oakland county cast 4,000 Republican votes. This year they only cast 18,000 Republican votes. In the 6th district Congressman Chamberlain got 8700 votes and his two Democrat opponents Hayworth and Stevens a total of 28,314 Livingston county still holds true to her tradition of putting an (x) under the picture of Lincoln and probably always will as long as Abes picture is there. Williams only carried 3 townships in the county. Putnam, Nam, Deerfield and Brighton township. There is not as much unity in the Republican party as Mr. Lindemere would have you believe. In Groose Pointe Fred Alger defeated William Durant for delegate by 22 votes.

Durant who is chairman recently repudiated President Eisenhower and his policies as glorified socialism and demanded a return to the policies of William McKinley. In Wayne county Andrew Baird, long time sheriff was renominated. He will be 80 years old this fall. Cy Adles, former townman was nominated for prosecutor by the Republicans in Gladwin county.

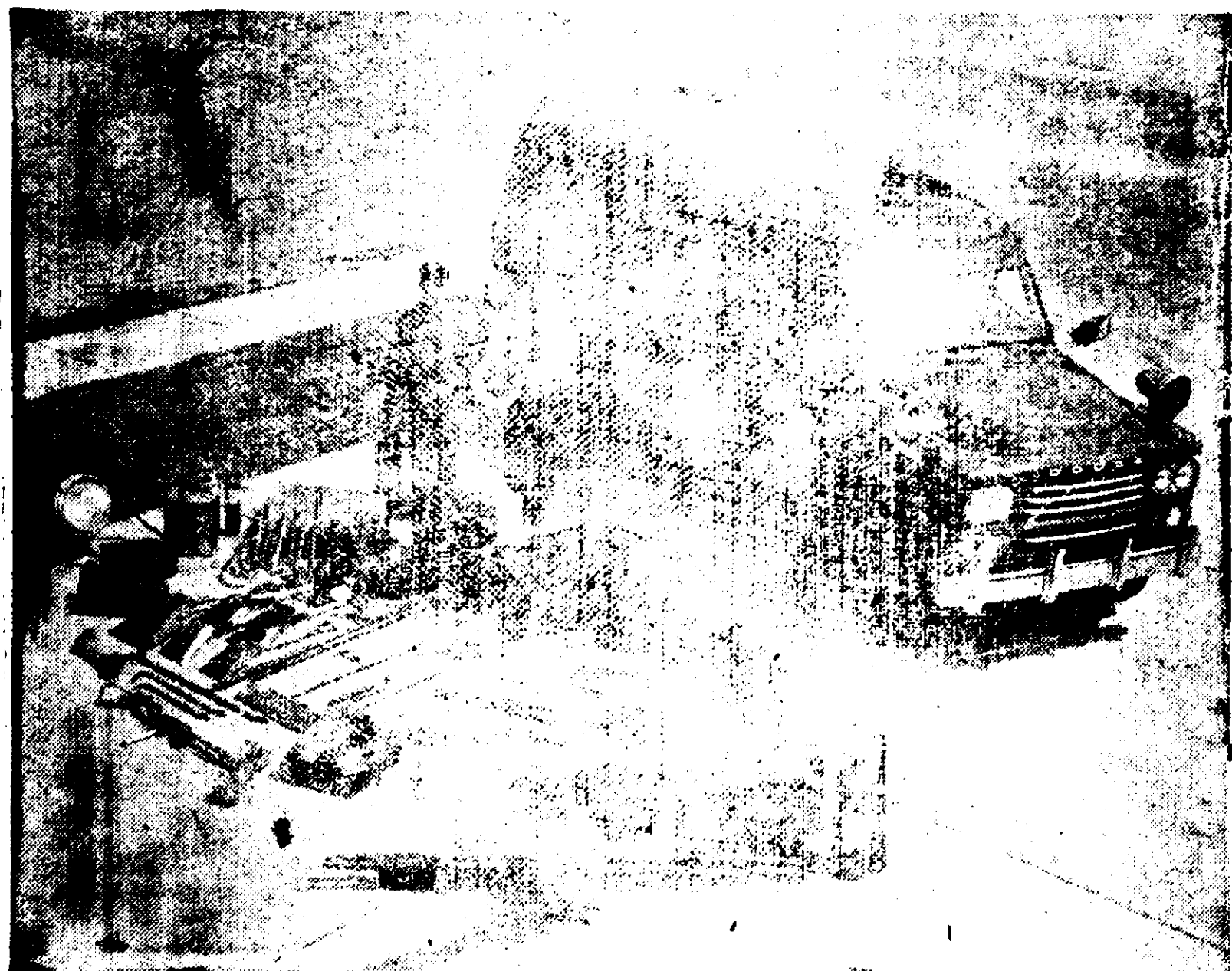
