Experts in half dozen fields are preparing Michigan state government for its biggest reorganization program in years. Just how far Gov. Williams wants to go is in doubt. Last winter the legislature passed the law giving the governor all kinds of power. He must present his plans to the legislature within 30 days of the next session. If they do not veto them they become law. The governor said he would ask help from the legislature and appointed a committee headed by Judge Clark Adams of Pontiac. Other members are educators and professional men.

They recommended the following proposals:

Place all tax collections in one agency.

Merge or consolidate health functions.

Create an overall retirement board. Consolidate agricultural activities.

Let the dept. of administration write checks instead of auditor general.

All of these in one form or another have been defeated by the legislature.

Other proposals are to eliminate waste in the state police and dept. of mental health. A hearing will be held in Sept. on the use of state own cars.

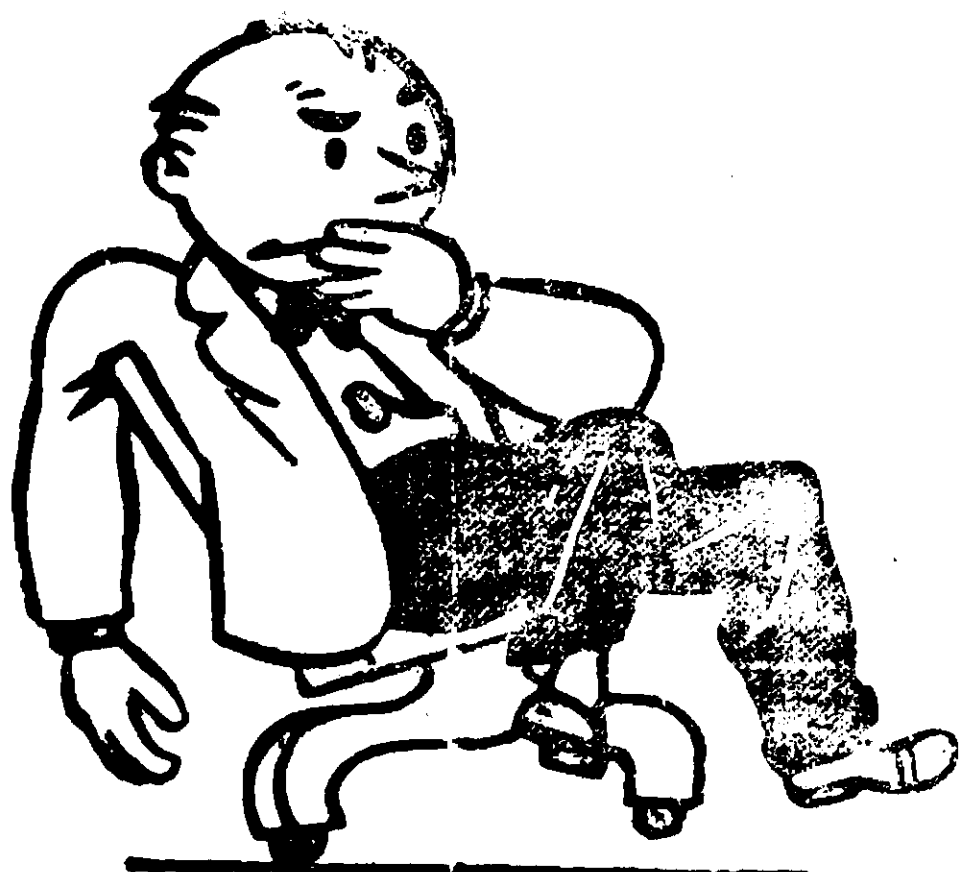
