About Michigan News

Rivals for space in Michigan's Waterland are bringing to a head issues between national state and local governments. The coming of the St. Lawrence Waterway expected to increase this issue.

Local governments are already alarmed by the broad right of way strips of land taken for the super-highways. They are also opposing the National Gypsum Co. who want to build a 1000 foot dock and dredge a channel 3000 feet deep at Tawas. They say it will spoil all the bathing beaches and lower property values. The company says it will bring economic benefits there.

Sportsmen's groups and tourists are against granting the Bear Creek Mining Co. lease on Porcupine Park. They say it will ruin it.

Towns by-passed by the super-highways are protesting it has ruined business. This is true in the Brighton-Farmington areas and Mt. Pleasant. They will probably lose their argument as the federal government which pays 90% of the cost will only pay for 4 lane limited access roads.

There is still no business pickup in Michigan to amount to anything special in the auto line. Foreign small cars are increasing in number and it is said two of the big companies are to come out with small models. Unemployment payments decreased in July. This was hailed as a good omen until it was found the main cause was that many had been out of work so long their insurance had expired.

Auto companies say there will be no pickup until November.

There is a difference of opinion as to where this dam should be. The conservation dept. want to put it at Bell Road. They own all the Huron River frontage from Bell Road to Portage Lake and want to make a bathing beach and public park. The property and the cottage owners at Portage Lake do not want this Portage Lake is strictly residential and much of it is highly restricted. There are about 100 motor boats owned there now all the lake can handle. Making it public would double or triple this number and make the lake unsafe for bathing, fishing or fishing. building the dam at the outlet would prevent the lake from become overcrowded.

Curret Comment

Dexter last week turned down again the proposition to increase the school tax 4 mills by a vote of 115 to 424. This was bigger vote against it than the first one about a month ago. The second election was the result of 601 voters signing a petition asking for it. Evidently all of them did not vote yes. A part of Portage Lake area is in the Dexter district. Number of them claimed they signed the petition with the intention of voting no. Most of this tax increase would have gone to increase teachers salaries. Following the first defeat 3 teachers resigned. Following the 2nd one the elementary school principal did. The Dexter Leader published a letter on the subject from a subscriber. He said he was forced to live on a social security check of \$100 a month yet teachers claimed they could not live on \$5400 a year. The teachers claim they are underpaid and compare their wages to auto workers. Yet said auto workers due to an employment have not had much take home pay the past year. Incidentally the Hudson Corners school once came to Pinckney. They annexed to Dexter on account of a higher valuation and a promised lower school tax. The latter did materialize as the Dexter school tax is now larger than Pinckney's.

We read North Muskegon has adopted a curfew ordinance whereby all teen agers have to be off the streets at 11 p. m. It won't work for the reason it cannot be enforced. The cities of Howell Ann Arbor, Ypsilanti have all tried out curfew ordinances in recent years without any great results. Pinckney had one some 30 years ago only the deadline was 9 p. m. Dan Murta was marshal at 9 p. m. he rang the bell on the town hall and then strolled through the business section looking for teenagers unaccompanied by their parents. The law was repealed, reenacted and for all I know is still on the books although it has been inactive for 40 years. The term curfew originated in London, England many years ago and means cover fires. London had no fire-protection then and people were supposed to put out their fires every night to eliminate fire hazard.

The United Nations has turned down the presidents peace plan and accepted the Arab plan instead. It provides for withdrawal of all American and British forces from the Arab countries and a promise not to interfere in the affairs of these countries. This will put Communist governments in power in most of these countries. This has increased Premier Nasser of Egypt in power magnitude and is an appeasement and nothing more. In return the Arabs agreed not to shut off the oil pipelines. We doubt if this plan will provide any permanent solution.

Things happened in Little Rock, Arkansas last week when the appellate court reversed a decision of the district court staying integration of the Little Rock high school for 2 1/2 years. The appellate court has since granted the school an injunction so they can appeal to the United States supreme court. The idea that a lower court reverse a supreme court decision was absurd in the first place. In the appeal to the supreme court they will probably lose again as there is little likelihood of the court reversing itself. President Eisenhower in a press interview said if the school refused to obey the supreme court decision he was ready to enforce it again as he did last year.

Congress has increased the Social Security payment. The increased is small, about \$5.32 a month. This is not the end of it however as bills to increase benefits will continue to be introduced at each succeeding session of congress until a living pension is paid.

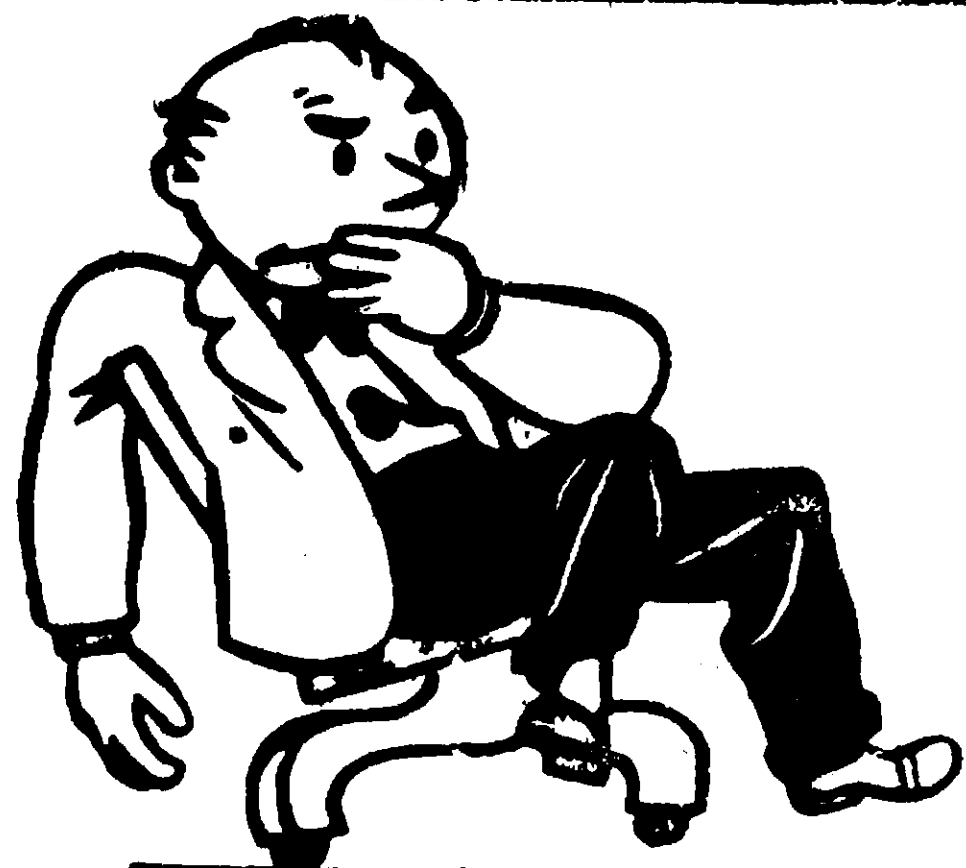

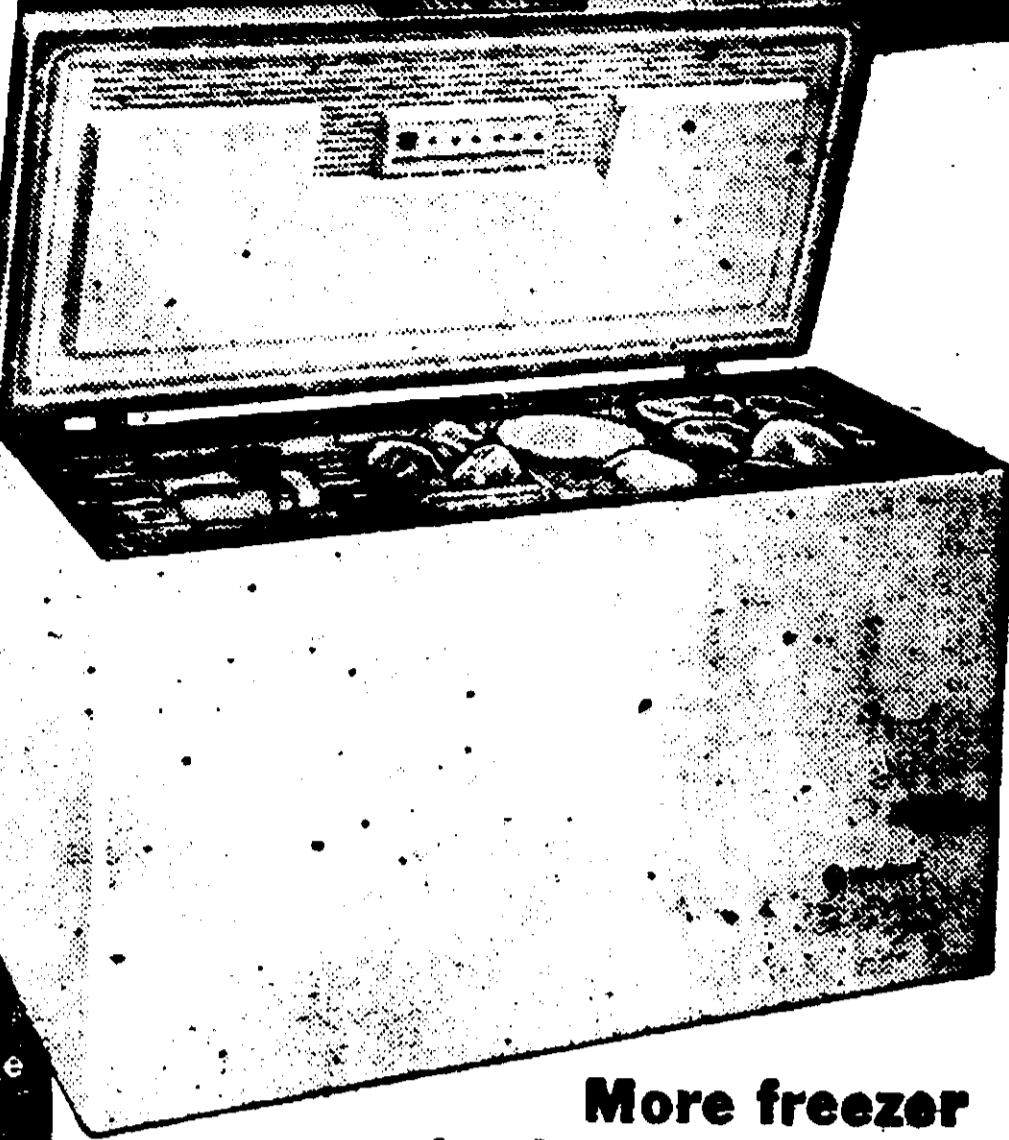
